HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9; and MCL 400.37 upon Claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a hearing was held on May 26, 2009. The Claimant personally appeared and testified. A family independence manager represented the Department.

ISSUE

Did the Department properly compute the Claimant's Food Assistance Program (FAP) benefits for March 2009?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

 Claimant is a FAP benefits recipient for a group size of one. Her monthly benefit allotment for March 2009 was \$14. Previously, she received \$176 for February 2009.

- (2) Claimant began receiving unemployment benefits at the end of February 2009.
 She receives \$362 each week for unemployment compensation which is paid biweekly in the amount of \$724. (Exhibit 2).
- (3) Claimant disagreed with the Department including the gross amount of her unemployment compensation because taxes are taken from her unemployment compensation, resulting in her receiving a net amount of \$306 weekly.
- (4) The Department received Claimant's hearing request on February 25, 2009.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) (formerly known as the Food Stamp (FS) program) is established by the Food Stamp Act of 1977, as amended, and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (formerly known as the Family Independence Agency) administers the FAP program pursuant to MCL 400.10, et seq., and MAC R 400.3001-3015. Department policies are found in the Program Administrative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

Federal law requires that FAP recipients meet income eligibility standards to receive benefits:

Income and deductions.

(a) *Income eligibility standards*. Participation in the Program shall be limited to those households whose incomes are determined to be a substantial limiting factor in permitting them to obtain a more nutritious diet. Households which contain an elderly or disabled member shall meet the net income eligibility standards for the Food Stamp Program. Households which do not contain an elderly or disabled member shall meet both the net income eligibility standards for the Food Stamp Program. Households which are categorically eligible as defined in \$273.2(j)(2) or 273.2(j)(4) do not have to meet either the gross or net income eligibility standards. The net and gross income

eligibility standards shall be based on the Federal income poverty levels established as provided in section 673(2) of the Community Services Block Grant Act (42 U.S.C. 9902(2)). (7 CFR 273.9)

UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS All Programs except FTW

Unemployment benefits include:

- Unemployment compensation benefits (UB) available through the Michigan Unemployment Insurance Agency (UIA) and comparable agencies in other states, and
- Supplemental unemployment benefits (SUB pay) from an employer or other source.

Count the gross amount as unearned income.

Claimant's testimony about her food needs was credible and forthright. Nevertheless, the

Department properly followed policy. Under PEM 500, all income that is "NOT specifically

excluded" must be considered in calculating FAP benefits. (PEM 500, pg.1). Unemployment

compensation is not excludable income. Moreover, the gross amount of unemployment

compensation is included in the FAP budget. Consequently, it is found that the Department

properly calculated Claimant's March 2009 FAP budget. The undersigned has reviewed the

March 2009 FAP budget and finds it to be correct.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of

law, decides that the Department properly computed Claimant's FAP benefits.

Accordingly, the Department's action is AFFIRMED.
