DECISION AND ORDER

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon the Appellant's request for a hearing.

After due notice, a telephone hearing was held Tuesday, ██████████. Appellant, ██████████, appeared and testified on her own behalf.

██████████, Fair Hearing Officer, ██████████ County Community Mental Health Authority (CMH), represented the Department. ██████████, Psychiatrist, ██████████ Access Center, appeared as a witness for the Department.

ISSUE

Does the Appellant meet the medical necessity or eligibility requirements for Medicaid Specialty Supports and Services through CMH?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. The Appellant is a ██████ year-old female, born ██████████. (Exhibit 3, p 2).
2. CMH is a contractor of the Michigan Department of Community Mental Health (MDCH) pursuant to a contract between these entities.
3. CMH is required to provide Medicaid covered services to Medicaid eligible clients it serves.

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4. Appellant was screened for mental health services through the [REDACTED] Access Center on [REDACTED]. Based on the screening, it was determined that Appellant was not eligible for Medicaid Specialty Supports and Services through CMH because she did not meet the eligibility criteria as someone with a serious mental illness or developmental disability. (Exhibit 3, pp 2-11).
5. On [REDACTED], CMH sent Appellant an adequate action notice that Appellant did not meet eligibility criteria for the services requested and that her request was denied. The notice informed Appellant of her right to a fair hearing. (Exhibit 3, p 1).
6. On [REDACTED], Appellant requested a local appeal and a second opinion review was conducted. The second opinion review upheld the decision of the previous screening that Appellant was not eligible for Medicaid services. (Exhibit 3, p 12-17).
7. On [REDACTED], the Michigan Administrative Hearing System (MAHS) received the Appellant's request for an Administrative Hearing. (Exhibit 4).

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance Program is established pursuant to Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). It is administered in accordance with state statute, the Social Welfare Act, the Administrative Code, and the State Plan under Title XIX of the Social Security Act Medical Assistance Program.

Title XIX of the Social Security Act, enacted in 1965, authorizes Federal grants to States for medical assistance to low-income persons who are age 65 or over, blind, disabled, or members of families with dependent children or qualified pregnant women or children. The program is jointly financed by the Federal and State governments and administered by States. Within broad Federal rules, each State decides eligible groups, types and range of services, payment levels for services, and administrative and operating procedures. Payments for services are made directly by the State to the individuals or entities that furnish the services.

42 CFR 430.0

The State Plan is a comprehensive written statement submitted by the agency describing the nature and scope of its Medicaid program and giving assurance that it will be administered in conformity with the specific requirements of title XIX, the regulations in this Chapter IV, and other applicable official issuances of the Department. The State plan contains all

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information necessary for CMS to determine whether the plan can be approved to serve as a basis for Federal financial participation (FFP) in the State program.

42 CFR 430.10

Section 1915(b) of the Social Security Act provides:

The Secretary, to the extent he finds it to be cost-effective and efficient and not inconsistent with the purposes of this subchapter, may waive such requirements of section 1396a of this title (other than subsection (s) of this section) (other than sections 1396a(a)(15), 1396a(bb), and 1396a(a)(10)(A) of this title insofar as it requires provision of the care and services described in section 1396d(a)(2)(C) of this title) as may be necessary for a State—

Under approval from the Center for Medicaid and Medicaid Services (CMS) the Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH) operates a section 1915(b) waiver called the Medicaid Managed Specialty Services and Support program waiver. CMH contracts with the MDCH to provide services under the Managed Specialty Service and Supports Waiver and other State Medicaid Plan covered services. CMH must offer, either directly or under contract, a comprehensive array of services, as specified in Section 206 of the Michigan Mental Health Code, Public Act 258 of 1974, amended, and those services/supports included as part of the contract between the Department and CMH.

The *MDCH/CMHSP Managed Specialty Supports and Services Contract, Sections 2.0 and 3.1* and Exhibit 3.1.1, Section III(a) Access Standards-10/1/08, page 4, directs a CMH to the Department's Medicaid Provider Manual for determining coverage eligibility for Medicaid mental health beneficiaries.

