**HEARING DECISION**

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge upon pursuant to MCL 400. 9; MCL 400.37 upon Claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on February 7, 2011. The Claimant appeared and testified. [REDACTED], ES appeared on behalf of the Department.

**ISSUE**

Was the Department correct in determining Claimant's FAP benefits?

**FINDINGS OF FACT**

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- (1) Claimant was an ongoing recipient of FAP benefits.
- (2) Claimant's case was closed for failing to return verifications.
- (3) Claimant requested a hearing on September 10, 2010 regarding FAP benefits.
- (4) The parties reached an agreement, whereby the Department agreed to reissue FAP benefits for September 2010.

**CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**


The Food Assistance Program, formerly known as the Food Stamp (“FS”) program, is established by the Food Stamp Act of 1977, as amended, and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations (“CFR”). The Department of Human Services (“DHS”), formerly known as the Family Independence Agency, administers the FAP program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq* and MAC R 400.3001-3015. Departmental policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (“BAM”), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (“BEM”), and the Program Reference Manual (“PRM”).

Under Bridges Administrative Manual Item 600, clients have the right to contest any agency decision affecting eligibility or benefit levels whenever they believe the decision is illegal. The agency provides an Administrative Hearing to review the decision and determine if it is appropriate. Agency policy includes procedures to meet the minimal requirements for a fair hearing. Efforts to clarify and resolve the client’s concerns start when the agency receives a hearing request and continues through the day of the hearing.

In the present case, the parties reached an agreement, whereby the Department agreed to reissue Claimant’s FAP benefits for September 2010. Since the Claimant and the Department have come to an agreement it is unnecessary for this Administrative Law Judge to make a decision regarding the facts and issues in this case.

**DECISION AND ORDER**

The Department and Claimant have come to a settlement regarding Claimant’s request for a hearing. Therefore, it is ORDERED that the Department reissue FAP benefits for September 2010, in accordance with this settlement agreement.
