HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL

400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon Claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a

telephone hearing was conducted from on November 10, 2009.

<u>ISSUE</u>

Whether the Department properly determined Claimant's Medical Assistance (MA) eligibility?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

(1) On February 17, 2009, Claimant applied for MA benefits.

(2) On March 12, 2009, the Department completed a MA budget which resulted in a MA spenddown of [100]/mo. (Exhibits 1-9, 12-14)

(3) On March 12, 2009, the Department sent Claimant a notice informing her that she had an active MA deductible case. (Exhibits 10-11)

(4) On March 23, 2009, the Department received the Claimant's hearing request protesting the Department's MA eligibility determination. (Hearing Request)

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Bridges Reference Manual (BRM).

All earned and unearned income available to the Claimant is countable. Earned income means income received from another person or organization or from self-employment for duties that were performed for remuneration or profit. Unearned income means ALL income that is not earned and includes FIP, RSDI, SSI and UB. The amount counted may be more than the client actually receives because the gross amount is used prior to any deductions. BEM 500

The Department determines a client's eligibility for program benefits based on the client's actual income and/or prospective income. Actual income is income that was already received. Prospective income is income not yet received but expected. Prospective budgeting is the best estimate of the client's future income. BEM 505

All income is converted to a standard monthly amount. If the client is paid weekly, the Department multiplies the average weekly amount by 4.3. If the client is paid

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every other week, the Department multiplies the average bi-weekly amount by 2.15. BEM 505

Deductible is a process which allows a client with excess income to become eligible for Group 2 MA if sufficient allowable medical expenses are incurred. Each calendar month is a separate deductible period. The fiscal group's monthly excess income is called a deductible amount. Meeting a deductible means reporting and verifying allowable medical expenses (defined in "EXHIBIT I") that equal or exceed the deductible amount for the calendar month tested.

In the instant case, based on the testimony and documentation offered at hearing, I find that the Department established that it acted in accordance with policy in determining Claimant's MA eligibility.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, finds that the Department acted in accordance with policy in determining Claimant's MA eligibility.

Accordingly, the Department's MA eligibility determination is AFFIRMED, it is SO ORDERED.
