HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9; MSA 16.409 and MCL 400.37; MSA 16.437 upon the Claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice a telephone hearing was held on May 19, 2010. The Claimant personally appeared and testified.

ISSUE

Did the department properly deny the claimant's Child Development and Care, (CDC) benefits?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. On December 1, 2009, the department closed the claimant's CDC case for lack of need.

2. On September 29, 2009, the claimant filed a request for a hearing.

### CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Child Development and Care program is established by Titles IVA, IVE and XX of the Social Security Act, the Child Care and Development Block Grant of 1990, and the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996. The program is implemented by Title 45 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Parts 98 and 99. The Department of Human Services (formerly known as the Family Independence Agency) provides services to adults and children pursuant to MCL 400.14(1) and MAC R 400.5001-5015. Department policies are contained in the Program Administrative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

In the instant case, the department testified that the claimant's CDC had been closed because there ceased to be a need, such as employment or education.

The Department of Human Services (DHS) may provide a subsidy for child care services for qualifying families when the parent(s)/substitute parent(s) is **unavailable** to provide the child care because of employment, participation in an approved activity and/or because of a health/ social condition for which treatment is being received **and** care is provided by an eligible provider. (BEM 703, p.1)

The law provides that disposition may be made of a contested case by stipulation or agreed settlement. MCL 24. 278(2). In the instant case, the parties reached an accord. The department agreed to accept documentation showing authorized need for child care and refigure and make payment on benefits missed if applicable.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, REVERSES and ORDERS the Department to accept documentation showing authorized need for child care provided by the claimant and refigure and make payment on benefits missed if applicable.
