HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon the Claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a hearing was held in Monroe, Michigan on Wednesday, September 23, 2009. The Claimant appeared, along with [REDACTED], and testified. The Claimant was represented by [REDACTED] of [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] appeared on behalf of the Department.

ISSUE

Whether the Department properly determined that the Claimant was not disabled for purposes of Medical Assistance ("MA-P") program?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. The Claimant submitted a public assistance application seeking MA-P retroactive from January 2009, on April 21, 2009.

2. The Medical Review Team (“MRT”) determined the Claimant was not disabled on June 2, 2009 finding the Claimant capable of performing other work for purposes of MA-P. (Exhibit 1, pp. 1, 2)
3. On June 6, 2009, the Department sent the Claimant an eligibility notice informing the Claimant that his MA-P benefits were denied.
4. On July 1, 2009, the Department received the Claimant’s written Hearing Request protesting the “not disabled” determination.
5. On September 8, 2009, the State Hearing Review Team (“SHRT”) found the Claimant not disabled.
6. During the hearing, the Department presented a fully favorable Social Security determination with the disability onset date of May 1, 2005. (Exhibit 2)

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance (“MA”) program is established by Subchapter XIX of Chapter 7 of The Public Health & Welfare Act, 42 USC 1397, and is administered by the Department of Human Services (“DHS”), formally known as the Family Independence Agency, pursuant to MCL 400.10 *et seq* and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Program Administrative Manual (“PAM”), the Program Eligibility Manual (“PEM”), and the Program Reference Manual (“PRM”).

A previously denied MA application is treated as a pending application when MRT determined the Claimant was not disabled, and subsequently, the Social Security Administration (“SSA”) determines that the Claimant is entitled to RSDI based on his disability/blindness for some, or all, of the time covered by the denied MA application, provided the Department is

informed of the approval within 90 days of the date of the MA denial notice. PEM 260 All eligibility factors must be met for each month MA is authorized. PEM 260

Ultimately, because of the Social Security Administration determination, it is not necessary for the Administrative Law Judge to discuss the issue of disability pursuant to PEM 260.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, finds that the Claimant meets the definition of medically disabled under the MA-P program based upon the fully favorable SSA determination.

Accordingly, it is ORDERED:

1. The Department shall open (if not previously done so) an ongoing Medical Assistance case for the Claimant based upon the April 21, 2009 application.
2. The Department shall supplement the Claimant for any lost benefits he was otherwise eligible and qualified to receive in accordance with Department policy.
