# **HEARING DECISION**

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon the claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on Tuesday, December 20, 2011. Claimant personally appeared and testified on his behalf.

## ISSUE

Did claimant, on date of application, establish a severe physical impairment that had lasted or was expected to last for a one year **continuous** duration?

## FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- On April 28, 2011, claimant's last employment ended due to multiple stab wounds.
- On April 28, 2011, claimant alleges he became disabled to do any work due to multiple stab wounds of the back with a penetrating injury to the abdomen, penetrating trauma to the chest with a bleeding from the intra vessel, apparent trauma to the diaphragm and hypotensive shock (Medical Packet, Page 19).
- Medical exam on May 2, 2011, states the claimant denies any new complaints and resting quietly in bed with no apparent distress; and he is without any apparent respiratory distress (Medical Packet, Page 56).

- 4. On May 17, 2011, claimant applied for Medicaid; he was age 36, with a 12 grade education, and work experience as an semi-skilled spray painter and body repair of cars.
- 5. On June 17, 2011, claimant's MA-P application was denied per BEM 260 with a hearing request on September 23, 2011.
- 6. Medical exam on August 3, 2011, states that the claimant was stabbed 19 times on April 28, 2011 with a knife by two men; that he was stabbed in the back, side and face; that he lost consciousness and had cardiac arrest twice; that he was hospitalized for 10 days; that he was on a ventilator for 5 days in ICU and had emergency surgery on the right chest wall; that he also had part of his right lung removed; that he also has a stab wound in his right kidney, and that he has paralysis of the right diaphragm as well (Medical Packet, Page 72).

# **CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Program Administrative Manual (BAM), the Program Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

Facts above are undisputed.

"Disability" is:

...the inability to do any substantial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment which can be expected to result in death or which has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months.... 20 CFR 416.905.

...We follow a set order to determine whether you are disabled. We review any current work activity, the severity of your impairment(s), your residual functional capacity, your past work, and your age, education and work experience. If we can find that you are disabled or not disabled at any point in the review, we do not review your claim further.... 20 CFR 416.920.

The burden of proof is on the claimant to establish disability by the preponderance of the evidence of record in accordance with the 5 step process below. ...20 CFR 460.912(a).

When determining disability, the federal regulations require that several considerations be analyzed in sequential order. If disability can be ruled out at any step, analysis of the next step is <u>not</u> required. These steps are:

- 1. Does the client perform Substantial Gainful Activity (SGA)? If yes, the client is ineligible for MA. If no, the analysis continues to Step 2. 20 CFR 416.920(b).
- 2. Does the client have a severe impairment that has lasted or is expected to last 12 months or more or result in death? If no, the client is ineligible for MA. If yes, the analysis continues to Step 3. 20 CFR 416.920(c).
- 3. Does the impairment appear on a special listing of impairments or are the client's symptoms, signs, and laboratory findings at least equivalent in severity to the set of medical findings specified for the listed impairment? If no, the analysis continues to Step 4. If yes, MA is approved. 20 CFR 416.290(d).
- 4. Can the client do the former work that he/she performed within the last 15 years? If yes, the client is ineligible for MA. If no, the analysis continues to Step 5. 20 CFR 416.920(e).
- 5. Does the client have the Residual Functional Capacity (RFC) to perform other work according to the guidelines set forth at 20 CFR 404, Subpart P, Appendix 2, Sections 200.00-204.00? If yes, the analysis ends and the client is ineligible for MA. If no, MA is approved. 20 CFR 416.920(f).

At Step 1, disability is not denied. The evidence of record establishes that the claimant was not engaged in substantial gainful work on date of application, nor currently.

At Step 2, disability is denied. The medical evidence of record, on date of application, establishes the claimant's significant inability to perform basic physical work, as defined below, but not for one year **continuous** duration, as defined below.

### **Severe Impairment**

...If you do not have any impairment or combination of impairments which significantly limits your physical or mental ability to do basic work activities, we will find that you do not have a severe impairment and are, therefore, not disabled.

We will not consider your age, education, and work experience. 20 CFR 416.920(c).

**Non-severe impairment(s)**. An impairment or combination of impairments is not severe if it does not significantly limit your physical or mental ability to do basic work activities. 20 CFR 416.921(a).

**Basic work activities.** When we talk about basic work activities, we mean the abilities and aptitudes necessary to do most jobs. Examples of these include --

- Physical functions such as walking, standing, sitting, lifting, pushing, pulling, reaching, carrying, or handling;
- 2. Capacities for seeing, hearing, and speaking;
- 3. Understanding, carrying out, and remembering simple instructions;
- 4. Use of judgment;
- 5. Responding appropriately to supervision, co-workers and usual work situations; and
- 7. Dealing with changes in a routine work setting. 20 CFR 416.921(b).

## **Duration of Severe Impairment**

You cannot be determined disabled without medically establishing the duration requirement, as defined below.

...[The impairment]...must have lasted or must be expected to last for a continuous period of at least 12 months. We call this the duration requirement. 20 CFR 416.909.

The medical evidence of record, on date of application, does not establish a severe physical impairment that had lasted or was expected to last for a one year **continuous** duration.

Therefore, disability has not been established at Step 2, as defined above by the competent, material and substantial material on the whole record.

# **DECISION AND ORDER**

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that disability was not medically established

Accordingly, Medicaid denial is UPHELD.
