# **HEARING DECISION**

This matter is before the undersigned Admini strative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon claimant's request for a hearing. After due notic e, a telephone hearing was held on May 22, 2 013. Claim ant personally appeared and testified. The department was represented at the hearing by Eligibility Specialist,

# ISSUE

Did the Department of Human Services (the department) properly deny claimant's application for Medical Assistance (MA-P) and State Disability Assistance (SDA)?

#### FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- On October 23, 2012, claimant filed an application for Medical Assistance, Retroactive Medical Assistance and State Disability Assistance benefit s alleging disability.
- On January 4, 2013, the Medica I Review Team denied c laimant's application stating that claimant c ould perform other work pursuant to Medical Vocational Rule 201.25.
- On January 7, 2013, the department ca seworker sent claimant notice that her application was denied.
- 4. On February 19, 2013, claimant filed a request for a hearing to contest the department's negative action.
- 5. On April 26, 2013, the State Hearing Revi ew Team again denied claimant's application st ating in its ana lysis and recommendation: the

claimant reported knee and back pai n. On examination, she had no abnormalities of the spine. Straight leg raise was negative. Her right knee had more pain and decreased range of mo tion. Palpation of the latera I right knee was painful. Palpation of deep tissues posterior to the knee was painful in both knees. Varus and val gus stress tests were negative in both knees. Anterior drawer test was negat ive in both knees. Assessment was polyarticular joint pain. A mental status in September, 2012, showed the claimant had no history of psychiatric hospitalization. She was logical an d organized and responded to questions appropriately overall. She was somewhat vague at times and s eemed distracted ant tangential at times. Speech was pressured at times. S he re ported thinking her boyfriend talked about her in the other room and she hears people saying her name. However, she denied any other hallucinations or delusions. Her affect was somewhat sad and an xious appearing. Diagnoses inc luded mood disorder, anxiety disorder, ADHD and personality disorder. The claimant is not currently engaging in substantia I gainful activity based on the information that is av ailable in file. The claimant's impairments do not meet/equal the intent or se verity of a Social Securi ty listing. The medical evidence of record indicates t hat the claimant retains the c apacity to perform a wide range of simple, unskill ed, light work. A finding about the capacity for prior work has not been ma de. However, this information is not material becaus e all potentia lly applic able medical v ocational guidelines would direct a finding of not disabled given the claimant's age, education, and residual functional c apacity. Therefore, based on the claimant's vocational pr ofile (younger individual, limited educat ion and history of unskilled work), MA-P is denied using Vocational Rule 202.17 as a guide. Retroactive MA-P was considered in this case and is also denied. SDA is denied per PEM 261 because the nature and severity of the claimant's impairments would not prec lude work activity at the above stated level for 90 days.

- 6. The hearing was held on May 22, 2013. At the hearing, claimant waived the time periods and requested to submit additional medical information.
- 7. The record was left open until June 22, 2013 to allow for the submission of addition medical information. No new inf ormation was received by June 24, 2013.
- 8. The record was clos ed on June 24, 2013 and this Administrative Law Judge will proceed to decision.
- 9. Claimant is a 38-yea r-old woman whos e birth date is
  Claimant is 5'7" tall and weighs 200 pounds. Claim ant attended the 9
  grade and does not have a GED. Claimant is able to read and write but
  does have some problems with comprehension and she has very minimal

- math skills. Claimant testified that she was in special education when she was in school for low comprehension.
- 10. Claimant last worked in 2005 as a machine operator. Claimant has als o worked boxing filters.
- 11. Claimant alleges as disabling impairments: att ention deficit, hyperactive disorder, stress, hepatitis C, sleep apnea, knee pain, back pain, depression, fatigue and insomnia.

# **CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**

The regulations governing the hearing and appeal process for applicants and recipients of public assistance in Michigan are found in the Michigan Administrative Code, MAC R 400.901-400.951. An oppor tunity for a hearing shall be granted to an ap plicant who requests a hearing because his or her claim for assistance has been denied. MAC R 400.903(1). Clients have the right to contest a department decision affecting eligibility or benefit levels whenever it is believed that the decision is incorrect. The department will provide an administrative hearing to review the decision and determine the appropriateness of that decision. BAM 600.

