HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Admini strative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon the Departm ent of Human Services (Department) request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on May 21, 2013 from Detroit, Michigan. The Department was represented by Regulation Agent, of the Office of Inspector General (OIG). Respondent did appear at the hearing.

ISSUES

Whether Respondent committed an Intentional Program Violation (IPV) and received an over-issuance (OI) Food Ass istance Program (FAP) benefits that the department is entitled to recoup?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on t he competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- 1. The Department's OIG filed a hearing request to establish an OI of benefits received by Respondent.
- 2. The OIG h as requested that Respondent be disqualified from receiving program benefits.
- Respondent filed application with the department on 3/08/11, acknowledging that s/he under stood her rights and responsibilities to report changes in household circumstances.
- 4. Respondent was aware of the responsibility to report all household income.

- 5. Respondent had no apparent physical or m ental impairment that would limit the understanding or ability to fulfill this requirement.
- 6. Respondent received a FAP ov er-issuance in the amount of \$ for the time period of 5/01/11-2/29/12.
- 7. This was Respondent's first alleged IPV.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Department policies are contained in the Br idges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), and the Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) [formerly known as the Food Stamp (FS) program] is established by the Food Stamp Act of 1977, as amend ed, and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in Title 7 of the Code of Feder al Regulations (CFR). The Department (formerly known as the Fam ily Independence Agency) administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10, et seq., and 1999 AC, Rule 400.3001 through Rule 400.3015.

When a client group receives more benefits than they are entitled to receive, DHS must attempt to recoup the OI. BAM 700.

Suspected IPV means an OI exists for which all three of the following conditions exist:

- The client intentionally failed t o report information or intentionally gave incomplete or inaccurate information needed to make a correct benefit determination, and
- The client was clearly and co rrectly instructed regarding his or her reporting responsibilities, and
- The client has no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits his or her understanding or ability to fulfill their reporting responsibilities.

IPV is sus pected when there is clear and convinc ing evidenc e that the client has intentionally withheld or misr epresented information for the purpose of establishing, maintaining, increasing or preventing reduction of program benefits or eligibility. BAM 720.

The Department's OIG requests IPV hearings for cases when:

- benefit overissuance are not forwarded to the prosecutor.
- prosecution of welfare fraud is declined by the prosecutor for a reason other than lack of evidence, and
- the total overissuance amount is \$1000 or more, or

- the total overissuance amount is less than \$1000, and
 - the group has a previ ous intentional program violation, or
 - the alleged IPV involves FAP trafficking, or
 - the alleged fraud involves c oncurrent receipt of assistance.
 - the alleged fraud is committed by a state/government employee.

A court or hearing decision that finds a client committed IPV di squalifies that client from receiving program benefits. A disqualified recipient r emains a member of an active group as long as he lives with them. Other eligible gr oup members may continue to receive benefits. BAM 720.

Clients who commit an IPV are disqualified for a standard di squalification period except when a court orders a different period, or except when the over-issuance relates to MA. Refusal to repay will not cause denial of current or future MA if the client is otherwis e eligible. BAM 710. Clients are disqualified for periods of one year for the first IPV, two years for the second IPV, lifet ime disqualification for the third IPV, and ten years for a concurrent receipt of benefits. BAM 720.

In the instant case, respondent alleges that she provided the department with all income information during the time that she was re ceiving FAP. Respo ndent stated that she gave the information to her caseworker in a timely manner. The caseworker who stify at this heari ng. No one from the worked on this case was not present to te department was present to testify from pers onal knowledge that claimant failed to provide income or change of circumstance information to her caseworker. The department has not established that clai mant committed an Intentional Program Violation under the circumstances. The department OIG has established that the Respondent received an over issuance of FAP benefits in the amount of \$ time period of 5/01/11-2/29/12. The depart ment OIG has also established that one of the household members received earned inc ome resulting in an over-issuance of Food Assistance Program benefits. The department OIG has established by the necessar y competent, substantial and material evidence on the record that respondent received an over-issuance of FAP benefits.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons stated on the record, concludes that:

- 1. Respondent did not commit an IPV.
- 2. Respondent did receive an OI of program benefits in t he amount of \$ from the Food Assistance Program.

The Department is ORDERED to initiate recoupment procedures for the amount of for Food Assistance Program in accordance with Department policy.
