#### HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Admini strative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon claimant's request for a hearing. After due notic e, a telephone hearing was held on June 18, 2013. Claimant per sonally appeared and testified. Claimant was represented at the hearing by **Claimant's behalf**. The depar tment was represented at the hearing by Eligibility Specialist, **Claimant's behalf**.

#### <u>ISSUE</u>

Did the Department of Human Services (the department) properly deny claimant's application for Medical Assistance (MA-P)?

#### FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- 1. On May 2, 2012, claim ant filed an applic ation for Medical Assistance and Retroactive Medical Assistance benefits alleging disability.
- 2. On September 11, 2012, the Medical Review T eam denied claimant's application stating that claimant's impairments lacked duration.
- 3. On September 14, 2012, the department caseworker sent claimant notice that her application was denied.
- 4. On December 12, 2012, claimant f iled a request for a hearing to contest the department's negative action.
- 5. On February 15, 2013, the State Hearing Review Team again denie d claimant's application st ating in its ana lysis and recommendation: the medical evidence of record indicate s that the claimant's condition is improving/is expected to improve within 12 months from the date of onset

or from the date of surgery. It is reasonable that the claimant would be limited to performing tasks of a light exer tional nature. The claimant is not currently engaging in subst antial gainful activity based on the information that is available in file. The medical evidence of record indicates that the claimant's condition is improving/is expected to improve within 12 months from the date of onset or from the date of surger y. The medical evidence e of record i ndicates that the claimant retains the capacity to perform light exertional tasks. The claimant's past work was: post worker, 209.687-014, 4L. Therefore, the claimant retain s the c apacity to perform their past relevant work. MA-P is denied per 20CFR416.920 (e&f). Retroactive MA-P was considered in this case and is also denied. SDA was not applied for by the claimant but would hav e been denied per BEM 261 due to the capacity to perform past relevant work. Listing 1.02 was considered in this determination.

- 6. Claimant is a 58-year-old woman whose birth date is Claimant is 5'4" tall and weighs 130 pounds. Claimant is a high school graduate. Claimant is able to read and wr ite and does have basic math skills.
- 7. Claimant last worked in 2003 at the post office as a mail carrier from 1989-2003. Claimant has also worked as a bookkeeper at Claimant does receive **\$ 1000 per month in disability/retirement income** from the post office.
- 8. Claimant alleges as disabling impairments: hip replacement, arthritis in the left hip, chronic back and shoulder pain, panic disorder and depression.

## CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The regulations governing the hearing and appeal process for applicants and recipients of public assistance in Michigan are found in the Michigan Administrative Code, MAC R 400.901-400.951. An oppor tunity for a hearing shall be granted to an ap plicant who requests a hearing because his or her claim for assistance has been denied. MAC R 400.903(1). Clients h ave the right to contest a department decision affecting elig ibility or benefit levels whenever it is believed that the decision is incorrect. The department will provide an adm inistrative hearing to review the decision and determine the appropriateness of that decision. BAM 600.

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is estab lished by Title XIX of the Social Sec urity Act and is implemented by T itle 42 of the C ode of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

Pursuant to Federal Rule 42 CFR 435.540, the Department of Human Services uses the federal Supplemental Security Income (SSI) policy in determining eligibility for disability under the Medical Assistance program. Under SSI, disability is defined as:

...the inability to do any substant ial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment which can be expected to result in death or which has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months.... 20 CFR 416.905

A set order is used to deter mine disability . Current work activity, severity of impairments, residual functional capacity, past wor k, age, or education and work experience is reviewed. If there is a finding that an individual is disabled or not disabled at any point in the review, there will be no further evaluation. 20 CFR 416.920.

If an individual is working and the work is substantial gainful activity, the individual is not disabled regardless of the medical condition, education and work experienc e. 20 CFR 416.920(c).

If the impairment or combination of impair ments do not signific antly limit physical or mental ability to do basic work activities, it is not a severe impairment(s) and disab ility does not exist. Age, education and work ex perience will not be c onsidered. 20 CFR 416.920.

Statements about pain or other symptoms do not alone establish disability. There must be medical signs and laboratory findings wh ich demonstrate a medical im pairment.... 20 CFR 416.929(a).

