HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon the Claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on September 8, 2011. The Claimant appeared and testified. The Department was represented by [REDACTED].

ISSUE

Was the Department correct in denying Claimant's MA-P and SDA applications?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. Claimant applied for MA-P, retro MA, and SDA on October 22, 2010.
2. The Medical Review Team denied the application on March, 2011.
3. Claimant filed a request for hearing on June 10, 2011 regarding the MA and SDA denials.
4. A hearing was held on September 8, 2011.
5. On July 5, 2011 the State Hearing Review Team denied the application because the Claimant retains the capacity to perform a wide range of simple and repetitive work.
6. Claimant is 5' 6" tall and weighs 240 pounds.
7. Claimant is [REDACTED] of age.

8. Claimant's impairments have been medically diagnosed as diabetes, anxiety, panic disorder, post traumatic stress disorder, hypertension and depression.
9. Claimant has the following symptoms: dizziness, insomnia, fatigue, memory problems, difficulty concentrating, low self esteem, insomnia, anxiety, feelings of worthlessness, auditory hallucinations, paranoia, suicidal thoughts, social isolation, flashbacks, and crying spells.
10. Claimant completed high school and some college in Russia.
11. Claimant is able to read, write, and perform basic math skills.
12. Claimant lives with her sister.
13. Claimant testified that he cannot perform household chores.
14. The Claimant's limitations have lasted or expected to last for 12 months or more.
15. Claimant takes the following prescribed medications
 - a. Metformin
 - b. Lisinipril
 - c. Cymbalta
 - d. Quantic
16. In a psychological evaluation dated October 25, 2011 Claimant was found to have a GAF score of 55. With a diagnosis of Major Depression, Generalized Anxiety Disorder, Panic Disorder, PTSD.
17. In June 2008 Claimant was found to have a GAF score of 51 by a consulting psychiatrist. This consulting psychiatrist also found that her depression was too severe to manage her own funds.
18. In July 2007 Claimant was found to have a GAF score of 52 by a consulting psychiatrist.
19. Claimant's treating physician Dr. Trinh Nguyen stated on a residual functional capacity assessment dated September 24, 2010 that Claimant is likely to be absent from work as a result of her impairments "more than 4 times a month" and that "Her mental status is very unstable".

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The regulations governing the hearing and appeal process for applicants and recipients of public assistance in Michigan are found in the Michigan Administrative Code, MAC R 400.901-400.951. An opportunity for a hearing shall be granted to an applicant who requests a hearing because his or her claim for assistance has been denied. MAC R 400.903(1). Clients have the right to contest a department decision affecting eligibility or benefit levels whenever it is believed that the decision is incorrect. The department will provide an administrative hearing to review the decision and determine the appropriateness of that decision. BAM 600.

The Medical Assistance (MA-P) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department administers the MA-P program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

The Department conforms to state statute in administering the SDA program.

2000 PA 294, Sec. 604, of the statute states:

Sec. 604. (1) The department shall operate a state disability assistance program. Except as provided in subsection (3), persons eligible for this program shall include needy citizens of the United States or aliens exempted from the supplemental security income citizenship requirement who are at least 18 years of age or emancipated minors meeting 1 or more of the following requirements:

- (a) A recipient of supplemental security income, social security, or medical assistance due to disability or 65 years of age or older.
- (b) A person with a physical or mental impairment which meets federal supplemental security income disability standards, except that the minimum duration of the disability shall be 90 days. Substance abuse alone is not defined as a basis for eligibility.

Pursuant to Federal Rule 42 CFR 435.540, the Department uses the Federal Supplemental Security Income (SSI) policy in determining eligibility for disability under the MA-P program. Under SSI, disability is defined as:

...the inability to do any substantial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment which can be expected to result in death or which has lasted

or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months.... 20 CFR 416.905.

A set order is used to determine disability. Current work activity, severity of impairments, residual functional capacity, past work, age, or education and work experience are reviewed. If there is a finding that an individual is disabled or not disabled at any point in the review, there will be no further evaluation. 20 CFR 416.920.

Medical evidence may contain medical opinions. Medical opinions are statements from physicians and psychologists or other acceptable medical sources that reflect judgments about the nature and severity of the impairment(s), including symptoms, diagnosis and prognosis, what an individual can do despite impairment(s), and the physical or mental restrictions. 20 CFR 416.927(a)(2).

The Administrative Law Judge is responsible for making the determination or decision about whether the statutory definition of disability is met. The Administrative Law Judge reviews all medical findings and other evidence that support a medical source's statement of disability. 20 CFR 416.927(e).

For mental disorders, severity is assessed in terms of the functional limitations imposed by the impairment. Functional limitations are assessed using the criteria in paragraph (B) of the listings for mental disorders (descriptions of restrictions of activities of daily living, social functioning; concentration, persistence or pace; and ability to tolerate increased mental demands associated with competitive work). 20 CFR, Part 404, Subpart P, Appendix 1, 12.00(C).

In this case, this Administrative Law Judge finds that Claimant may be considered presently disabled at the third step. Claimant meets listing 12.04 or its equivalent. This Administrative Law Judge will not continue through the remaining steps of the assessment. Claimant's testimony and the medical documentation support the finding that Claimant meets the requirements of the listing. Claimant has other significant health problems that were not fully addressed in this decision because Claimant is found to meet a listing for a different impairment.

Therefore, Claimant is found to be disabled.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that Claimant is medically disabled as of July 2010.

Accordingly, the Department's decision is hereby REVERSED and the Department is ORDERED to initiate a review of the application for MA, retro MA and SDA dated October 22, 2010, if not done previously, to determine Claimant's non-medical eligibility. The Department shall inform Claimant of the determination in writing. A review of this case shall be set for September 2012.
