HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on February 18, 2009. Claimant personally appeared and testified.

ISSUE

Did the Department of Human Services (the department) properly deny claimant's application for Medical Assistance (MA-P) and State Disability Assistance (SDA)?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

(1) On January 24, 2008, claimant filed an application for Medical Assistance and State Disability Assistance benefits alleging disability.

(2) On February 21, 2008, the Medical Review Team denied claimant's application stating that claimant's impairments lacked duration.

(3) On February 26, 2008, the department caseworker sent claimant notice that his application was denied.

(4) On March 5, 2008, claimant filed a request for a hearing to contest the department's negative action.

(5) On November 12, 2008, the State Hearing Review Team again denied claimant's application stating in its analysis and recommendation: the claimant was seriously ill in [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] for which he was successfully treated and made a good recovery. Medical opinion was considered in light of CFR 416.927. The evidence in the file does not demonstrate any other impairment that would pose a significant limitation. The medical evidence of record does not document a mental/physical impairment that significantly limits the claimant's ability to perform basic work activities. Therefore, MA-P is denied per 20 CFR 416.921(a). Retroactive MA-P was considered in this case and is also denied. SDA is denied per PEM 261 due to lack of severity.

(6) Claimant is a 51-year-old man whose birth date is [REDACTED]. Claimant is 5' 8-1/2" tall and weighs 183 pounds. Claimant testified that he cannot read nor count money and he thinks that he attended the first grade.

(7) Claimant alleges as disabling impairments: diabetes mellitus, acute renal and respiratory failure, anemia, and pain in feet and hands.

(8) Claimant last worked 20 years ago at [REDACTED] putting tape on cars so that they could be painted. Claimant testified that he usually helps his mother and sister to go to dialysis three times per week.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The State Disability Assistance (SDA) program which provides financial assistance for disabled persons is established by 2004 PA 344. The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the SDA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MAC R 400.3151-400.3180. Department policies are found in the Program Administrative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Program Administrative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

Pursuant to Federal Rule 42 CFR 435.540, the Department of Human Services uses the federal Supplemental Security Income (SSI) policy in determining eligibility for disability under the Medical Assistance program. Under SSI, disability is defined as:

...the inability to do any substantial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment which can be expected to result in death or which has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months.... 20 CFR 416.905

A set order is used to determine disability. Current work activity, severity of impairments, residual functional capacity, past work, age, or education and work experience is reviewed. If there is a finding that an individual is disabled or not disabled at any point in the review, there will be no further evaluation. 20 CFR 416.920.

If an individual is working and the work is substantial gainful activity, the individual is not disabled regardless of the medical condition, education and work experience. 20 CFR 416.920(c).

If the impairment or combination of impairments do not significantly limit physical or mental ability to do basic work activities, it is not a severe impairment(s) and disability does not exist. Age, education and work experience will not be considered. 20 CFR 416.920.

Statements about pain or other symptoms do not alone establish disability. There must be medical signs and laboratory findings which demonstrate a medical impairment.... 20 CFR 416.929(a).

...Medical reports should include –

- (1) Medical history.
- (2) Clinical findings (such as the results of physical or mental status examinations);
- (3) Laboratory findings (such as blood pressure, X-rays);
- (4) Diagnosis (statement of disease or injury based on its signs and symptoms).... 20 CFR 416.913(b).

In determining disability under the law, the ability to work is measured. An individual's functional capacity for doing basic work activities is evaluated. If an individual has the ability to perform basic work activities without significant limitations, he or she is not considered disabled. 20 CFR 416.994(b)(1)(iv).

Basic work activities are the abilities and aptitudes necessary to do most jobs. Examples of these include --

- (1) Physical functions such as walking, standing, sitting, lifting, pushing, pulling, reaching, carrying, or handling;
- (2) Capacities for seeing, hearing, and speaking;

- (3) Understanding, carrying out, and remembering simple instructions;
- (4) Use of judgment;
- (5) Responding appropriately to supervision, co-workers and usual work situations; and
- (6) Dealing with changes in a routine work setting. 20 CFR 416.921(b).

Medical findings must allow a determination of (1) the nature and limiting effects of your impairment(s) for any period in question; (2) the probable duration of the impairment; and (3) the residual functional capacity to do work-related physical and mental activities. 20 CFR 416.913(d).

Medical evidence may contain medical opinions. Medical opinions are statements from physicians and psychologists or other acceptable medical sources that reflect judgments about the nature and severity of the impairment(s), including your symptoms, diagnosis and prognosis, what an individual can do despite impairment(s), and the physical or mental restrictions. 20 CFR 416.927(a)(2).

All of the evidence relevant to the claim, including medical opinions, is reviewed and findings are made. 20 CFR 416.927(c).

The Administrative Law Judge is responsible for making the determination or decision about whether the statutory definition of disability is met. The Administrative Law Judge reviews all medical findings and other evidence that support a medical source's statement of disability.... 20 CFR 416.927(e).