...Medical reports should include –

- (1) Medical history.
- (2) Clinical findings (such as the results of physical or mental status examinations);
- (3) Laboratory findings (such as blood press ure, X-rays);
- Diagnosis (statement of disease or injury based on it s signs and symptoms).... 20 CFR 416.913(b).

In determining disability under the law, the ability to work is measured. An individual's functional capacity for doing bas ic work activities is evaluated. If an individual has the ability to perform basic work activities with out significant limitations, he or she is not considered disabled. 20 CFR 416.994(b)(1)(iv).

Basic work activities are the abilities and aptitudes necessary to do most jobs. Examples of these include --

- (1) Physical functions such as walking, standing, sitting, lifting, pushing, pulling, reaching, carrying, or handling;
- (2) Capacities for seeing, hearing, and speaking;
- (3) Understanding, carrying out, and remembering simple instructions;
- (4) Use of judgment;
- (5) Responding appropriately to supervision, co-workers and usual work situations; and
- (6) Dealing with changes in a routine work setting. 20 CFR 416.921(b).

Medical findings must allow a determination of (1) the nature and limiting effects of your impairment(s) for any period in question; (2) the probable duration of the impairment ; and (3) the residual functional capacity to do work-related physical and mental activities. 20 CFR 416.913(d).

Medical evidence may contain medical opinions. Medical opinions are statements from physicians and psychologists or other a cceptable medical sources that reflect judgments about the nature and severity of the impairment(s), including your symptoms, diagnosis and prognosis, what an indiv idual can do des pite impairment(s), and the physical or mental restrictions. 20 CFR 416.927(a)(2).

All of the evidenc e relevant to the claim, including m edical opinions, is rev iewed and findings are made. 20 CFR 416.927(c).

The Administrative Law Judge is responsible for making the determination or decis ion about whether the statutory definition of disability is met. The Administrative Law Judge reviews all medical findings and other ev idence that support a medical source's statement of disability.... 20 CFR 416.927(e).

A statement by a medical s ource finding t hat an individual is "d isabled" or "unable to work" does not mean that disability e xists for the purposes of the program. 20 CFR 416.927(e).

When determining disability, the federal regulations require that several considerations be analyzed in sequential order. If disability can be ruled out at any step, analysis of the next step is <u>not</u> required. These steps are:

- 1. Does the client perf orm S ubstantial Gainful Activity (SGA)? If yes, the client is ineligible for MA. If no, the analysis continues to Step 2. 20 CFR 416.920(b).
- 2. Does the client have a severe impairment that has lasted or is expected to last 12 months or more or result in death? If no, the cli ent is ineligible for MA. If yes, the analysis c ontinues to Step 3. 20 CF R 416.920(c).
- 3. Does the impairment appear on a spec ial listing of impairments or are the cli ent's symptoms, signs, and laboratory findings at least eq uivalent in s everity to the set of medical findings specified for the listed impairment? If no, the analys is continues to Step 4. If yes, MA is approved. 20 CFR 416.290(d).
- 4. Can the client do the former work that he/she performed within the last 15 years? If yes, the client is ineligible for MA. If no, the analysis continues to Step 5. 20 CFR 416.920(e).
- 5. Does the client have the Residual Functional Capacity (RFC) to perform other work according to t he guidelines set forth at 20 CFR 404, Subpart P, Appendix 2, Sections 200.00-204.00? If yes, the analysis ends and the client is ineligible for MA. If no, MA is approved. 20 CFR 416.920(f).

At Step 1, claimant is not engaged in subs tantial gainful activity and has not worked since 2003. Claimant is not disqualified from receiving disability at Step 1.

