HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon claimant's request for a hearing to protest the denial of his application for Medical Assistance (MA-P) and retroactive Medical Assistance. After due notice, a hearing was held on March 31, 2010. Claimant was represented by [REDACTED].

ISSUE

Whether claimant meets the disability criteria for Medical Assistance and retroactive Medical Assistance program?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- 1) On April 17, 2009, claimant's authorized representative (A.R.) filed an application on claimant's behalf seeking MA-P benefits. The application requested MA-P retroactive to January of 2009.

- 2) On May 19, 2009, the department notified claimant of its denial of the April 17, 2009, application based upon the belief that claimant did not meet the requisite disability criteria. Notice of the denial was not sent to claimant's A.R.
- 3) On October 16, 2009, claimant's A.R. filed a hearing request to protest the department's denial of benefits.
- 4) Prior to the hearing, the Social Security Administration approved Retirement, Survivor's and Disability Insurance for Claimant with a disability onset date of June 28, 2007.
- 5) At the hearing, based upon the Social Security Administration award, the department agreed to initiate reconsideration of claimant's April 17, 2009, application for MA-P benefits.

#### CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Program Administrative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).


Because of the Social Security Administration determination, it is not necessary for the Administrative Law Judge to discuss the issue of disability. PEM, Item 260.

The department is required to initiate a determination of claimant's financial eligibility for the requested benefits, if not previously done.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that claimant meets the definition of medically disabled under the Medical Assistance program as of January of 2009.

Accordingly, the department is ordered to initiate a review of the April 17, 2009, application, if it has not already done so, to determine if all other non-medical eligibility criteria are met. The department shall inform claimant and his authorized representative of its determination in writing.