The State Disability A ssistance (SDA) program which provides financial assistance for disabled persons is established by 2004 PA 344. The Department of Human Service s (DHS or department) admin isters the SDA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, et seq., and MAC R 400.3151-400.3180. Department polic ies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is estab lished by Title XIX of the Social Sec urity Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the C ode of Federal Regulations (CFR). The Department of Human Services (DHS or department) administers the MA program pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and MCL 400.105. Department policies are found in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) and the Program Reference Manual (PRM).

Pursuant to Federal Rule 42 CFR 435.540, the Department of Human Services uses the federal Supplemental Security Income (SSI) policy in determining eligibility for disability under the Medical Assistance program. Under SSI, disability is defined as:

...the inability to do any substant ial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment which can be expected to result in death or which has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months.... 20 CFR 416.905

A set order is used to deter mine disability. Current work activity, severity of impairments, residual functional capacity, past wor k, age, or education and work experience is reviewed. If there is a finding that an individual is disabled or not disabled at any point in the review, there will be no further evaluation. 20 CFR 416.920.

If an individual is working and the work is substantial gainful activity, the individual is not disabled regardless of the medical condition, education and work experienc e. 20 CFR 416.920(c).

If the impairment or combination of impair ments do not signific antly limit physica I or mental ability to do basic work activities, it is not a severe impairment(s) and disability does not exist. Age, education and work experience will not be considered. 20 CFR 416.920.

Statements about pain or other symptoms do not alone establish disability. There must be medical signs and laboratory findings which demonstrate a medical impairment.... 20 CFR 416.929(a).

... Medical reports should include -

- (1) Medical history.
- (2) Clinical findings (such as the results of physical or mental status examinations);
- (3) Laboratory findings (such as blood press ure, X-rays);
- (4) Diagnosis (statement of disease or injury based on it s signs and symptoms).... 20 CFR 416.913(b).

In determining disability under the law, the ability to work is measured. An individual's functional capacity for doing basic work activities is evaluated. If an individual has the ability to perform basic work activities with out significant limitations, he or she is not considered disabled. 20 CFR 416.994(b)(1)(iv).

Basic work activities are the abilities and aptitudes necessary to do most jobs. Examples of these include --

- (1) Physical functions such as walking, standing, sitting, lifting, pushing, pulling, reaching, carrying, or handling;
- (2) Capacities for seeing, hearing, and speaking;

- (3) Understanding, carrying out, and remembering simple instructions;
- (4) Use of judgment;
- (5) Responding appropriately to supervision, co-workers and usual work situations; and
- (6) Dealing with changes in a routine work setting. 20 CFR 416.921(b).

Medical findings must allow a determination of (1) the nature and limiting effects of your impairment(s) for any period in question; (2) the probable duration of the impairment; and (3) the residual functional capacity to do work-related physical and mental activities. 20 CFR 416.913(d).

Medical evidence may contain medical opinions. Medical opinions are statements from physicians and psychologists or other a cceptable medical sources that reflect judgments about the nature and severity of the impairment(s), including your symptoms, diagnosis and prognosis, what an indiv idual can do des pite impairment(s), and the physical or mental restrictions. 20 CFR 416.927(a)(2).

All of the evidence relevant to the claim, including medical opinions, is reviewed and findings are made. 20 CFR 416.927(c).

The Administrative Law Judge is responsible for making the determination or decis ion about whether the statutory definition of disability is met. The Administrative Law Judge reviews all medical findings and other ev idence that support a medical source's statement of disability.... 20 CFR 416.927(e).

A statement by a medical source finding that an individual is "disabled" or "unable to work" does not mean that disability exists for the purposes of the program. 20 CFR 416.927(e).