The subjective and objective medical evidence on the record indicates that claimant lives with a friend since her surgery and she is single with no children under 18 who live with her. Claimant does receiv e \$ per month in retirement income and she does not receive any benefits from the Department of Human Services. Claimant does not have a driver's lic ense because she has two past DUIL's and her friend takes her where she needs to go. Claimant does cook every day and cooks things lik e meatloaf, potatoes, vegetables and cass eroles. Claimant does grocery shop one time per week ride. Claimant does with no help needed but she does need a do light cleaning. vacuuming, dusting and dishes. Claimant does have a small vegetable garden that she works in, she watches television 2 hours per day and uses the c omputer 1-2 hours per day. Claimant testified that she can stand for 10 minutes at a time, sit for 15 minutes at a time and can walk for 2 blo cks. Claimant testified that she can squat and recover with difficulty, she can bend at the waist, shower and dress herself and tie her shoes but she cannot touch her toes. Claimant testified that her knees are fine, her legs/feet are fine and she has a weak right side wrist. Claimant testified that the heaviest weight she can carry is 15 lbs and that she stopped smoking May 20, 2013 and she stopped drinking in

May, 2007 and stopped smoking ma rijuana in 2011. Claimant testified that on a typical day she watches the news, does housework, get s mail, cooks, watches television and goes to bed early. Claimant had a hip replacement in March, 2012.

A March 31, 2012 discharge summary indicates that claimant had primary osteoarthritis of right hip and s he had a right total hip arth roplasty (p 33). She was to due weight bearing as tolerated. She tole rated her procedure well and was t ransferred to the floor in stable condition. She tolerated her regular diet, she was passing flatus. She was able to urinate without difficulty. There had been no change from the patient's pr e-operative physical examination, vital signs remai ned stable (p 34). A June 7, 2012 medic al examination report indicates t hat claimant was ambulating wit hout pain in the right hip and questioned if she could ride a horse again. She also has a distal right lateral thigh pain just s uperior to the knee that is cont inuing to improve post surgery. On physic al examination, she was 5'5" tall and weighed 105 lbs. Examinati on of her left hip inc ision revealed would to be completely healed as we II approxim ated. No evidence of erythema, edema, drainag e, warmth, or si gns of infection pres ent. She h as a soft, nontender calf. She has a negat ive Homans, intact plantar flexion, dorsiflexion, EHL, FHL, ambulates with a steady gait. She had stable alig nment of her right total hip arthroplasty without evidence of hardware failure according to the x-rays (p 43).

At Step 2, claimant has the burden of pr oof of establishing that she has a severe lv restrictive physical or mental impairment that has lasted or is expected to last for the duration of at least 12 months. There is insufficient objective clinical medical evidence in the record that claimant suffers a severely restrictive physical or mental impairment. in multiple areas of her Claimant has reports of pain body; however, there are no corresponding clinic al findings that support the reports of symptoms and limitations made by the claimant. There are no labor atory or x-ray findings listed in the file whic h support claimant's contention of disability. The clinical impression is that claimant is stable. There is no m edical finding that claim ant has any muscle at rophy or trauma, abnormality or injury that is c onsistent with a deteriorating c ondition. In short, claimant has restricted herself from tasks associat ed with occupational functioning based upo n her reports of pain (symptoms) rather than medical findings. Reported symptoms are an insufficient basis upon which a finding that claimant has me t the evidentiary burden of proof can be made. This Admini strative Law Judge finds th at the medical record is insufficient to establish that claimant has a severely restrictive physical impairment.

Claimant alle ges the follo wing disab ling m ental impairments: panic disorder and depression.

For mental disorders, severity is assessed in terms of the functional limitations imposed by the impairment. Functional limitations ar e assessed using the criteria in paragraph (B) of the listings for mental di sorders (descriptions of restrict ions of activities of daily living, social functioning; c oncentration, persistence, or pace; and ability to tolerat e increased mental demands associated wit h com petitive work).... 20 CFR, Part 404, Subpart P, App. 1, 12.00(C). There is insufficient objective medical/ps ychiatric e vidence in the record indicating claimant suffers severe mental limitations . There is a no mental residual functional capacity assessment in the record. There is in sufficient evidence contained in the file of depression or a cognitive dysfunction that is so severe that it w ould prevent claimant from working at any job. Claimant was or iented to time, person and plac e during the hearing. Claimant was able to answer all of the questi ons at the hearing and was responsive to the questions. The evidentiar y record is insufficient to find that claimant suffers a severely restrictive mental impair ment. For these reasons, this Administrative Law Judge finds that claimant has failed to meet her burden of proof at Step 2. Claimant must be denied benefits at this step bas ed upon her failure t o meet the evidentiary burden.

