HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9; and MCL 400.37 upon Claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a hearing was held on June 11, 2009. Claimant personally appeared and testified. A Department JET case worker represented the Department.

ISSUE

Did the Department properly determine that Claimant's Family Independence Program (FIP) case should be closed on the grounds that she failed to comply with the Jobs, Education and Training (JET) program requirements without good cause?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- (1) Claimant is a FIP recipient. She receives \$403 in monthly FIP benefits.
- (2) Claimant was required to attend Work First/JET.

- (3) On January 20, 2009, Claimant was sent Notice of Noncompliance, stating her JET attendance was poor and that a meeting had been scheduled for January 29, 2009 at 2:00 pm at the Department office to give her the “opportunity to report and verify your reasons for noncompliance.”
- (4) Claimant attended the meeting and explained that her nine-month-old daughter had been sick. Claimant also stated at the meeting that she would not be continuing with Work First because it was not beneficial. At this hearing, Claimant reiterated that point and stated that the Work First sessions were unprofessional and unproductive.
- (5) Because she refused to participate in JET, the Department closed her FIP case effective, February 3, 2009.
- (6) The Department timely received Claimant’s hearing request March 15, 2008.

#### CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Family Independence Program (FIP) was established pursuant to the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996, Public Law 104-193, 8 USC 601, et seq. The Department of Human Services (formerly known as the Family Independence Agency) administers the FIP program pursuant to MCL 400.10, et seq., and MAC R 400.3101-3131. The FIP program replaced the Aid to Dependent Children (ADC) program effective October 1, 1996. Department policies for FIP are found in the Program Administrative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

#### **DEPARTMENT POLICY FIP, RAP Cash**

Federal and State laws require each work eligible individual (WEI) in the FIP and RAP group to participate in the Jobs, Education and Training (JET) Program or other employment-related activities unless temporarily deferred or engaged in activities that meet participation requirements. These clients must participate in employment and/or selfsufficiency related activities to increase

their employability and obtain stable employment. (PEM 230A, pg. 1)

**NONCOMPLIANCE PENALTIES FOR ACTIVE FIP CASES AND MEMBER ADDS**

The penalty for noncompliance without good cause is FIP closure. Effective April 1, 2007, the following minimum penalties apply:

- For the first occurrence on the FIP case, close the FIP for not less than three calendar months unless the client is excused from the noncompliance as noted in [First Case Noncompliance Without Loss of Benefits](#) below.
- For the second occurrence on the FIP case, close the FIP for not less than three calendar months.
- For the third and subsequent occurrence on the FIP case, close the FIP for not less than 12 calendar months. (PEM 233A).

**CLIENT OR AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE RESPONSIBILITIES**

**Responsibility to Cooperate All Programs**

Clients must cooperate with the local office in determining initial and ongoing eligibility. This includes completion of necessary forms. (BAM 105)

**Refusal to Cooperate Penalties All Programs**

Clients who are able but refuse to provide necessary information or take a required action are subject to penalties. (BAM 105)

Claimant had good cause for her absences from JET due to her infant's illness. After those absences, however, Claimant decided on her own volition to quit attending JET. In this case, JET participation is a requirement for receiving FIP benefits. Therefore, it is found that the Department properly determined to close her FIP case for three months as a sanction for noncompliance with JET.

**DECISION AND ORDER**

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that the Department properly determined to close Claimant's case on the grounds

that she refused to attend JET as required under Rule 230A.

Accordingly, the Department's action is AFFIRMED.

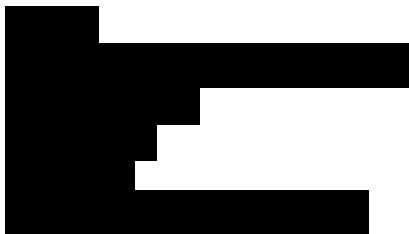
