## **HEARING DECISION**

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon the c laimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on Tuesday, November 17, 2009. The claimant personally appeared and testified on his own behalf.

# <u>ISSUE</u>

Did the department properly de ny the claimant's applicat ion for Medical Assistance (MA-P) and State Disability Assistance (SDA)?

## FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds a material fact:

- 1. On April 23, 2009, the claimant applied for MA-P and SDA without filing an application for retroactive MA-P.
- On June 9, 2009, the Medical Review Team (MRT) denied the claimant's application for MA-P and retroactive MA -P stating that the claimant's impairments lacks the duration of 12 months 20 CFR 416.909 and SDA that the claimant's physical and m ental impairment does not prevent employment for 90 days or more.
- 3. On July 2, 2009, the department ca seworker sent the claimant a notice that his application was denied.

- 4. On July 31, 2009, the department received a hearing request from the claimant, contesting the department's negative action.
- 5. On October 1, 2009, the State H earing Review Team (SHRT) considered the submitted objective medical evi dence in making its determination of MA-P, retroactive MA-P, and SDA e ligibility for the claimant. The SHRT report reads in part:

The claimant is alleging dis ability due to diverticulitis and colost omy. He is 37 years old with 10 years of education and with a hi story of working at a fast food restaurant. The claimant did not meet applicable Social Security Listing 5.01.

The claim ant is capable of performing work that is light work per 20 CF R 41 6.967(b) under Vocational Rule 202. 17. This may be consistent with past relevant work. Ho wever, there is no detailed description of past w ork to determine this. In lieu of denying benefits as capable of performing past work a denial to other work will be used.

- 6. During the hearing on Novem ber 17, 2009, the claimant requested permission to submit additional medical information that needed to be reviewed by SHRT. Additional medical information was received from the local office on December 15, 2009 and forwarded to SHRT for review on December 17, 2009.
- 7. On January 4, 2010, the SHRT cons idered the newly submitted objective medical evidence in making its determination of MA-P, retroactive MA-P, and SDA. The SHRT report reads in part:

The claimant is alleging disability due to diverticular disease. He is 37 y ears old and has a limited education with a history of unskilled work. T he claimant did not meet Social Security listings found in CFR 404, Subpart F. The claimant is capable of performing other wor k that is light work per 20 CF R 416.967(b) and unskilled work per 20 CFR 416.968(a) under Vocational Rule 202.17. In lieu of detailed work history, the claimant is returned to other work.

8. The claimant is a 38 year-old man whose date of birth is claimant is 6' tall and weighs 23 0 pounds. The claimant has gained 30 pounds aft er surgery. The claimant completed the 10 the grade of high school and was Special Education in all classes. The claimant cannot read

or write and or do basic math. The cl aimant was last employed on March 17, 2009 as a fast food restaurant worker. The claimant has als o been employed as a press operator at the medium level.

9. The claimant's all eged impairments are div erticulitis and a colostomy bag from surgery

### **CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**

The State Disability A ssistance (SDA) program which provides financial assistance for disabled persons is established by 2004 PA 344. The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) admin isters the SDA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, et seq., and MAC R 400.3151-400.3180. Department polic ies are found in the Program Administrative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

The Medic al Assistance (MA) program is est ablished by the Title XIX of the Socia I Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (formerly known as the Family Independ ence Agency) administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, et seq., and MC L 400.105. Department polic ies are found in the Program Admini strative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

# "Disability" is:

...the inability to do any substant ial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment which can be expected to result in death or which has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months.... 20 CFR 416.905.

...We follow a set order to determine whether y ou are disabled. We review any current work activity, the severity of your impairment(s), your residual functional capacity, your past work, and your age, education and work experience. If we can find that you are disabled or not disabled at any point in the review, we do not review your claim further.... 20 CFR 416.920.

...If you are working and the work you are doing is substantial gainful activity, we will find that you are not disabled regardless of your m edical condition or your age, education, and work experience. 20 CFR 416.920(b).

...[The impairment]...must have lasted or must be expect ed to last for a continuous period of at least 12 months. We call this the duration requirement. 20 CFR 416.909.

...If you do not have any impairment or combination of impairments which significantly limits your physical or mental ability to do basic work activities, we will find that you do not have a severe impairment and are, therefore, not disabled.

We will not consider your age, education, and work experience. 20 CFR 416.920(c).

