HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon the Claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was conducted on June 3, 2009. The Claimant appeared and testified along with [REDACTED]. Joan McCoy, ES and Tarrecia Cooper, ES appeared on behalf of the Department.

ISSUE

Whether the Department properly computed the Claimant's Food Assistance ("FAP") benefits effective 1/27/09.

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. The Claimant applied for FAP benefits on January 6, 2009.
2. A Food Assistance Budget was compiled dated January 27, 2009. (Exhibit1).

3. Claimant has a household group of two (2) persons.
4. Claimant produced earnings statements showing monthly gross earned income of \$1359.00
5. The Claimant testified that her rent is \$575 per month and includes all utilities.
6. Claimant testified that she pays for telephone services.
7. Following the January 27, 2009 budget, monthly FAP benefits were calculated in the amount of \$77.00.
8. Claimant objected to the FAP calculation and filed this appeal. The Department received the Claimant's Request for Hearing on March 19, 2009.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Food Assistance Program, formerly known as the Food Stamp ("FS") program, is established by the Food Stamp Act of 1977, as amended, and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations ("CFR"). The Department of Human Services ("DHS"), formally known as the Family Independence Agency, administers the FAP program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et. seq.* and MAC R 400.3001-3015. Departmental policies are found in the Program Administrative Manual ("PAM"), the Program Eligibility Manual ("PEM"), and the Program Reference Manual ("PRM").

The federal regulations define household income to include all earned income. 7 CFR 273.9(b). All monthly income must be converted to a nonfluctuating monthly amount. Only 80% of earned income is counted in determining FAP benefits. PEM 550. Under 7 CFR 273.9, as amended, \$135.00 is deducted from the gross income of FAP recipients in determining FAP grants. Under 7 CFR 273.9 deductions for excess shelter are also made. PEM 554. Id. There is a standard heat and utility deduction as well as a standard deduction for telephone bills. Id. The

standard deductions are a set amount that is applied regardless of the actual expenses incurred by the Claimant.

In the present case, according to the aforementioned policy on budgeting, Claimant has a net monthly income of \$820.00. This was obtained by subtracting the standard deduction of \$135.00 and the excess shelter amount of \$132.00 from 80% of the gross income of \$1359.00. The amount of food assistance allotment is established by regulations at 7 CFR 273.10. A household of two people with a net monthly income of \$820.00 is entitled to a monthly FAP grant of \$77.00 per month. RFT 260.

Based upon the foregoing facts and relevant law, it is found that the Department's determination is AFFIRMED.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, finds that the Department properly calculated the Claimant's FAP allotment.

Accordingly, the Department's FAP eligibility determination is AFFIRMED.
