HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon the Claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on August 25, 2010. The Claimant appeared at the hearing testified.

<u>ISSUE</u>

Was the Department correct in closing Claimant's FIP benefits for noncompliance with JET?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- (1) On June 30, 2010 Claimant's FIP case closed because of noncompliance with JET and failing to appear for the triage meeting.
- (2) Claimant requested a hearing on June 28, 2010 contesting the closure of benefits.
- (3) The parties reached an agreement whereby the Department agreed to reinstate FIP benefits back to the date of closure once Claimant reports back to Work First. The parties agreed that Claimant's action will be treated as a first instance of noncompliance with no sanction.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Family Independence program (FIP) was established pursuant to the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996, Public Law 104-193, 8 USC 601, et seq. The Department of Human services (DHS or Department) administers the FIP program pursuant to MCL 400.10, et seq., and MAC R 400.3101-3131. The FIP program replaced the Aid to Dependant Children (ADC) program effective October 1, 1996. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Program Reference manual (PRM).

Under Bridges Administrative Manual Item 600, clients have the right to contest any agency decision affecting eligibility or benefit levels whenever they believe the decision is illegal. The agency provides an Administrative Hearing to review the decision and determine if it is appropriate. Agency policy includes procedures to meet the minimal requirements for a fair hearing. Efforts to clarify and resolve the client's concerns start when the agency receives a hearing request and continues through the day of the hearing.

In the present case, the parties reached an agreement whereby the Department agreed to reinstate FIP benefits back to the date of closure once Claimant reports back to Work First. The parties further agreed that Claimant's actions will be treated as a first instance of noncompliance with no sanction. Since the Claimant and the Department have come to an agreement it is unnecessary for this Administrative Law Judge to make a decision regarding the facts and issues in this case.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Department and Claimant have come to a settlement regarding Claimant's request for a hearing. Therefore it is ORDERED that the Department reinstate FIP benefits back to the date of closure, once Claimant reports back to Work First, in accordance with this settlement agreement. No sanction will be imposed.