[In reviewing your impairment]...We need reports about your impairments from acceptable m edical sources.... 20 CFR 416.913(a).

...Statements about your pain or other symptoms will not alone establish that you are disabled; there must be medical signs and laboratory findings which show that you have a medical impairment.... 20 CFR 416.929(a).

...You must provide medical evidence showing that you have an impairment(s) and how severe it is during the time you say that you are disabled. 20 CFR 416.912(c).

... [The re cord must show a severe impairment] which significantly limits your physical or mental ability to do basic work activities.... 20 CFR 416.920(c).

... Medical reports should include --

- (1) Medical history.
- (2) Clinical findings (suc h as the results of physical or mental status examinations);
- (3) Laboratory findings (such as blood pressure, X-rays);
- (4) Diagnosis (statement of disease or injury based on its signs and symptoms).... 20 CFR 416.913(b).

...The med ical evidence...mus t be complete and detailed enough to allow us to make a determination about whether you are disabled or blind. 20 CFR 416.913(d).

Medical findings consist of symptoms, signs, and laboratory findings:

- (a) **Sy** mptoms are your own description of your physical or mental impairment. Your statements alone are not enough to establish that there is a physical or mental impairment.
- (b) **Signs** are anatomical, physiological, or psychological abnormalities which can be observed, apart from your statements (symptoms). Signs must be shown by medically acceptable clinic al diagnostic techniques. Psychiatric signs are medically demonstrable phenomena which indicate specific psychological abnormalities e.g., abnormalities of behav ior, mood, thought, memory, orientation, development, or perception. They must also be shown by observable facts that can be medically described and evaluated.
- (c) **Laboratory findings** are anatomical, physiological, or psychological phenomena which can be shown by the use of medically ac ceptable laboratory diagnostic techniques. Some of these diagnostic techniques include chemical tests, electrophysiological studies (electrocardiogram, electroencephalogram, etc.), roentgenological studies (X -rays), and psy chological tests. 20 CFR 416.928.

It must allow us to determine --

- (1) The nature and limiting effe cts of your impairment(s) for any period in question;
- (2) The probable duration of your impairment; and
- (3) Your residual functional capac ity to do w ork-related physical and mental activities. 20 CFR 416.913(d).

Information from other sour ces may also help us to understand how y our impairment(s) affects your ability to work. 20 CFR 416.913(e).

...You can only be found disabled if you are unable to do any substantial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or ment al impairment which can be expected to result in death, or which has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less t han 12 months. See 20 CFR 416.905. Your impairment must result from anatomical, physiologi cal, or psyc hological

abnormalities which are demonstrable by medically acceptable clinical and laborat ory diagnostic techniques.... 20 CFR 416.927(a)(1).

...Evidence that you submit or that we obtain may contain medical opinions. Medical op inions are statements from physicians and psyc hologists or other acceptable medical sources that reflect judgments about the nature and severity of your impairment(s), includ ing your symptoms, diagnosis and prognosis, what you can still do despite impairment(s), and your physical or mental restrictions. 20 CFR 416.927(a)(2).

...In deciding whether you are disabled, we will alway so consider the medical opinions in your case record together with the rest of the relevant evidence we receive. 20 CFR 416.927(b).

After we review all of the evi dence relevant to your claim , including medical opinions, we make findings about what the evidence shows. 20 CFR 416.927(c).

...If all of the evidence we re ceive, inclu ding a II medica I opinion(s), is consistent, and there is sufficient evidence for us to decide whether you are disabled, we will make our determination or decision based on that evidence. 20 CF R 416.927(c)(1).

...If any of the evidence in y our case record, including any medical opinion(s), is inconsistent with other evidence or is internally inconsistent, we will weigh all of the evidence e and see whether we can decide whether you are disabled based on the evidence we have. 20 CFR 416.927(c)(2).

[As Judge]...We are responsible for making the determination or decision ab out whether you meet the statutory definition of disability. In so doing, we review all of the medic al findings and other evidence that support a medical source's statement that you are disabled.... 20 CFR 416.927(e).

...A statement by a medical source that you are "disabled" or "unable to work" does not mean t hat we will determine that you are disabled. 20 CFR 416.927(e).

...If you have an im pairment(s) which meets the duration requirement and is listed in Appendix 1 or is equal to a listed impairment(s), we will find y ou disabled wit hout considering your age, education, and work experience. 20 CFR 416.920(d).