The Department's *Medicaid Provider Manual, Mental Health and Substance Abuse, Beneficiary Eligibility, Section 1.6* makes the distinction between the CMH responsibility and the Medicaid Health Plan (MHP) responsibility for Medicaid outpatient mental health benefits. The Medicaid Provider Manual sets out the eligibility requirements as:

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<p>care/daily living skills, social/interpersonal relations, educational/vocational role performance, etc.) and minimal clinical (self/other harm risk) instability.</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> The beneficiary was formerly significantly or seriously mentally ill at some point in the past. Signs and symptoms of the former serious disorder have substantially moderated or remitted and prominent functional disabilities or impairments related to the condition have largely subsided (there has been no serious exacerbation of the condition within the last 12 months). The beneficiary currently needs ongoing routine medication management without further specialized services and supports.</p>	<p>perform daily living activities (or for minors, substantial interference in achievement or maintenance of developmentally appropriate social, behavioral, cognitive, communicative or adaptive skills).</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> The beneficiary does not have a current or recent (within the last 12 months) serious condition but was formerly seriously impaired in the past. Clinically significant residual symptoms and impairments exist and the beneficiary requires specialized services and supports to address residual symptomatology and/or functional impairments, promote recovery and/or prevent relapse.</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> The beneficiary has been treated by the MHP for mild/moderate symptomatology and temporary or limited functional impairments and has exhausted the 20-visit maximum for the calendar year. (Exhausting the 20-visit maximum is not necessary prior to referring complex cases to PIHP/CMHSP.) The MHP's mental health consultant and the PIHP/CMHSP medical director concur that additional treatment through the PIHP/CMHSP is medically necessary and can reasonably be expected to achieve the intended purpose (i.e., improvement in the beneficiary's condition) of the additional treatment.</p>

[REDACTED], Psychiatrist at [REDACTED] Access Center, testified that she reviewed Appellant's access screening and determined, based on the information contained therein, that Appellant did not qualify for mental health services through CMH. [REDACTED] testified that Appellant denied any developmental disability and that her functional limitations were in the mild range. [REDACTED] indicated that Appellant had very few functional limitations, had no Axis I diagnosis, and had a GAF of 71, which put her in the moderately average range. [REDACTED] noted that while Appellant's judgment was rated as weak, she still was very functional.

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This Administrative Law Judge does not have jurisdiction to order the CMH to provide Medicaid covered services to a beneficiary who is not eligible for those services. This Administrative Law Judge determines that the Appellant is not eligible for CMH Medicaid covered services for the reasons discussed below.

The definition section contained in the Mental Health Code, specifically MCL 330.1100d(3), defines "Serious mental illness" as follows:

330.1100d Definitions; S to W.
Sec. 100d.

* * * *

(3) "Serious mental illness" means a diagnosable mental, behavioral, or emotional disorder affecting an adult that exists or has existed within the past year for a period of time sufficient to meet diagnostic criteria specified in the most recent diagnostic and statistical manual of mental disorders published by the American psychiatric association and approved by the department and that has resulted in functional impairment that substantially interferes with or limits 1 or more major life activities. Serious mental illness includes dementia with delusions, dementia with depressed mood, and dementia with behavioral disturbance but does not include any other dementia unless the dementia occurs in conjunction with another diagnosable serious mental illness. The following disorders also are included only if they occur in conjunction with another diagnosable serious mental illness:

(a) A substance abuse disorder.

(b) A developmental disorder.

(c) A "V" code in the diagnostic and statistical manual of mental disorders.

* * * *

Appellant testified that some of the information contained in the screening was incorrect because she did report that she had suicidal ideations in the past, that she was currently depressed, and that she does have Medicaid insurance coverage currently. Appellant indicated that the second opinion she requested should have been done by a doctor of her choice and that when she left Georgia, the court told her to get into treatment in Michigan.

[REDACTED], Fair Hearings Officer, testified that she offered Appellant the opportunity for an in-person evaluation at [REDACTED], but that Appellant chose to go forward with the

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hearing instead. [REDACTED] told Appellant on the record that if Appellant wanted an in-person evaluation she could contact Ms. Winchester to set one up.

In this case, the CMH applied the proper eligibility criteria to determine whether Appellant was eligible for Medicaid Covered mental health services and properly determined she is not. Appellant's test results showed she was not a person with a serious mental illness or a developmental disability and that she had no Axis I diagnosis. The results of the screening conducted by CMH demonstrated the Appellant had at most mild symptoms interfering with her ability to function within the community. Accordingly, Appellant does not meet the eligibility criteria for Medicaid Specialty Supports and Services through CMH.


DECISION AND ORDER

The CMH properly determined that the Appellant does not meet the eligibility requirements for Medicaid Specialty Supports and Services through CMH.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED THAT:

The Department's decision is AFFIRMED.

The Michigan Administrative Hearing System for the Department of Community Health may order a rehearing on either its own motion or at the request of a party within 30 days of the mailing date of this Decision and Order.