When determining disability, the federal regulations require that s everal considerations be analyzed in sequential order. If disability can be ruled out at any step, analysis of the next step is not required. These steps are:

- 1. Does the client perf orm S ubstantial Gainful Activity (SGA)? If yes, the client is ineligible for MA. If no, the analysis continues to Step 2. 20 CFR 416.920(b).
- 2. Does the client have a severe impairment that has lasted or is expected to last 12 months or more or result in death? If no, the client is ineligible for MA. If yes, the analysis continues to Step 3. 20 CF R 416.920(c).

- 3. Does the impairment appear on a spec ial listing of impairments or are the cli ent's symptoms, signs, and laboratory findings at least eq uivalent in s everity to the set of medical findings specified for the listed impairment? If no, the analys is continues to Step 4. If yes, MA is approved. 20 CFR 416.290(d).
- 4. Can the client do the former work that he/she performed within the last 15 years? If yes, the client is ineligible for MA. If no, the analysis continues to Step 5. 20 CFR 416.920(e).
- 5. Does the client have the Residual Functional Capacity (RFC) to perform other work according to the guidelines set forth at 20 CFR 404, Subpart P, Appendix 2, Sections 200.00-204.00? If yes, the analysis ends and the client is ineligible for MA. If no, MA is approved. 20 CFR 416.920(f).

At Step 1, claimant is not engaged in substantial gainful activity and is not disqualified from receiving disability at Step 1.

The subjective and objective medical evidence on the record indicates that claimant lives with her fiancée in a house and she is single with no childr en under 18 who liv e with her. Claimant has no income and does re ceive Food Assistance Program benefits. Claimant has a suspended driv er's license and her fiancée' father takes her where she needs to go. Claimant does cook every day and cooks thin gs in the microwave. Claimant does grocery shop 1 time per month and us es the amigo cart. Claimant does not do any housework and she watches televisi on one hour per day. Claim ant testified that she is able to st and for 5 minutes at a time, sit for 30 minutes at a time and can walk for 1 block. Claimant testified that she can bend at the waist, shower and dre ss herself, tie her shoes and touch her toes , though it hurts and she cannot squat. Claimant testified that her back hurts and her level of pain, on a scale of 1-10, without medication is a 9-10, and with medication is a 7-8. Claimant testified that she is right handed and that her hands/arms fall as leep and that her knees and f eet hurt. Claimant testified that the heaviest weight she can carry is 5 lbs and that she does n't smoke. Claimant testified she st opped drinking two weeks before the hearing and stopped doing crack two weeks before the hearing. Claimant testified that on a typical day she brushes her teeth, washes her face, sits down, watches television, dozes off, watches the news and soap operas and she sleeps most of the time.

The claimant was seen in the emer gency room May 23, 2013 with knee pain and swelling (p 106). On examination, she had edema with mild swelling of the left knee but no effusion or deformity. There was no sign of septic arthritis. Her mood, affect, behavior and thought content were normal (p 108). An enc ounter dated October 31, 2012 showed the claimant was 67" and 184.

lumbar/lumbosacral spine exhibited no abnorma lities. Straight leg raise was negative . Her knees revealed abnormalities. The right knee had more pain and decreased range of motion. Palpation of the lateral right kn ee was pa inful. Palpation of deep tissues posterior to the knee was painf ul in both knees. Varus and valgus stress tests were negative in both knees. Anterior drawer test was negat ive in both knees. As sessment was depression and polyarticular joint pain (p 17). A mental status dated September 4, 2012 showed the c laimant had no history of psychiatric hos pitalization. She had appropriate hygiene. She pr esented as logical and or ganized. She responded to questions appropriately overall. She was somewhat vague at times and seemed distracted and tangential at times. Speech was pressured at times. She said she thinks her boyfriend is talking about her in the other room or hears people saying her name a lot and no one says t hey called her. However, she denied any other hallucinations or delusions. Her affect was somewhat s ad and anxious appearing. Diagnoses include mood disorder NOS, anxiety disorder NO S, ADHD NOS and personality disorder (records from DDS). Claimant had an axis V GAF of 54 (p 144).