...If we cannot make a decision on your current work activities or medical facts alone and you have a severe impairment, we will then review your residual functional capacity and the physical and mental demands of the work you have done in the past. If you can still do this kind of work, we will find that you are not disabled. 20 CF R 416.920(e).

If you cannot do any work you have done in the past because you have a severe impai rment(s), we will consider your residual functional capacit y and your age, educ ation, and past work experience to see if you can do other work. If you cannot, we will find you disabled. 20 CFR 416.920(f)(1).

...Your residual functional capacit y is what you can still do despite limitations. If you have more than one impairment, we will consider all of your impairment(s) of which we are aware. We will consider your ability to meet certain demands of jobs, such as physical demands, mental demands, sensory requirements, and other functions, as described in paragraphs (b), (conto) and (d) of this section. Residual functional capacity is an assessment based on all of the relevant evidence.... 20 CFR 416.945(a).

...This assessment of your remaining capacity for work is not a decision on whether you are disabled, but is used as the basis for determining the particular types of work you may be able to do despite your im pairment(s).... 20 CF R 416.945(a).

...In determining whether you ar e disabled, we will conside r all of your symptoms, including pain, and the extent to which your symptoms can reasonably be accepted as cons istent with objective medical eviden ce, and other evidence.... 20 CFR 416.929(a).

...In evaluating the intensity and persistence of your symptoms, inc luding pain, we will cons ider all of the available evidence, including your medical history, the medical signs and laboratory findings and statements about

how your symptoms affect you... We will then determine the extent to which have our allege of functional limitations or restrictions due to pain or other symptoms can reasonably be accepted as consistent with the medical signs and laboratory findings and other evidence to decide how your symptoms affect your ability to work.... 20 CFR 416.929(a).

If you have more than one impairment, we will consider all of your impairments of which we are aware. We will consider your ability to meet certain demands of jobs, such as physical demands, mental dem ands, sensory requirements, and other functions as described in paragraphs (b), (c) and (d) of this section. Resi dual functional capacity is an assessment based upon all of the relevant evidence. This assessment of your capacity for work is not a decision on whether you are disabled but is used as a basis for determining the particular types of work you may be able to do despite your impairment. 20 CFR 416.945.

...When we assess your physical abilities, we first assess the nature and extent of your physical lim itations and then determine your residual functional capacity for work activity on a regular and continuing bas is. A limited ability to perform certain physical demands of work activity, such as sitting, standing, walking, lifting, carrying, pushing, pulling, or other physical functions (including manipulative or postural functions, such as reaching, handling, stooping or crouching), may reduce your ability to do past work and other work. 20 CFR 416.945(b).

Federal regulations r equire that the department use the same operative definition for "disabled" as used for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) under Title XVI of the Social Security Act. 42 CFR 435.540(a).

#### "Disability" is:

...the inability to do any substantial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment which can be expected to result in death or which has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months ... 20 CFR 416.905

In determining whether an indiv idual is disabled, 20 CFR 4 16.920 requires the trier of fact to follow a sequential evaluation process by which current work activity, the severity of the impairment(s), residual f unctional c apacity, and vocational factors (i.e., age, education, and work experience) are ass essed in that order. When a determination

that an individual is or is not disable edic an be made at any step in the sequential evaluation, evaluation under a subsequent step is not necessary.

First, the trier of fact must determine if t he individual is working and if the work is substantial gainful activity. 20 CFR 416.920(b). At Step 1, the claimant is not engaged in substantial gainful activity and has not worked sinc e March 17, 2009. Therefore, the claimant is not disqualified from receiving disability at Step 1.

Secondly, in order to be considered disabled for purposes of MA, a person must have a severe impairment. 20 CF R 416.920(c). A sev ere impairment is an impairment which significantly limits an in dividual's physical or mental ability to perform basic work activities. Basic work activities means, the abilities and aptitudes necessary to do most jobs. Examples of these include:

- Physical functions such as walking, standing, sitting, lifting, pushing, pulling, reaching, carrying or handling;
- Capacities for seeing, hearing, and speaking;
- (3) Understanding, carrying out, and remembering simple instructions;
- (4) Use of judgment;
- (5) Responding appropriately to supervision, co-workers and usual work situations; and
- (6) Dealing with changes in a routine work setting. 20 CFR 416.921(b).

