HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon Claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was conducted from on November 17, 2009.

<u>ISSUE</u>

Whether the Department properly terminated Claimant's Food Assistance
Program (FAP), Family Independence Program (FIP) and Medical Assistance (MA)
benefits?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

(1) Claimant was a FAP, FIP and MA recipient.

- (2) On July 15, 2009, the Department removed the children from Claimant's case based on guardianship paperwork and information it received from another client regarding where the children were living. As a result, Claimant's FAP and MA case(s) were closed. (Exhibits 7,14)
- (3) On July 28, 2009, the Department removed the children from Claimant's case based on guardianship paperwork and information it received from another client regarding where the children were living. As a result, Claimant's FIP case was closed. (Exhibit 15)
- (4) On July 28, 2009, the Department received Claimant's hearing request protesting the termination of her FAP, FIP and MA benefits.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) (formerly known as the Food Stamp (FS) program, is established by the Food Stamp Act of 1977, as amended, and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department), administers the FAP program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MAC R 400.3001-3015. Departmental policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), and the Bridges Reference Manual (BRM).

The Family Independence Program (FIP) was established pursuant to the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996, Public Law 104-193, 8 USC 601, *et seq.* The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the FIP program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MAC R 400.3101-3131. The FIP program replaced the Aid to Dependent Children (ADC)

program effective October 1, 1996. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Bridges Reference Manual (BRM).

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Bridges Reference Manual (BRM).

In the instant case, based on the testimony and documentation offered at hearing, I am satisfied that the children were living with Claimant during the time period in question and should not have been removed from her case. With that said, I do not find that the Department established that it acted in accordance with policy in terminating Claimant's FAP, FIP and MA benefits.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, does not find that the Department acted in accordance with policy in terminating Claimant's FAP, FIP and MA benefits.

Accordingly, the Department's FAP, FIP and MA eligibility determination is REVERSED, it is SO ORDERED. The Department shall:

- (1) Reinstate Claimant's FAP, FIP and MA benefits retroactive to the closure date.
 - (2) Issue Claimant supplemental benefits she is entitled to, if any.

- (3) Notify Claimant in writing of the Department's revised determination.
- (4) Claimant retains the right to request a hearing if she would like to contest the Department's revised determination.