At Step 2, claimant has the burden of pr oof of establishing that she has restrictive physical or mental impairment that has lasted or is expected to last for the duration of at least 12 months. There is insufficient objective clinical medical evidence in the record that claimant suffers a severely restrictive physical or mental impairment. in multiple areas of her Claimant has reports of pain body; however, there are no corresponding clinic al findings that suppor t the reports of symptoms and limitations made by the claimant. There are no labor atory or x-ray findings listed in the file which support claimant's contention of disability. The clinical impression is that claimant is stable. There is no medical finding that claim ant has any muscle at rophy or trauma, abnormality or injury that is consistent with a deteriorating condition. In short, claimant has restricted herself from tasks associat ed with occupational functioning based upo in her reports of pain (symptoms) rather than medical findings. Reported symptoms are an insufficient basis upon which a finding that claimant has me t the evidentiary burden of proof can be made. This Admini strative Law Judge finds the at the medical record is insufficient to establish that claimant has a severely restrictive physical impairment.

Claimant alleges the following disabling mental impairment s: depression, attention deficit hyperactive disorder, stress and anxiety.

For mental disorders, severity is assessed in terms of the functional limitations imposed by the impairment. Functional limitations are assessed using the criteria in paragraph (B) of the listings for mental disorders (descriptions of restrictions of activities of daily living, social functioning; concentration, persistence, or pace; and ability to tolerate increased mental demands associated with competitive work).... 20 CFR, Part 404, Subpart P, App. 1, 12.00(C).

There is insufficient objective medical/ps ychiatric e vidence in the record indicating claimant suffers severe mental limitations . There is a no mental residual functional capacity assessment in the record. There is in sufficient evidence contained in the file of depression or a cognitive dysfunction that is so severe that it would prevent claimant

from working at any job. Claimant was or iented to time, person and place during the hearing. Claimant was able to answer all of the questi ons at the hearing and was responsive to the questions. The evidentiar y record is insufficient to find that claimant suffers a severely restrictive mental impair ment. For these reasons, this Administrative Law Judge finds that claimant has failed to meet her burden of proof at Step 2. Claimant must be denied benefits at this step based upon her failure to meet the evidentiary burden.

If claimant had not been denied at Step 2, the analysis would proceed to Step 3 where the medical evidence of claimant's condition does not give rise to a finding that he would meet a statutory listing in the code of federal regulations.

If claimant had not already been denied at Step 2, this Administrative Law Judge would have to deny her again at Step 4 based u pon her ability to perform her past relevant work. There is no ev idence upon which this Admin istrative Law Judge c ould base a finding that claimant is unable to perform work in which she has engaged in, in the past. Therefore, if claimant had not already been denied at Step 2, s he would be denied again at Step 4.

The Administrative Law Judge will continue to proceed through the sequential evaluation process to determine whether or not claimant has the residual functional capacity to perform some other less strenuous tasks than in her prior jobs.

At Step 5, the burden of proof shifts to the department to establish that claimant does not have residual functional capacity.

The residual functional capacity is what an individual can do despite limitations. All impairments will be considered in addition to ability to meet certain demands of jobs in the national economy. Physical demands, mental demands, sensory requirements and other functions will be evaluated.... 20 CFR 416.945(a).

To determine the physical demands (exertional requirements) of work in the national economy, we class ify jobs as sedentary, light, medium and heavy. These terms have the same meaning as they have in the *Dictionary of Occupational Titles*, published by the Department of Labor... 20 CFR 416.967.

Sedentary work. Sedentary work involves lifting no more than 10 pounds at a time and occasionally lifting or carrying articles lik e docket files, ledgers, and small tools. Although a sedentary job is defined as one which involves sitting, a certain amount of walking and standing is often necessary in carrying out job duties. Jobs are sedentary if walking and standing are required occasionally and other sedentary criteria are met. 20 CFR 416.967(a).

Light work. Light wor k involves lifting no more than 20 pounds at a time with frequent lifting or carrying of objects weighing up to 10 pounds. Even though the weight lifted may be very little, a job is in this categor y when it requires a good deal of walking or

standing, or when it involves sitting most of the time with some pushing and pulling of arm or leg controls.... 20 CFR 416.967(b).

