HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon the Claimant 's request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on March 28, 2011. Claimant appeared and testified. The Department was represented by

ISSUE

Was the Department correct in denying Claimant's applic ation for Medical Assistance (MA), including the Adult Medical Program (AMP) ?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon t he competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- 1. Claimant applied for MA on October 4, 2010.
- 2. Claimant was not blind, disabled, pregnant, a caretaker, or a refugee and she did not meet the age requirements for MA programs other than AMP.
- 3. Claimant received unemployment monthly income of \$1,088.00.
- 4. The Department denied Claimant's appl ication for AMP on October 9, 2010 due to excess income.
- 5. Claimant requested a hearing on the denial on October 29, 2010.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Adult Medical Program (AMP) is established by Title XXI of the Social Security Act; (1115)(a)(1) of the Social Security Act, and is administered by the Department of Human Services (formerly known as the Family Independenc e Agency) pursuant to MCL 400.10 *et seq*. Department policies are contained in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Program Reference e Manual (PRM,) which includes the Reference Tables (RFT.)

BEM 640 dictates that income eligibility is met when t he net income does not exceed the AMP income limit. BEM 64 0, p. 3 Cer tain deductions are taken for ear nings and court-ordered support. BEM 640, p. 4. RFT 236 shows the AMP monthly income limit for an individual to be \$316.00.

There are MA categories for clients who are:

- •• Age 65 or older, blind, or disabled.
- •• Pregnant or recently pregnant.
- •• Caretaker relatives of dependent children.
- •• Under age 21.
- •• Refugees.
- BEM 640, p. 1

In the present case, Claimant's unemployment income did not qualify for the deductions described above. Clai mant's net income of \$1,088. 00 exceeds the income limit of \$316.00. The Department w as therefore correct in its denial of Claim ant's AM P application. Claimant did not qualify for an y other program of m edical assistance, as she was not disabled, blind, pregnant, a care taker, or a refugee and she did not meet the age requirement s. Claimant testified credibly that she is in need of medical assistance. Howev er, Department policy did not afford assistance to Claimant at the time of her application. Claimant ma y reapply for medical assistance if he r circumstances change.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon t he above findings of fact and conclusion s of law finds that the Department's decision to deny Claimant's MA/AMP application was

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correct and it is ORDERED that the Department's decision is therefore AFFIRMED.
