# HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to Michigan Compiled Laws (MCL) 400.9 and 400.37 and Claimant request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on February 9, 2011. Claimant appeared and testified.

## **ISSUE**

Whether Claimant is eligible for Child Development and Care (CDC) benefits?

# FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on competent, material, and substantial evidence in the record and on the entire record as a whole, finds as fact:

- 1. In 2010, Claimant received CDC benefits from DHS.
- 2. On September 25, 2010, Claimant's child care provider was terminated because she failed to complete the required DHS provider training course, "Great Start to Quality Orientation."
- 3. Claimant found a new child care provider.
- 4. The new provider has not yet attended Great Start Orientation.
- 5. On December 6, 2010, Claimant filed a Request for Hearing with DHS.

- 6. At the hearing on February 9, 2011, DHS agreed to provide CDC benefits to Claimant's new provider when he attends the Great Start Orientation course.
- 7. As a result of DHS' offer, Claimant testified she no longer wished to continue with the hearing.

#### CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

CDC was established by Titles IVA, IVE and XX of the U.S. Social Security Act, the U.S. Child Care and Development Block Grant of 1990, and the U.S. Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996. The program is implemented by Title 45 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Parts 98 and 99. DHS provides services to adults and children pursuant to MCL 400.14(1) and Michigan Administrative Code Rules 400.5001-400.5015. DHS' policies are contained in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Reference Tables (RFT). These manuals are available online at <a href="https://www.michigan.gov/dhs-manuals">www.michigan.gov/dhs-manuals</a>.

Under BAM Item 600, clients have the right to contest any DHS decision affecting eligibility or benefit levels whenever they believe the decision is illegal. DHS provides an Administrative Hearing to review the decision and determine if it is appropriate. DHS policy includes procedures to meet the minimal requirements for a fair hearing. Efforts to clarify and resolve the client's concerns start when DHS receives a hearing request and continue through the day of the hearing.

In this case, Claimant's child care providers never attended the DHS Great Start to Quality Orientation. At the hearing, DHS agreed to pay her new provider as of the date he attends Orientation. As a result of DHS' agreement, Claimant indicated she no longer wished to proceed with the administrative hearing.

As the parties have agreed to settle their differences, it is not necessary for the Administrative Law Judge to adjudicate any issues presented.

Therefore, following the agreement of the parties and based on the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, IT IS ORDERED that DHS will certify Claimant's child care provider as of the date he attends the Great Start to Quality Orientation. This will be accomplished pursuant to the settlement agreement of the parties, and in accordance with DHS policies and procedures.

## **DECISION AND ORDER**

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the above findings of fact and conclusions of law and the stipulated agreement of the parties, states IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that DHS shall certify Claimant's child care provider as of the date he completes the Great Start to Quality Orientation. This action shall be taken in accordance with all DHS policies and procedures.
