HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to Michigan Compiled Laws (MCL) 400.9 and 400.37, and Claimant hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on May 25, 2011. Claimant appeared and testified at the hearing.

appeared and testified on behalf of the Department of Human Services (DHS).

ISSUE

Whether DHS terminated Claimant's Food Assistance Program (FAP) benefits in accordance with DHS policies and procedures?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on competent, material, and substantial evidence in the record and on the entire record as a whole, finds as fact:

- 1. In 2010, DHS provided FAP benefits to Claimant.
- 2. In February 2011, Claimant became employed.
- 3. On March 22, 2011, Claimant was laid off from work.
- 4. On April 15, 2011, DHS issued a Notice of Case Action terminating Claimant's FAP benefits effective May 1, 2011.
- 5. On April 25, 2011, Claimant filed a Request for a Hearing with DHS.

- 6. At the Administrative Hearing on May 25, 2011, DHS offered to reinstate and recalculate Claimant's FAP benefits from May 1, 2011, to the present, based on her loss of work on March 22, 2011, and pay Claimant appropriate supplemental retroactive benefits.
- 7. Claimant accepted this offer and testified she no longer wished to continue the Administrative Hearing.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

FAP was established by the United States Food Stamp Act of 1977 and is implemented by federal regulations contained in Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations. DHS administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10 *et seq.* and Michigan Administrative Code Rules 400.3001-3015. DHS' policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Reference Tables (RFT). These manuals are available online at www.michigan.gov/dhs-manuals.

BAM, BEM and RFT are the policies and procedures DHS officially created for its own use. While the DHS manuals are not laws created by the U.S. Congress or the Michigan Legislature, they constitute legal authority which DHS must follow. It is to the manuals that I look now in order to see what policy applies in this case. After setting forth what the applicable policy is, I will examine whether it was in fact followed in this case.

Under BAM Item 600, clients have the right to contest any DHS decision affecting eligibility or benefit levels whenever they believe the decision is illegal. DHS provides an Administrative Hearing to review the decision and determine if it is appropriate. DHS policy includes procedures to meet the minimal requirements for a fair hearing. Efforts to clarify and resolve the client's concerns start when DHS receives a hearing request and continue through the day of the hearing.

In this case, the parties stipulated to a settlement agreement whereby DHS will reinstate Claimant's FAP benefits from May 1, 2011, to the present and provide Claimant with any supplemental benefits to which she is entitled. As the parties have reached an agreement, it is not necessary for the Administrative Law Judge to decide the issue presented in this case.

In conclusion, based on all of the findings of fact and conclusions of law and the stipulated agreement of the parties, I HEREBY ORDER that DHS shall reinstate Claimant's FAP benefits from May 1, 2011, to the present and provide any adjustments to Claimant to which she is entitled.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the above findings of fact and conclusions of law and the settlement agreement of the parties, orders the following settlement in this case: IT IS ORDERED that DHS shall reinstate Claimant's FAP benefits from May 1, 2011, to the present and provide retroactive supplemental FAP benefits as appropriate. All steps shall be taken in accordance with DHS policies and procedures.

IT IS SO ORDERED.

The Claimant may appeal the Decision and Order to Circuit Court within 30 days of the receipt of the Decision and Order or, if a timely request for rehearing was made, within 30 days of the receipt date of the rehearing decision.
