HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge by authority of MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon a request from the Department of Human Services (Department) to schedule a hearing for an alleged intentional program (IPV). Respondent did not appear at the hearing, which was held on Wednesday, April 7, 2010, in Respondent's absence pursuant to 7 CFR 273.16(e), MAC R 400.3130(5), or MAC R 400.3187(5).

<u>ISSUE</u>

Did the Respondent commit a Food Assistance Program (FAP) intentional program violation?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the clear and convincing evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

The Respondent received FAP benefits from July 2006 through September 2006.
Department Exhibit 29.

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(2) Respondent was aware of the responsibility to report all household employment and income to the Department and had no apparent physical or mental impairment that would limit the understanding or ability to fulfill this requirement. Department Exhibit 13.

(3) Respondent was employed and received earnings during the period of May 11,2006 through September 30, 2006. Department Exhibit 16.

(4) Respondent did not fully report all employment and income to the Department.Department Exhibit 23.

(5) Respondent failed to report income and earnings for the purposes of receiving benefits that respondent was not entitled to receive.

(6) As a result, Respondent received overissuances in the amount of under theFAP program. Department Exhibit 29.

(7) This was Respondent's first intentional program violation.

(8) A notice of the disqualification hearing was mailed to the Respondent's at the last known address.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) (formerly known as the Food Stamp program, is established by the Food Stamp Act of 1977, as amended, and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or Department), administers the FAP program pursuant to MCL 400.10, et seq., and MAC R 400.3001-3015. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), Reference Table Manual (RFT), and the Bridges Reference Manual (BRM).

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When a customer client group receives more benefits than they are entitled to receive, the Department must attempt to recoup the overissuance. BAM 700. A suspected intentional program violation means an overissuance where:

- the client intentionally failed to report information or intentionally gave incomplete or inaccurate information needed to make a correct benefit determination, and
- the client was clearly and correctly instructed regarding his or her reporting responsibilities, and
- the client has no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits his or her understanding or ability to fulfill their reporting responsibilities.

An intentional program violation is suspected when the client has intentionally withheld or misrepresented information for the purpose of establishing, maintaining, increasing, or preventing reduction of program benefits or eligibility. There must be clear and convincing evidence that the client acted intentionally for this purpose. BAM 720.

The Department's Office of Inspector General processes intentional program hearings for overissuances referred to them for investigation. The Office of Inspector General represents the Department during the hearing process. The Office of Inspector General requests intentional program hearings for cases when:

- benefit overissuances are not forwarded to the prosecutor.
- prosecution of welfare fraud is declined by the prosecutor for a reason other than lack of evidence, and
 - o the total overissuance amount is \$1000 or more, or
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- the total overissuance amount is less than \$1000, and
 - the group has a previous intentional program violation, or
 - the alleged IPV involves FAP trafficking, or
 - the alleged fraud involves concurrent receipt of assistance,
 - the alleged fraud is committed by a state/government employee.

A court or hearing decision that finds a client committed an intentional program violation disqualifies that client from receiving program benefits. A disqualified recipient remains a member of an active group as long as he lives with them. Other eligible group members may continue to receive benefits. BAM 720.

Clients that commit an intentional program violation are disqualified for a standard disqualification period except when a court orders a different period. Clients are disqualified for periods of one year for the first IPV, two years for the second IPV, lifetime disqualification for the third IPV, and ten years for a concurrent receipt of benefits. BAM 720.

This is the Respondent's first violation.

In this case, the Respondent intentionally failed to report income earned from May 11, 2006 through September 30, 2006. Respondent's signature on her FAP application on February 3, 2006, certifies that she was aware that fraudulently receiving Department assistance could result in criminal or civil or administrative claims. Because of Respondent's failure to report income, she received an overissuance and the Department is entitled to recoup

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The Department properly requested that the Respondent be disqualified from

participation in the FAP program for one year.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the clear and convincing evidence on the

whole record, decides the following:

- 1. Respondent committed a first intentional program violation of FAP.
- 2. The Department is entitled to recoup a FAP overissuance of
- 3. The Respondent is ordered to reimburse the Department for the overissuance.
- 4. The Respondent is disqualified from participation in FAP for one year.
