At the time of the application, Claimant had an authorized representative (AR). After an examination of the evidence, the undersigned holds that the Department has failed to prove that the AR was provided with a copy of the verification checklist, as is required by BAM 105. While the checklist does note in the additional needed documentation page there is no evidence that the Department actually sent a copy to the AR. The Department representative testified to what would usually happen with regards to sending documents, but was not able to testify as to whether the checklist was sent to the AR in this particular circumstance.

Therefore, as the Department did not prove that Claimant's AR had received a verification checklist, the undersigned must hold that a checklist was not sent to the AR, and the application was denied without allowing Claimant a reasonable opportunity to provide verification. As such, the denial in this case must be reversed and the application in question reprocessed.

Based upon the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons

NOTICE: Michigan Administrative Hearing System (MAHS) may order a rehearing or reconsideration on either its own motion or at the request of a party within 30 days of the mailing date of this Decision and Order. MAHS will not order a rehearing or reconsideration on the Department's motion where the final decision cannot be implemented within 90 days of the filing of the original request. (60 days for FAP cases)

The Claimant may appeal the Decision and Order to Circuit Court within 30 days of the receipt of the Decision and Order or, if a timely request for rehearing was made, within 30 days of the receipt date of the rehearing decision.

Claimant may request a rehearing or reconsideration for the following reasons:

- A rehearing <u>MAY</u> be granted if there is newly discovered evidence that could affect the outcome
 of the original hearing decision.
- A reconsideration **MAY** be granted for any of the following reasons:
- misapplication of manual policy or law in the hearing decision,
- typographical errors, mathematical error, or other obvious errors in the hearing decision that effect the substantial rights of the claimant;
- · the failure of the ALJ to address other relevant issues in the hearing decision