The purpose of the second st ep in the sequential ev aluation process is to screen out claims lacking in medical merit. *Higgs v. Bowen* 880 F2d 860, 862 (6 th Cir, 1988). As a result, the department may only screen out clai and must this level which are "totally groundless" solely from a medical standpoint. The *Higgs* court used the severity requirement as a "de minimus hurdle" in the disability determination. The de minimus standard is a provision of a law that allows the court to disregard trifling matters.

The objective medical evidence on the record further substantiates the following:

the claim ant was s een by
for a follow-up for depression. Since surgery, the claimant has been
depressed especially about his so cial situation bec ause of having the ileostomy bag,
which produces sounds and sometimes bulgi ng and it can be s een by other people. At
present, he does admit to feeling better about himself. He has been attending a weekly
group counseling session for depression and it has been helping him cope with his
situation. He has been fee ling more energetic, eating well with a good appetite, and

generally feels better. The claimant does complain of awakening at night because of the need to drain the ileostomy bag and he is unable to go back to sleep. He is tolerating his current medications well wit his no report ed side effects. Hopefully after that the claimant will be able to go back work and that will hielp with his current depression in problems. The claimant had a normal physical lieuwing physician's assessment and plan was to continue his sourcent medication and continue his counseling sessions for his depression. The claimant's work excuse will be extended until the surgery is performed in 3 months time which would be with the diverticulities complicated with status post colectomy and ileostomy. (Department Exhibit C-D)

On the claimant saw his treating physician for a wound check after a complicated surgery for diverticular disease. The claimant had a LLQ colos tomy which is functioning well. There is a small erythematous area that needs attention. Stoma otherwise is functioning and no obstruction or bleeding. There was no rectal pain and no rectal drainage. Midline wounds were almost completely healed. The claimant is taking antidepressants with some help. The claimant complained that he can't sleep at night and complains of right thigh pain. (Patient Exhibit 1-2)

On the claimant had a tomography at the claimant had a tomography

On the claimant underwent a computed tom ography at of an abscessogram and CT limited of the abdomen as a result of a pelvic abscess. The radiologist's impression was that the pr ior pocket to be completed collaps ed and the catheter was then removed. (Department Exhibit 17)

On the claimant was admitted to the discharge date of the discharge diagnosis was divertically ulitis of the descending colon with micro perforation. The claimant is condition on discharge was stable. He underwent a CT scan of the abdomen and pelvis with IV contrast confirming the above diagnosis. The claim ant was treated and did very well with minimal partin and was discharged in stable condition. (Department Exhibit 64-65)

At Step 2, the objective medica I evidence in the record indic ates that the claimant has established that he has a severe impairment. The claimant has diverticulitis where in he ended up with a c olostomy bag as a result of surgery. As a result of his current physical impairments, the claimant had a bo ut with depression. The claimant is in treatment and c ounseling. Therefore, the claimant is not disqualified from receiving disability at Step 2. However, this Admini strative Law Judge will proceed through the sequential evaluation process to determine disability because Step 2 is a *de minimus* standard.

In the third step of the sequentia I consideration of a disability claim, the trier of fact must determine if the claimant's impairment (or combination of impairments) is listed in Appendix 1 of Subpart P of 20 CFR, Part 404. This Administrative Law Judge finds that the claimant's medical record will not support a finding that claimant's impairment(s) is a "listed impairment" or equal to a listed impairment. See Ap pendix 1 of Sub part P of 20 CFR, Part 404, Part A. Accordingly, claimant cannot be found to be disabled based upon medical evidence alone. 20 CFR 416.920(d). This Administrative Law Judge finds that the claimant's impairment is do not rise to the level necessary to be listed as disabling by law. Therefore, the claimant is disqualified from receiving disability at Step 3.

In the fourth step of the sequent ial consideration of a disability claim, the trier of fact must determine if the claimant's impairm ent(s) prevents claim ant from doing past relevant work. 20 CFR 416.920(e). It is the finding of this Admini strative Law Judge, based upon the medical eviden ce and objective, physical and psychological findings that the claimant does have a driver's license, but does not drive because he has no car and he can't see at night because of blurry vision. The claimant does not cook because he does not know how. The claimant does not grocery shop because he can't read. The claimant cleans his own home by sweeping. The claimant does outside work of raking the yard. His hobby is playing basketball. The claimant felt that his condition has worsened in the past year because he does n't do sport's or anything. The claimant fel the is mentally impaired by depression where he can't sleep where he taking medication and in therapy at

The claimant wakes up between 1:00 to 2:00 p.m. He has problems sleeping. It takes him 4 hours to get up. He takes care of his personal needs. He watches TV. He goes to bed between 12:00 to 1:00 a.m.

