HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, an in-person hearing was held on March 30, 2010. Claimant personally appeared and testified. She was assisted by

ISSUE

Did the department properly determine claimant's disability status for Medicaid (MA) and State Disability Assistance (SDA) eligibility purposes?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

(1) Claimant is a 58-year-old female who applied for disability-based MA/retro-MA/SDA on June 26, 2010.

(2) When the department denied that application claimant's authorized representative ([REDACTED]) filed a hearing request and claimant's in-person hearing was held on March 30, 2010.

(3) While claimant's appeal was pending, her authorized representative submitted proof that claimant was disabled by the Social Security Administration (SSA) through a Fully Favorable Decision issued on July 9, 2010.

(4) This Fully Favorable Decision establishes claimant is disabled and has been disabled since July 23, 2007, which was two years before her disputed application filing month.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Program Administrative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

The State Disability Assistance (SDA) program which provides financial assistance for disabled persons is established by 2004 PA 344. The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the SDA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MAC R 400.3151-400.3180. Department policies are found in the Program Administrative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

In Michigan, the SSA's determination of disability onset is binding for MA eligibility purposes. The same standard is applied in SDA cases. In the present case, evidence of the favorable SSA decision conclusively establishes claimant meets the federal disability standard necessary to qualify for MA/retro-MA/SDA, pursuant to BEM Items 150 and 260.

Claimant's authorized representative has shown claimant was determined disabled as of July 2007, almost two years before her disputed MA/retro-MA/SDA application was filed. Consequently, the department must reverse its erroneous denial and process claimant's disputed application in accordance with departmental policy.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides the department erred in determining claimant is not disabled.

Accordingly, the department's decision is REVERSED, and it is Ordered that:

(1) The department shall approve MA/retro-MA/SDA benefits for claimant as long as claimant is otherwise eligible to receive them.

(2) Departmental review of claimant's medical condition is not necessary as long as her SSA disability status continues.