Claimant has submitted insufficient objecti ve medical evidence that she lacks the residual functional capacity to perform some other less strenuous tasks than in her prior employment or that she is physically unable to do light or sedentary tasks if demanded of her. Claimant's act ivities of daily liv ing do not appear to be very limit ed and she should be able to per form light or sedentary work even with her impairments. Claimant has failed to provide the necessary objective medical evidence to establish that she has a severe impairment or comb ination of impairments which prevent her from performing any level of work for a period of 12 mont hs. The claimant's testimony as to her limitations indicates that she should be able to perform light or sedentary work.

There is insufficient objective medical/ps ychiatric evidence contained in the file of depression or a cognitive dysfunction that is so severe that it would prevent claimant from working at any job. Claimant was able to answer all the questions at the hearing and was responsive to the questions. Claimant was oriented to time, person and place during the hearing. Claimant's complaints of pain, while profound and credible, are out of proportion to the objective medical evidence contained in the file as it relates to claimant's ability to perform work. Therefore, this Administrative Law Judge finds that the objective medical evidence on the record does not establish that claimant has no residual functional capacity. Claimant is disqualified from receiving disability at Step 5 based upon the fact that she has not established by objective medical evidence that she cannot perform light or sedentary work even with her impairments. Under the Medical-Vocational guidelines, a younger individual (age 38), with a less than high school education and an unskilled work his story who is limited to light work is not considered disabled.

The Federal Regulations at 20 CFR 404.1535 speak to the determination of whethe r Drug Addiction and Alcoholism (D AA) is material to a person's disability and when benefits will or will not be a pproved. The regulations require the disability analysis be completed prior to a determination of whether a person's drug and alcohol use is material. It is only when a person meets the disability criterion, as set forth in the regulations, that the issue of materiality becomes relevant. In such cases, the regulations require a sixth step to determine the materiality of DAA to a person's disability.

When the record contains ev idence of DAA, a determination must be made whether or not the per son would continue to be disabled if the individual stopped using drugs or alcohol. The trier of fact must determine what, if any, of the physical or mental limitations would remain if the person were to stop the use of the drugs or alcohol and whether any of these remaining limitations would be disabling.

Claimant's testimony and the information contained in the file indicate that claimant has a history of drug and alcohol abuse. Applicable hearing is the Drug Abuse and Alcohol (DA&A) Legislation, Public La w 104-121, Section 105(b)(1), 110 STAT. 853, 42 USC

423(d)(2)(C), 1382(c)(a)(3)(J) Supplement Five 1999. The law indicates that individuals are not eligible and/or are not disabled where drug addiction or alcoholism is a contributing factor material to the determination of disability. After a careful review of the credible and substantial ev idence on the whole record, this Administrative Law Judg e finds that claimant does not meet the statutory disability definition under the authority of the DA&A Legis lation because her subs tance abuse is material to her alleged impairment and alleged disability.

The department's Program Elig ibility Manual contains the following policy statements and instructions for casework ers regarding the State Disability Assistance program: to receive State Disability Assist ance, a person must be disabled, caring for a disable diperson or age 65 or older. BEM in Item 261, p. 1. Because the claimant does not meet the definition of disabled under the MA-P program and because the evidence of record does not establish that claimant is unable to work for a period exceeding 90 days, the claimant does not meet the disability criteria for Stat e Disability Assistance benefits either

The Department has established by the necessary competent, material and substantial evidence on the record that it was acting in compliance with department policy when it determined that claimant was not eligible to receive Medical Assistance and/or State Disability Assistance.

# **DECISION AND ORDER**

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that the department has appropriately established on the record that it was acting in compliance with department policy when it denied claimant's application for Medical Assistance, retroactive Medical Assistance and State Disability Assistance benefits. The claimant should be able to perform a wide range of light or sedentary work even with her impairments.

The department has established its case by a preponderance of the evidence.

Accordingly, the department's decision is **AFFIRMED**.