The claimant felt that he could walk 2 bloc ks. The longest he felt he could st and or sit was 30 minutes. The heaviest weight he felt could carry was 40-50 pounds.

The claimant stopped smokin g May 1, 2009 where he woul d smoke a half a pack of cigarettes a day. The claimant s topped drinking May 1, 2009 where before he woul d drink a six-pack on the weekend. The claimant does not or has ever taken illegal or illicit drugs. The claimant did not think there was any job he could do.

This Administrative Law Judge finds that the claimant has established that he cannot perform any of his prior work. The claimant has a colostomy bag which would make employment difficult and employability almost impossible. The colostomy bag was necessary as a result of surgery on and was supposed to be removed or subsequent. Therefore, the claimant is not disqualified from receiving disability at Step 4. However, the Administrative Law Judge will still proceed through the sequential evaluation process to determine whether or not the claimant has the residual functional capacity to perform some other less strenuous tasks than in his prior jobs.

In the fifth step of the sequential consideration of a disability claim, the trier of fact must determine if the claimant's impairment(s) prevents claimant from doing other work. 20 CFR 416.920(f). This determination is based upon the claimant's:

- (1) residual functional capacit y defined simply as "what can you still do despite yo u lim itations?" 20 CF R 416.945;
- (2) age, educ ation, and wo rk experience, 20 CF R 416.963-.965; and
- (3) the kinds of work which exist in significant numbers in the national economy which the claimant could perform despite his/her limitations. 20 CFR 416.966.

...To determine the physical exertion requirements of work in the national economy, we classify jobs as sedentary, light, medium, heavy, and very heavy. These terms have the same meaning as they have in the Dictionary of Occupational Titles, published by the Department of Labor.... 20 CFR 416.967.

**Sedentary w ork**. Sedentary work involves lifting no more than 10 pounds at a time and occa sionally lifting or carrying articles like docket files, ledgers, and small tools. Although a sedentary job is defined as one which in volves sitting, a certain amount of walking and standing is often necessary in carrying out job duties. Jobs are sedentary if wa lking and standing are required occasionally and other sedentary criteria are met. 20 CFR 416.967(a).

**Light w ork**. Light work involves lifting no more than 20 pounds at a time with frequent lifting or carrying of objects weighing up to 10 pounds. Even though the weight lifted may be very little, a job is in this category when it requires a good deal of walk ing or standing, or when it involves sitting most of the time with some pushing and pulling of arm or leg controls.... 20 CFR 416.967(b).

...To be considered capable of performing a full or wide range of light work, you must have the ability to do substantially all of these activities. If someone can do light work, we determine that he or she can also do sedentary work, unless there are additional limiting factors such as loss of fine dexterity or inability to sit for long periods of time. 20 CFR 416.967(b).

**Unskilled work**. Unskilled work is work which needs little or no judgment to do s imple duties that can be learned on the job in a short period of time. The job may or may not require considerable strength.... 20 CFR 416.968(a).

The objective medical evidence on the record is sufficient that the claimant lacks the residual functional capacity to perform so me other I ess strenuous tasks than in his previous employment or that he is physically unable to do any tasks demanded of him. The claimant's testimony as to his limitation indicates his limitations are exertional and non-exertional.

For mental disorders, severity is assessed in terms of the functional limitations imposed by the impairment. Functional limitations are assessed using the criteria in paragraph (B) of the listings for mental disorders (descriptions of restrictions of activities of daily living, social functioning; concentration, persistence, or pace; and ability to tolerate increased mental demands associated with competitive work).... 20 CFR, Part 404, Subpart P, App. 1, 12.00(C).

In the instant case, the claimant stated that he has depression. He is cur rently taking medication and in therapy. The claimant only completed the 10 <sup>th</sup> grade of high schoo I where he was Special Education in all subjects. In addition, the claimant testified that he cannot read, write, or do basic math. The claimant's curr ent bout of depression seems to be as a result of his colostomy bag and should resolve once the bag is removed. As a result, there is sufficient medical evidence of a mental impairment that is so s evere that it would prevent the claimant from working at any job.

