# **HEARING DECISION**

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a hearing was held on February 23, 2012, by teleconference from Detroit, Michigan.

#### <u>ISSUE</u>

Was the denial of claimant's application for Medical Assistance program (MA-P), State Disability Assistance (SDA) and retroactive MA-P benefits for lack of disability correct?

## FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- 1. Claimant applied for MA-P, SDA, and retroactive MA-P on September 15, 2011.
- 2. On November 21, 2011, the Medical Review Team denied MA-P, SDA, and retroactive MA-P.
- 3. On December 5, 2011, claimant filed for a hearing.
- 4. On January 19, 2012, the State Hearing Review Team denied MA-P, SDA, and retroactive MA-P.
- 5. On February 23, 2012, a hearing was held before the Administrative Law Judge.

- 6. The Social Security Administration issued a decision in claimant's case, finding disability for the purpose of securing SSI/RSDI income.
- 7. The Social Security Administration gave claimant a disability onset date of April 2, 2009.

## CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Bridges Reference Manual (BRM).

The State Disability Assistance (SDA) program which provides financial assistance for disabled persons is established by 2004 PA 344. The Department of Human Services (Department) administers the SDA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MAC R 400.3151-400.3180. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Bridges Reference Manual (BRM).

Department policy at BEM 260 states that if a claimant has been found eligible for either SSI or RSDI based upon a finding of disability, the person meets the Department's MA disability criteria. No other evidence is required to establish disability. In the present case, claimant was found by the Social Security Administration to be eligible for SSI benefits based upon disability, and has presented *prima facie* evidence of the same. This disability was found by the Social Security Administration to have an onset date of April 2, 2009. Claimant is eligible for retro MA for the 1<sup>st</sup> day of the third month prior to eligibility. BAM 115. Therefore, the Administrative Law Judge finds that claimant met the Department's definition of disabled for the purposes of MA-P as of April 2, 2009.

As claimant has met the standards for disability for the MA-P program, claimant meets the standards for disability for the SDA program as well.

## DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that claimant is medically disabled for the purposes of the MA programs from the date of April 2, 2009, pending a review of all non-medical eligibility factors.

Accordingly, the Department's decision in the above-stated matter is, hereby, REVERSED.

1. The Department is ORDERED to process the MA-P application of September 15, 2011, retroactive to the date of application, and initiate a review of all non-medical eligibility factors, if it has not already done so.

2. The Department is further ORDERED to initiate a full review of this case in March, 2013.

**NOTICE:** Michigan Administrative Hearing System (MAHS) may order a rehearing or reconsideration on either its own motion or at the request of a party within 30 days of the mailing date of this Decision and Order. MAHS will not order a rehearing or reconsideration on the Department's motion where the final decision cannot be implemented within 90 days of the filing of the original request. (60 days for FAP cases)

The claimant may appeal the Decision and Order to Circuit Court within 30 days of the receipt of the Decision and Order or, if a timely request for rehearing was made, within 30 days of the receipt date of the rehearing decision.

Claimant may request a rehearing or reconsideration for the following reasons:

- A rehearing <u>MAY</u> be granted if there is newly discovered evidence that could affect the outcome
  of the original hearing decision.
- A reconsideration MAY be granted for any of the following reasons:
  - misapplication of manual policy or law in the hearing decision,
  - typographical errors, mathematical error, or other obvious errors in the hearing decision that effect the substantial rights of the claimant:
  - the failure of the ALJ to address other relevant issues in the hearing decision.
