HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Admini strative Law Judge upon the Claimant's request for a hearing made pursuant to Mi chigan Compiled Laws 400.9 and 400.37, which gov ern the administrative hearing a nd appeal process. After due notice, a telephone hearing was commenced on May 8, 2013, from Lansing, Michigan. Claimant personally appeared and test ified. Participants on behalf of the Department of Human Services (Department) included Family Independence Manager

ISSUE

Did the Department of Hum an Services (the department) properly determine that Claimant was no longer disabled and deny his review application for Medical Assistance (MA-P) and State Disability Assistance (SDA) based upon medical improvement?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- (1) On September 20, 2011, SHRT approved Claimant for MA and SDA benefits based on Lis ting of Impairm ents 12.04 and 12.08. His MA/SDA case was scheduled for review in September, 2012. (Dept Ex. A, p 96).
- (2) According to department testimony at the hearing, on August 1, 2012, Claimant filed a redetermination for r MA/SDA benefits alleging continued disability.
- (3) On January 16, 2013, the Medica I Rev iew Team denied Claimant's application indicating Claimant retained the capacity to perform a wide range of simple, unskilled, light work. (Depart Ex. B, pp 1-2).

- (4) On Januar y 22, 2013, the department caseworker sent Claimant notice that his MA/SDA case would be closed beginning March 1, 2013.
- (5) On January 28, 2013, Claimant filed a request for a hearing to contest the department's negative action.
- (6) On February 14, 2013, the State Hearing Review Team denied Claimant's Redetermination indicating the medica I evidenc e of record indic ates Claimant retains the capacity to perform work activities that would not expose him to greater than concentrated levels of pulmonary irritants.
- (7) Claimant was receiving MA and SDA at the time of this review.
- (8) Claimant alleges his disabling im pairments are bipolar disorder, antisocial disorder, agoraphobia, a fu sed spine, bulging disc, fatigue, and muscle spasms.
- (9) Claimant is a 42-year-old man w hose birt h date is Claimant is 5'8" tall and weighs 286 pounds. Claimant completed four years of college. Claimant is able to read and write and does hav e basic math skills.
- (10) Claimant last worked in 2004 as a sand blaster.
- (11) At the time of the hearing, Claimant was appealing the denial of Social Security benefits.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is estab lished by Title XIX of the Social Sec urity Act and is implemented by T itle 42 of the C ode of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The State Disability A ssistance (SDA) program which provides financial assistance for disabled persons is established by 2004 PA 344. The Department of Human Service s (DHS or department) admin isters the SDA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and Mich Admin Code, Rules 400.3151-400.3180. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), th *e* Bridges Eligibilit y Manual (BEM) and the Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

Current legislative amendments to the Act delineate eligibility criteria as implemented by department policy set forth in program manual s. 2004 PA 344, Se c. 604, es tablishes the State Disability Assistance program. It reads in part:

Sec. 604 (1). The department sha II operate a state di sability assistance program. Except as provided in subsection (3), persons eligible for this program shall includ e needy citizens of the United States or aliens exempt from the Supplemental Security Income citizenship re quirement who are at least 18 years of age or emanc ipated minors meeting one or more of the following requirements:

(b) A per son with a physical or mental impairment whic h meets federal SSI disab ility standards, exce pt that the minimum duration of the dis ability shall be 90 days. Substance abuse alone is not defined as a basis for eligibility.

Specifically, this Act provides minimal cash assistance to individuals with some type of severe, temporary disability which prevents him or her from engaging in substantial gainful work activity for at least ninety (90) days.

Pursuant to the federal regulations at 20 CFR 416.9 94, once a client is determined eligible for disability benefits, the eligibality for such benefits must be reviewed periodically. Before determining that a client is no longer eligible for disability benefits, the agency must establish that there has been a medical improvement of the client's impairment that is related to the client's ability to work. 20 CFR 416.994(b)(5).

> To assure that disability reviews are carried out in a uniform manner, that a decision of continuing disability can be made in the most expeditious and administratively efficient way, and that a ny decisions to stop disability benefits are made objectively, neutrally, and are fully documented, we will follow specific steps in reviewing the question of whether your disability continues. Our review may cease an d benefits may be continued at any point if we determine there is sufficient evidence to find that you are still unable to engage in substantial gainful activity. 20 CFR 416.994(b)(5).

The first question asks:

 Are you engaging in subst antial gainful activity? If you are (and any applic able t rial work period has been completed), we will find disability to have ended (see paragraph (b)(3)(v) of this section).

Claimant is not disqualified from this step because he has not engaged in substantia I gainful activity at any time relevant to this matter. Furthermore, the evidence on the record fails to establish that Claimant has a severe impairment which meets or equals a

listed impairment found at 20 CFR 404, Subpart P, Appendix 1. Therefore, the analysis continues. 20 CF 416.994(b)(5)(ii).

The next step asks the question if there has been medical improvement.

Medical improvement is any decrease in the medical severity of your impairment(s) which was present at the time of the most recent favorable medical decision that you wer e disabled or continued to be di sabled. A determination that there has been a decrease in medical severity must be based on changes (improvement) in the symptoms, signs and/or laboratory findings associated with your impairment(s). 20 CFR 416.994(b)(1)(i).

If there is a decrease in medical severity as shown by the symptoms, signs and laborator y findings, we then must determine if it is related to your ability to do work. In paragraph (b)(1)(iv) of this section, we explain the relationship between medical severity and limitation on functional capacity to do basic work activities (or residual functional capacity) and how ch anges in medical severity can affect your residual functional capacity. In determining whether medical improvement that has occurred is related to your ability to do work, we will assess your residual functional capacity (in accordance with paragraph (b)(1)(iv)of this section) based on the current severity of the impairment(s) which was presen t at your last favorable medical decision. 20 CFR 416.994(b)(2)(ii).

The State Hearing Review Team upheld t he denial of MA and SDA benefits on the basis that Claimant retained the capacity t o perform a wide range of simple, unskilled, light work. Claimant was approved for MA and SDA benefits by the Medic al Review Team on September 20, 2011, based on I mpairment Listings 12.04 and 12.08, with a review scheduled for September, 2012.

Pursuant to the federal regulations, at medical review, the agency has the burden of not only proving Claimant's medi cal condition has improved, but that the improvement relates to the client's ability to do basic work activities. The agency has the burden of establishing that Claimant is currently capable of doing bas ic work activities based on objective medical evidence from qualified medical sources. 20 CFR 416.994(b)(5).

In this case, the agency has not met its burden of proof. The agency has provided no evidence that indicates Claimant's condition improved, much less that the improvement may be related to his ability to do basic work activities. Accordingly, the agency's MA/SDA eligibility determination cannot be upheld at this time.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon t he above findings of fact and conclusion s of law, decides that the dep artment erred in proposing to close Claimant's MA/SDA benefits based upon a finding of improvement at review.

Accordingly, the department's action is **REVERSED**, and this c ase is returned to the local office for benefit continuation as long as all oth er eligibility criteria are met, wit h Claimant's next man datory medical review scheduled in June, 2014 (unless h e is approved for Social Security disability benefits by that time).

It is SO ORDERED.

Claimant may request a rehearing or reconsideration for the following reasons:

- A rehearing <u>MAY</u> be granted if there is newly discovered evidence that could affect the outcome of the original hearing decision.
- A reconsideration **MAY** be granted for any of the following reasons:
 - misapplication of manual policy or law in the hearing decision,
 - typographical errors, mathematical erro r, or other obvious errors in the hearing decision that effect the substantial rights of the claimant:
 - the failure of the ALJ to address other relevant issues in the hearing decision.