A statement by a medical source finding that an individual is "disabled" or "unable to work" does not mean that disability exists for the purposes of the program. 20 CFR 416.927(e).

When determining disability, the federal regulations require that several considerations be analyzed in sequential order. If disability can be ruled out at any step, analysis of the next step is not required. These steps are:

1. Does the client perform Substantial Gainful Activity (SGA)? If yes, the client is ineligible for MA. If no, the analysis continues to Step 2. 20 CFR 416.920(b).
2. Does the client have a severe impairment that has lasted or is expected to last 12 months or more or result in death? If no, the client is ineligible for MA. If yes, the analysis continues to Step 3. 20 CFR 416.920(c).
3. Does the impairment appear on a special listing of impairments or are the client's symptoms, signs, and laboratory findings at least equivalent in severity to the set of medical findings specified for the listed impairment? If no, the analysis continues to Step 4. If yes, MA is approved. 20 CFR 416.290(d).
4. Can the client do the former work that he/she performed within the last 15 years? If yes, the client is ineligible for MA. If no, the analysis continues to Step 5. 20 CFR 416.920(e).
5. Does the client have the Residual Functional Capacity (RFC) to perform other work according to the guidelines set forth at 20 CFR 404, Subpart P, Appendix 2, Sections 200.00-204.00? If yes, the analysis ends and the client is ineligible for MA. If no, MA is approved. 20 CFR 416.920(f).

At Step 1, claimant is not engaged in substantial gainful activity and has not worked in 20 years. Therefore, claimant is not disqualified from receiving disability at Step 1.

The objective medical evidence on the record indicates that hospital records of [REDACTED] to [REDACTED] indicate the claimant was successfully treated for acute renal failure, acute respiratory failure and anemia. He was also admitted in [REDACTED] for acute hyperglycemia with medication noncompliance for which he was successfully treated. (Pages 10 through 178) Treatment note of [REDACTED] reported he had recovered from his hospitalization and was no longer on dialysis and his physical examination was within normal limits. Physical examination

on [REDACTED] indicates that his temperature was 96.2, his pulse was 95 and his blood pressure was 150/80. His weight was 179.2. He was a well developed male who did not seem to be in any acute distress. HEENT – his pupils were equal, round and reactive to light. His extraocular movements were intact. There was no pallor or icterus. Mucous membranes were moist. His neck was supple. There was no JVD and no lymphadenopathy. His chest was clear to auscultation bilaterally. He had regular rate and rhythm. S1 and S2 were normal. There were no S1 or S2 murmurs or gallops. His abdomen was soft. His bowel sounds were present and non-tender, non-distended, no splenomegaly. He was alert and oriented x3. There was no focal deficit. His extremities had no edema or cyanosis or clubbing. His laboratory indicated that he had hemoglobin of 10.4 with a normal MCV white count of 6.7 with retic count of 43,000 and platelets 327,000. His assessment was that he has anemia and that they did not have a clear etiology of his anemia.

At Step 2, claimant has the burden of proof of establishing that he has a severely restrictive physical or mental impairment that has lasted or is expected to last for the duration of at least 12 months. In the instant case, claimant did have a severe impairment; however, his impairments do not meet duration as his most recent physical examination indicated that claimant was normal except for some low grade anemia. Therefore, this Administrative Law Judge finds that claimant has not established that he has a severe impairment or combination of impairments which has lasted or will last the durational requirement of 12 months or more. However, this Administrative Law Judge will proceed through the sequential evaluation process for the sake of argument since Step 2 is a *de minimus* standard.

At Step 3, claimant's impairments do not rise to the level necessary to be specifically listed as disabling as a matter of law.

At Step 4, claimant testified on the record that he lives with sister and he has never learned to drive. Claimant testified that his niece takes him where he needs to go and that he does cook three times per week and cooks things like chicken, gravy and mashed potatoes. Claimant testified that he does grocery shop one time per month and he does need a ride and that he cleans his home by doing the kitchen and his bedroom. The claimant testified that he can walk from the kitchen to the front room and he can stand for a half an hour at a time and sit all day long. Claimant is able to shower and dress himself but not squat, bend at the waist or tie his shoes or touch his toes. Claimant testified that the heaviest weight he can carry is 20 pounds and that he is left handed and that his hands and arms ache and have cramps. Claimant testified that his level of pain on a scale from 1 to 10 without medication is an 8 and with medication is a 2. Claimant testified that he does drink a half a pint of gin per day and his doctor has told him to quit.

Claimant is not in compliance with his treatment program as he does continue to drink a half a pint of gin per day.

If an individual fails to follow prescribed treatment which would be expected to restore their ability to engage in substantial gainful activity without good cause, there will not be a finding of disability.... 20 CFR 416.994(b)(4)(iv).

Claimant is disqualified from receiving disability at Step 4 as he could probably perform his prior work putting tape on cars so that they can be painted. Therefore, claimant is disqualified from receiving disability at Step 4.