At Step 5, the claimant cannot meet the physical requirements of light work, based upon the claimant's physic al abilit ies. Under the Medical-Voca tional guidelines, a younger individual with a limit ed or less education, and an uns killed work history, who is limited to light work, is considered disabled. 20 CFR 404, Subpart P, Appendix 2, Rule 202.17. The Medical-Vocational guidelines are not strictly applied with non-exertional impairments such as depression. 20 CFR 404, Subpart P, Appendix 2, Section 200.00. Using the Medical-Vocational guidelines as a framework for making this decision and after giving full consideration to the claimant's physical and mental impairments, the Administrative Law Judge finds that the claimant cannot perform a wide range of simple, unskilled, light activities and that the claimant does meet the definition of disabled under the MA program.

The department's Program Elig ibility Manual provides the following policy s tatements and instructions for caseworkers regarding the SDA program.

**DISABILITY - SDA** 

**DEPARTMENT POLICY** 

SDA

To receive SDA, a person must be disabled, caring for a disabled person, or age 65 or older.

**Note:** There is <u>no</u> disability requirement for AMP. PEM 261, p. 1.

#### **DISABILITY**

A person is disabled for SDA purposes if he:

- receives other specified disability-related benefits or services, or
- resides in a qualified S pecial Living Arrangement facility, or
- is certified as unable t o work due to mental or physica I disability f or at least 90 d ays from the onset of the disability.
- . is diagnos ed as hav ing Ac quired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS).

If the client's circumstances change so t hat the basis of his/her disability is no longer valid, determine if he/she meets any of the other disability crit eria. Do NO T simply initiate case closure. PEM, Item 261, p. 1.

#### Other Benefits or Services

Persons receiving one of the following be nefits or services meet the SDA disability criteria:

- . Retirement, Survivors and Disa bility Insurance (RSDI), due to disability or blindness.
- . Supplemental Security Income (SSI), due to disability or blindness.
- Medicaid (including spend-down) as blind or disabled if the disability/blindness is based on:
  - .. a DE/MRT/SRT determination, or
  - .. a hearing decision, or
  - .. having SSI based on blindn ess or disability recently terminated (within the past 12 months) for financial reasons.

Medicaid received by former SSI recipients based on policies in PEM 150 under "SSI TERMINATIONS," INCLUDING "MA While Appealing Disabilit y Termination," does not qualify a person as disable d for SDA. Such persons must be certified as disabled or meet one of the other SDA qualifying criteria. See "Medical Certification of Disability" below.

- Michigan Rehabilitation Serv ices (MRS). A person is receiving services if he has been determined eligible for MRS and has an active MRS case. Do not refer or advise applicants to apply for MRS for the purpose of qualifying for SDA.
- Special education ser vices from the local in termediate school district. To qualify, the person may be:
  - attending s chool under a spec ial education plan approved by the local I ndividual Educ ational Planning Committee (IEPC); or
  - not attending under an IEPC approved plan but has been certified as a special education student and is attending a sc hool program leading to a high sc hool diploma or its equivalent, and is under age 26. The pr ogram does not have to be designated as "special education " as long as the person has been certified as a special education student. Elig ibility on this bas is continue s until the person completes the high s chool program or reaches age 26, whichever is earlier.
- Refugee or asylee who lost eligibility for Social Security Income (SSI) due to exceeding the maximum time limit PEM, Item 261, pp. 1-2.

Because the claimant does m eet the definition of disabl ed under the MA program and because the evidence in the rec ord does estab lish that the claimant is unable to work for a period exceeding 90 days, the claimant does m eet the disability criteria for SDA. The claimant is encouraged to participate in Michigan Rehabilitation Services (MRS) as his physical and mental health improves so they can assist in helping him in finding employment.

## **DECISION AND ORDER**

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusion sof law decides that the department has not appropriately established that it was acting in compliance with department policy when it denied the claimant's application for MA-P, retroactive MA-P, and SDA. The claimant cannot perform any level of simple, unskilled, light work. The department has not established its case by a preponderance of the evidence.

Accordingly, the department's decision is **REVERSED**. The department is Ordered to redetermine eligibility for disability based on the claim ant's April 23, 2009 applic ation. The claimant is eligible for MA-P retroac tive to April 2009 to January 2013 and SDA based on his April 23, 2009 application to January 2013.
