HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on July 20, 2010.

ISSUE

Was good cause for verification non compliance established?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- (1) Negative case action: SSI/MA termination on October 28, 2009, based on claimant no longer eligible for SSI per BEM 105, 111, 150, 260, and 271.
- (2) On October 28, 2009 a new application with a verification check-list was sent to the claimant with a return due-date by November 9, 2009; it was not submitted.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Program Administrative Manual (PAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (PEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

Facts above are undisputed.

The client might be unable to answer a question about himself or another person whose circumstances must be known. Allow the client at least 10 days (or other timeframe specified in policy) to obtain the needed information. PAM, Item 105, p. 5.

Good Cause----- A circumstance which is considered a valid reason for not complying with a requirement. PRG glossary, page 15.

The claimant testified that at or about the time of the DHS mailing above he was having surgeries and that was the reason for his verification noncompliance. But, there is nothing in the evidence to established that it was beyond his control to have timely compliance with verification requirements.

Therefore, this ALJ is persuaded by the preponderance of the evidence of record that verification noncompliance was established.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that good cause for verification noncompliance was not established.

Accordingly, MA termination/application denial is UPHELD.
