HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon claimant's request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on January 3, 2013. The claimant personally appeared and provided testimony.

ISSUE

Did the department properly close the claimant's Food Assistance Program (FAP) benefits case for failure to return the requested verifications?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- The claimant was a recipient of FAP benefits.
- 2. On November 5, 2012, the department sent the claimant four employment verification forms, requesting verification of the claimant's employment ending. (Department Exhibits 15-18).
- 3. The department did not receive the requested verifications by the due date of November 15, 2012.
- On November 16, 2012, the department sent the claimant a notice of case action (DHS 1605) stating that her FAP benefits would be closing effective December 1, 2012 due to her failure to return the requested verifications. (Department Exhibits 12-14).
- 5. On November 20, 2012, the claimant filed a request for hearing, protesting the closure of her FAP case.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

As a preliminary matter, this case was initially scheduled as a hearing regarding FIP benefits as well as FAP. At the beginning of the hearing, the claimant testified that she did not wish to proceed forward regarding any issues pertaining to FIP benefits and that she only wished to address issues pertaining to FAP benefits. Accordingly, this Administrative Law Judge will proceed forward regarding the issue of FAP benefits only.

The regulations governing the hearing and appeal process for applicants and recipients of public assistance in Michigan are found in the Michigan Administrative Code, MAC R 400.901-400.951. An opportunity for a hearing shall be granted to an applicant who requests a hearing because his claim for assistance is denied. MAC R 400.903(1).

Clients have the right to contest a department decision affecting eligibility or benefit levels whenever it is believed that the decision is incorrect. The department will provide an administrative hearing to review the decision and determine the appropriateness. BAM 600.

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) (formerly known as the Food Stamp (FS) program) is established by the Food Stamp Act of 1977, as amended, and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the FAP program pursuant to MCL 400.10, et seq., and MAC R 400.3001-3015. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Bridges Reference Manual (BRM).

Claimants are required to comply with the local office to allow the department to determine initial or ongoing eligibility. BAM 105. The department informs the client what verification is required, how to obtain it, and the due date by using the Verification Checklist form (DHS-3503). BAM 130. Clients are provided ten days to return the verifications, but can request an extension of time to provide the verifications. BAM 130. If the time period to provide the verifications elapses and the verifications have not been provided, the department is directed to send a negative action notice. BAM 130.

Department policy states as follows:

Verifications

All Programs

Clients must take actions within their ability to obtain verifications. DHS staff must assist when necessary. See BAM 130 and BEM 702. BAM 105.

Assisting the Client

All Programs

The local office must assist clients who ask for help in completing forms (including the DCH-0733-D) or gathering verifications. Particular sensitivity must be shown to clients who are illiterate, disabled or **not** fluent in English. BAM 105.

Verification is usually required at application/redetermination **and** for a reported change affecting eligibility or benefit level. BAM 130.

Obtaining Verification

All Programs

Tell the client what verification is required, how to obtain it, and the due date (see "**Timeliness Standards**" in this item). Use the DHS-3503, Verification Checklist, or for MA redeterminations, the DHS-1175, MA Determination Notice, to request verification. BAM 130.

The client must obtain required verification, but you must assist if they need and request help.

If neither the client nor you can obtain verification despite a reasonable effort, use the best available information. If **no** evidence is available, use your best judgment. BAM 130.

Timeliness Standards

FIP, SDA, CDC, FAP

Allow the client 10 calendar days (**or** other time limit specified in policy) to provide the verification you request. BAM 130.

Exception: For CDC only, if the client cannot provide the verification despite a reasonable effort, extend the time limit at least once.

Verifications are considered to be timely if received by the date they are due. For electronically transmitted verifications (fax, email), the date of the transmission is the receipt date. Verifications that are submitted after the close of business hours through the drop box or by delivery of a DHS

representative are considered to be received the next business day.

Send a negative action notice when:

- . the client indicates refusal to provide a verification, or
- . the time period given has elapsed and the client has **not** made a reasonable effort to provide it. BAM 130.

Note: For FAP only, if the client contacts the department prior to the due date requesting an extension or assistance in obtaining verifications, you must assist them with the verifications but do not grant an extension. Explain to the client they will not be given an extension and their case will be denied once the VCL due date is passed. Also, explain their eligibility will be determined based on their compliance date if they return required verifications. Re-register the application if the client complies within 60 days of the application date; see BAM 115, Subsequent Processing. BAM 130.

In this case, the department requested verification from the claimant regarding her loss of employment. The claimant testified that she only worked at one job, but that job was showing up as three different company names; and Additionally, the department asked for verification of employment ending for The claimant testified that she never worked for University Green Apartments, and that said apartment complex is where she lives. The claimant testified that there was a misunderstanding regarding some of the paperwork that was submitted, and that she understood why the department would think that she worked at the apartments. This Administrative Law Judge does not find that the lack of verification should have lead to a closure as the claimant never worked from there. However, although there was some confusion as to the different companies noted above), the end result is that the requested verification was not received from any of the companies. Therefore, based on the information available at the time, this Administrative Law Judge determines that the department did act properly in accordance with policy in terminating the claimant's FAP benefits do to the lack of verifications.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that the department properly closed the claimant's case for FAP benefits.

Accordingly, the department's actions are **AFFIRMED**.

It is SO ORDERED.