The Administrative Law Judge, will continue to proceed through the sequential evaluation process to determine whether or not claimant has the residual functional capacity to perform some other less strenuous tasks than in his prior jobs.

At Step 5, the burden of proof shifts to the department to establish that claimant does not have residual functional capacity.

The residual functional capacity is what an individual can do despite limitations. All impairments will be considered in addition to ability to meet certain demands of jobs in the national economy. Physical demands, mental demands, sensory requirements and other functions will be evaluated.... 20 CFR 416.945(a).

To determine the physical demands (exertional requirements) of work in the national economy, we classify jobs as sedentary, light, medium and heavy. These terms have the same meaning as they have in the *Dictionary of Occupational Titles*, published by the Department of Labor... 20 CFR 416.967.

Sedentary work. Sedentary work involves lifting no more than 10 pounds at a time and occasionally lifting or carrying articles like docket files, ledgers, and small tools. Although a sedentary job is defined as one which involves sitting, a certain amount of walking and standing is often necessary in carrying out job duties. Jobs are sedentary if walking and standing are required occasionally and other sedentary criteria are met. 20 CFR 416.967(a).

Light work. Light work involves lifting no more than 20 pounds at a time with frequent lifting or carrying of objects weighing up to 10 pounds. Even though the weight lifted may be very little, a job is in this category when it requires a good deal of walking or standing, or when it involves sitting most of the time with some pushing and pulling of arm or leg controls.... 20 CFR 416.967(b).

Claimant has submitted insufficient objective medical evidence that he lacks the residual functional capacity to perform some other less strenuous tasks than in his prior employment or that he is physically unable to do light or sedentary tasks if demanded of him. Claimant's

activities of daily living do not appear to be very limited and he should be able to perform light or sedentary work even with his impairments. The claimant's testimony as to his limitations indicates that he should be able to perform light or sedentary work.

Claimant's testimony and the information contained in the file indicate that the claimant has a history of alcohol abuse. Claimant does continue to drink despite the fact that his doctor has told him to quit. Applicable hearing is the Drug Abuse and Alcohol (DA&A Legislation, Public Law 104-121, Section 105(b)(1), 110 STAT. 853, 42 USC 423(d)(2)(C), 1382(c)(a)(3)(J). The law indicates that individuals are not eligible and/or not disabled where drug addiction or alcoholism is a contributing factor material to the determination of disability. Claimant does have diabetes and his doctor has told him to stop drinking. After a careful review of the credible and substantial evidence on the whole record, this Administrative Law Judge finds that even if claimant were to be determined to be disabled, he does not meet the statutory disability definition under the authority of the DA&A Legislation because his substance abuse is material to his alleged impairment and alleged disability.

Claimant testified on the record that he does not have any mental limitations.

For mental disorders, severity is assessed in terms of the functional limitations imposed by the impairment. Functional limitations are assessed using the criteria in paragraph (B) of the listings for mental disorders (descriptions of restrictions of activities of daily living, social functioning; concentration, persistence, or pace; and ability to tolerate increased mental demands associated with competitive work).... 20 CFR, Part 404, Subpart P, App. 1, 12.00(C).

There is no objective medical evidence contained in the file of depression or a cognitive dysfunction that is so severe that it would prevent claimant from working at any job. In addition, based upon claimant's medical record, it is documented that he has heavy use of alcohol as well

as continues to drink despite the fact that his doctor has told him to stop drinking which would have contributed to his physical and any alleged mental problems. Claimant's complaints of pain, while profound and credible, are out of proportion to the objective medical evidence contained in the file as it relates to claimant's ability to perform work. In addition, claimant did testify that he does receive some substantial relief from his pain medication. Claimant was able to answer all the questions at the hearing and was responsive to all the questions. Claimant was oriented to person, time and place during the hearing. Therefore, the Administrative Law Judge finds that the objective medical evidence on the record does not establish that claimant has no residual functional capacity. Claimant is disqualified from receiving disability at Step 5 based upon the fact that he has not established by objective medical evidence that he cannot perform at least light or sedentary work even with his impairments.

The department's Program Eligibility Manual contains the following policy statements and instructions for caseworkers regarding the State Disability Assistance program: to receive State Disability Assistance, a person must be disabled, caring for a disabled person or age 65 or older. PEM, Item 261, page 1. Because the claimant does not meet the definition of disabled under the MA-P program and because the evidence of record does not establish that claimant is unable to work for a period exceeding 90 days, the claimant does not meet the disability criteria for State Disability Assistance benefits either.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that the department has appropriately established on the record that it was acting in compliance with department policy when it denied claimant's application for Medical Assistance, retroactive Medical Assistance and State Disability Assistance benefits. The claimant

should be able to perform a wide range of light or sedentary work even with his impairments.

The claimant's impairments do not meet duration. The department has established its case by a preponderance of the evidence.

Accordingly, the department's decision is AFFIRMED.