If claimant had not been denied at Step 2, the analysis would proceed to Step 3 where the medical evidenc e of claimant's condition does not give rise to a finding that he would meet a statutory listing in the code of federal regulations.

If claimant had not already been denied at Step 2, this Administrative Law Judge would have to deny her again at Step 4 based u pon her ability to perform her past relevant work. There is no ev idence upon which this Admin istrative Law Judge c ould base a finding that claimant is unable to perform work in which she has engaged in, in the past. Therefore, if claimant had not already been denied at Step 2, s he would be denied again at Step 4.

The Administrative Law Judge will constitute to proceed through the sequential evaluation process to determine whether or not claimant has the residual functional capacity to perform some other less strenuous tasks than in her prior jobs.

At Step 5, the burden of proof shifts to the department to establish that claimant does not have residual functional capacity.

The residual functional capac ity is what an individual can do desp ite limitations. All impairments will be considered in addition to ability to meet certain demands of jobs in the national economy. Physical demands, mental demands, sensory requirements and other functions will be evaluated.... 20 CFR 416.945(a).

To determine the physical demands (exertional requirements) of work in the national economy, we class ify jobs as sedentary, light, medium and heavy. These terms have the same meaning as they have in the *Dictionary of Occupational Titles*, published by the Department of Labor... 20 CFR 416.967.

Sedentary work. Sedentary work involves lifting no more t han 10 pounds at a time and occasionally lifting or carrying articles lik e docket files, ledgers, and small tools. Although a sedentary job is defined as one whic h involves sitting, a certain amount of walking and standing is often necessary in carrying out job duties. Jobs are sedentary if walking and standing are required occasionally and other sedentary criteria are met. 20 CFR 416.967(a).

Light work. Light wor k involves lifting no more than 20 pounds at a time with frequent lifting or carrying of objects weighing up to 10 pounds. Even though the weight lifted may be very little, a job is in this categor y when it requires a good deal of walking or standing, or when it involves sitting most of the time with some pushing and pulling of arm or leg controls.... 20 CFR 416.967(b).

Claimant has submitted insufficient objecti ve medical evidence that she lacks the residual functional capacity to perform some other less strenuous tasks than in her prior employment or that she is physically unable to do light or sedentary tasks if demanded of her. Claimant's act ivities of daily liv ing do not appear to be very limit ed and sh e should be able to per form light or sedentary work even with her impairments. Claimant has failed to provide the necessary objective medical evidence to establish that she has a severe impairment or comb ination of impairments which prevent her from performing any level of work for a period of 12 mont hs. The claimant's te stimony as to her limitations indicates that she should be able to perform light or sedentary work.

There is insufficient objective medical/ps vchiatric evidence contained in the file of depression or a cognitive dysfunction that is so severe that it w ould prevent claimant from working at any job. Claimant was able to answer all the guestions at the hearing and was responsive to the questions. Claimant was oriented to time, person and plac e during the hearing. Claimant's complaints of pain, while profound and credible, are out of proportion to the objective medical evidence contained in the file as it relates to claimant's ability to perform work. Therefore, this Administrative Law Judge finds that the objective medical evidence on the record does not establis h that claimant has no residual functional capacity. Clai mant is dis qualified from receiving disability at Step 5 based upon the fact that she has not established by objective medical evidence that she cannot perform light or sedentary work even with her impairments. Under the Medical-Vocational guidelines, a person who is advanced age (age 58), with a high school education and an unskilled work hi story who is limited to light work is not considered disabled. Claimant does retain the capacity to perform her past work as a bookkeeper.

The Department has established by the necessary competent, material and substantial evidence on the record that it was acting in compliance with department policy when it determined that claimant was not eligible to receive Medical Assistance.

#### **DECISION AND ORDER**

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon t he above findings of fact and conclusion s of law, decides that the depar tment has appropriately establis hed on the record that i t was acting in compliance wit h department policy when it deni ed claimant's application for Medical Assistance and retroactive M should be able to perform a wide range of impairments. The department has establis hed its c ase by a preponderance of the evidence.

Accordingly, the department's decision is **AFFIRMED**.

**NOTICE**: Administrative Hearings may or der a rehearing or reconsideration on either its own motion or at t he request of a party within 30 days of the mailing date of this Decision and Order.
