HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on November 26, 2008. Claimant was not represented.

ISSUE

Is claimant disabled for the purposes of the Medical Assistance and State Disability Assistance programs?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

(1) Claimant applied for Medical Assistance and State Disability Assistance benefits on November 6, 2007.

(2) Claimant's impairments have been medically diagnosed as anxiety disorder, personality disorder, panic attacks, agoraphobia, bipolar disorder, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, hepatitis B, hepatitis C (not active), seizure disorder and a history of thyroid disease.

(3) Claimant's physical symptoms are frequent headaches.

(4) Claimant has the following emotional limitations: poor memory, poor concentration, anxiety attacks (3-4 times a week), crying spells (daily), episodes of anger, episodes of nervousness, bulimia, fatigue, sleep disturbances, poor self esteem, suicidal thoughts (twice a month), mood swings, social isolation, feelings of guilt and paranoia.

(5) Claimant's impairments will last or have lasted for a continuous period of not less than 12 months.

(6) Claimant is [REDACTED].

(7) Claimant has a high school education.

(8) Claimant has employment experience as a cashier. Claimant has not worked for over ten years.

(9) Claimant has significant limitations on physical activities involving lifting.

(10) The department found the claimant was not disabled and denied claimant's application on January 14, 2008.

(11) Upon claimant's request for a hearing, medical evidence was submitted to the State Hearing Review Team. The State Hearing Review Team determined that claimant was not disabled for the programs.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10,

et seq., and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Program Administrative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

The State Disability Assistance (SDA) program which provides financial assistance for disabled persons is established by 2004 PA 344. The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the SDA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MAC R 400.3151-400.3180. Department policies are found in the Program Administrative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

The Department of Human Services conforms to state statute in administering the State Disability Assistance program.

2000 PA 294, Sec. 604, of the statute states:

Sec. 604. (1) The department shall operate a state disability assistance program. Except as provided in subsection (3), persons eligible for this program shall include needy citizens of the United States or aliens exempted from the supplemental security income citizenship requirement who are at least 18 years of age or emancipated minors meeting one or more of the following requirements:

- (a) A recipient of supplemental security income, social security, or medical assistance due to disability or 65 years of age or older.
- (b) A person with a physical or mental impairment which meets federal supplemental security income disability standards, except that the minimum duration of the disability shall be 90 days. Substance abuse alone is not defined as a basis for eligibility.

Pursuant to Federal Rule 42 CFR 435.540, the Department of Human Services uses the federal Supplemental Security Income (SSI) policy in determining eligibility for disability under the Medical Assistance program. Under SSI, disability is defined as:

...the inability to do any substantial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment which

can be expected to result in death or which has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months.... 20 CFR 416.905

A set order is used to determine disability. Current work activity, severity of impairments, residual functional capacity, past work, age, or education and work experience is reviewed. If there is a finding that an individual is disabled or not disabled at any point in the review, there will be no further evaluation. 20 CFR 416.920.

All of the evidence relevant to the claim, including medical opinions, is reviewed and findings are made. 20 CFR 416.927(c).

For mental disorders, severity is assessed in terms of the functional limitations imposed by the impairment. Functional limitations are assessed using the criteria in paragraph (B) of the listings for mental disorders (descriptions of restrictions of activities of daily living, social functioning; concentration, persistence, or pace; and ability to tolerate increased mental demands associated with competitive work).... 20 CFR, Part 404, Subpart P, App. 1, 12.00(C).

The Administrative Law Judge is responsible for making the determination or decision about whether the statutory definition of disability is met. The Administrative Law Judge reviews all medical findings and other evidence that support a medical source's statement of disability.... 20 CFR 416.927(e).

If an individual has an impairment(s) which meets the durational requirement and is listed in Appendix 1 or is equal to a listed impairment(s), he or she is found disabled without considering age, education and work experience. 20 CFR 416.920(d).

In the present case this Administrative Law Judge does find disability based solely on the medical evidence. Evidence indicates that claimant has severe emotional problems. At the hearing, claimant testified that she has suffered from emotional illness for the past 30 years. A report by the examining physician dated [REDACTED] seemed to confirm the fact that

claimant has had an emotional illness for quite sometime. Claimant has a number of diagnoses with regards to her emotional condition in the past. In the examining report dated [REDACTED] the physician noted that claimant had anxiety disorder and a borderline personality disorder. In addition to the symptoms cited above, the physician noted that claimant had a depressed mood, feelings of worthlessness, no self esteem, no insight and lack of emotional intelligence. He also noted claimant's suicidal thoughts and her history of bulimia. The physician indicated that claimant is not a good candidate for psychotherapy. He indicated that her prognosis was poor and that "the kind of intervention required to turn this around is simply not available." The physician indicated claimant had a Global Assessment Functioning score of 50 which indicates serious symptoms or serious impairment in social, occupational or school functioning. He indicated on the Mental Residual Functional Capacity Assessment form that claimant was markedly limited in 9 areas and moderately limited in 5 areas out of the 20 areas used to determine an individual's ability to perform in an employment setting. This Administrative Law Judge finds that claimant's impairment does meet or is the medical equivalent of a listed impairment set forth in Appendix 1, Section 12.06. 20 CFR 416.926. Claimant is therefore disabled for the purposes of the Medical Assistance and State Disability Assistance programs.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that the claimant is medically disabled under the Medical Assistance and State Disability Assistance programs as of November 1, 2007. Therefore, the department is ORDERED to initiate a review of the application of November 6, 2007, if not done previously,

to determine claimant's non-medical eligibility. The department shall inform the claimant of the determination in writing. The case shall be reviewed in February 2010.
