CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance Program is established pursuant to Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). It is administered in accordance with state statute, the Social Welfare Act, the Administrative Code, and the State Plan under Title XIX of the Social Security Act Medical Assistance Program.

1.10 PRIOR AUTHORIZATION

Medicaid requires prior authorization (PA) to cover certain services before those services are rendered to the beneficiary. The purpose of PA is to review the medical need for certain services.

MDCH Medicaid Provider Manual, Practitioner Section, April 1, 2011, page 4.

The issue in this case is whether the Department properly denied the Appellant's May 11, 2011, prior authorization request for a lower partial denture. *MDCH Medicaid Provider Manual, Dental Section, April 1, 2011, pages 17-18,* outlines coverage for dentures:

6.6 PROSTHODONTICS (REMOVABLE)

6.6.A. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

Complete and partial dentures are benefits for all beneficiaries. All dentures require PA. Providers must assess the beneficiary's general oral health and provide a five-year prognosis for the prosthesis requested. An upper partial denture PA request must also include the prognosis of six sound teeth.

Complete or partial dentures are authorized:

- If there is one or more anterior teeth missing;
- If there are less than eight posterior teeth in occlusion (fixed bridges and dentures are to be considered occluding teeth); or
- Where an existing complete or partial denture cannot be made serviceable through repair, relining, adjustment, or duplicating (rebasing) procedures. If a partial denture can be made serviceable, the dentist

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should provide the needed restorations to maintain use of the existing partial, extract teeth, add teeth to an existing partial, and remove hyperplastic tissue.

Before final impressions are taken and any construction begun on a complete or partial denture, healing adequate to support a prosthesis must take place following the completion of extractions or surgical procedures. This includes the posterior ridges of any immediate denture. An exception is made for the six anterior teeth (cuspid to cuspid) only when an immediate denture is authorized.

Reimbursement for a complete or partial denture includes all necessary adjustments, relines, repairs, and duplications within six months of insertion. This includes such services for an immediate upper denture when authorized.

If a complete or partial denture requires an adjustment, reline, repair, or duplication within six months of insertion, but the services were not provided until after six months of insertion, no additional reimbursement is allowed for these services.

Complete or partial dentures are not authorized when:

- A previous prosthesis has been provided within five years, whether or not the existing denture was obtained through Medicaid.
- An adjustment, reline, repair, or duplication will make them serviceable.
- Replacement of a complete or partial denture that has been lost or broken beyond repair is not a benefit within five years, whether or not the existing denture was obtained through Medicaid.

Medicaid Provider Manual, Dental Section, Version date April 1, 2011 Pages 17-18. (emphasis added by ALJ)

The Department introduced evidence that the Appellant will have 8 posterior, or back, teeth in occlusion once the approved upper partial denture is placed, based on the information provided by the Appellant's dentist. (Exhibit 1, page 3) The Dental Section Manager testified that this was the reason the prior authorization request for the lower partial denture was denied, in accordance with the policy outlined in the Dental Section of the Department's Medicaid Provider Manual.

The Appellant testified that she understood the decision upon reviewing the Department's hearing packet. However, she indicated that the upper partial denture is almost useless due to the missing lower teeth. She stated that she can not chew properly as food goes into the spaces where the lower teeth are missing. She explained that she has a problem biting down when eating candy or nuts causing raw spots in the open spaces and that her bottom teeth are turning toward the front. (Appellant Testimony)

The Department provided sufficient evidence that this is the initial placement of the prosthesis; the Appellant will have at least eight posterior teeth in occlusion once the approved upper partial denture is placed and she will not be missing any anterior teeth. (Exhibit 1, page 5) Therefore, the Department's denial of the prior authorization request for the lower partial denture is upheld based on the submitted information.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that the Department properly denied the Appellant's request for prior authorization for a lower partial denture based on the available information.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that:

The Department's decision is AFFIRMED.
