HEARING DECISION

This matter is before the undersigned Administ rative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon the Departm ent of Human Services (Department) request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on July 3 0, 2013, from Lansing, Michigan. The D epartment was represented by **Mathematical Services**, Regulation Agent, of the Office of Inspector General (OIG). Respondent did not appear at the hearing and it was held in Respondent's absence pursuant to 7 CFR 273.16(e), Mich Admin Code R 400.3130(5), or Mich Admi n Code R 400.3178(5). Noti ce was sent t o claimant's last known address and was returned as undeliverable.

ISSUES

Whether Respondent committed an Intentional Program Violation (IPV) and received an over-issuance Food Assistanc e Program (FAP) that the department is entitled to recoup?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on t he competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- The department's Office of Inspector General (OIG) filed a hearing request to establish an over-issuance of benefits received by Respondent as a result of Respondent having committed an Intentional Program Violation (IPV); the OIG also requested that Respondent be disqualified from receiving program benefits.
- 2. Respondent signed Assistance Application (DHS-1171) on February 4, 2011, acknowledging that he u nderstood that failure to give timely, truthful, complete and ac curate information about circumstances

could result in a civil or criminal action or an administrative claim against respondent.

- 3. Respondent applied for FAP bene fits in the State of Michigan but cashed the FAP benefits exc lusively in the St ate of California from May 9, 2011-November 30, 2011.
- 4. Respondent failed to report the change of State of Residency as required.
- 5. Respondent received an over-issuance of Food Assistance Benefits in the amount of **\$1000** from May 4, 2011-November 30, 2011.
- 6. Respondent was clearly instructed and fully awar e of the responsibility to report all employment, residency and income changes to the department.
- 7. Respondent has no apparent physical or mental imp airment that would limit the understandi ng or ability to fulfil I the income reporting responsibilities.
- 8. Respondent had not committed any previ ous intentional program violations of the FAP program.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Department policies are contained in the Br idges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), and the Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) [formerly known as the Food Stamp (FS) program] is established by the Food Stamp Act of 1977, as amend ed, and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in Title 7 of the Code of Feder al Regulations (CFR). The Department (formerly known as the Fam ily Independence Agency) administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10, *et seq.*, and 1999 AC, Rule 400.3001 through Rule 400.3015.

When a client group receives more benefits than they are entitled to receive, DHS must attempt to recoup the OI. BAM 700.

Suspected IPV means an OI exists for which all three of the following conditions exist:

- The client intentionally failed t o report information or intentionally gave incomplete or inaccurate information needed to make a correct benefit determination, and
- The client was clearly and co rrectly instructed regarding his or her reporting responsibilities, and

• The client has no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits his or her understanding or ability to fulfill their reporting responsibilities.

IPV is sus pected when there is clear and convinc ing evidenc e that the client has intentionally withheld or misr epresented information for t he purpose of establishing, maintaining, increasing or preventing reduc tion of program benefits or eligibility. BAM 720.

The Department's OIG requests IPV hearings for cases when:

- benefit over-issuance are not forwarded to the prosecutor.
- prosecution of welfare fraud is declined by the prosecutor for a reason other than lack of evidence, and
- the total over-issuance amount is \$1000 or more, or
- the total over-issuance amount is less than \$1000, and
 - the group has a previ ous intentional program violation, or
 - the alleged IPV involves FAP trafficking, or
 - the alleged fraud involves c oncurrent receipt of assistance,
 - the alleged fraud is committed by a state/government employee.

A court or hearing decision that finds a client committed IPV di squalifies that client from receiving program benefits. A disqualified recipient r emains a member of an active group as long as he lives with them. Other eligible gr oup members may continue to receive benefits. BAM 720.

Clients who commit an IPV are disqualified for a standard di squalification period except when a court orders a different period, or except when the over-issuance relates to MA. Refusal to repay will not cause denial of current or future MA if the client is otherwis e eligible. BAM 710. Clients are disqualified for periods of one year for the first IPV, two years for the second IPV, lifet ime disqualification for the th ird IPV, and ten years for a concurrent receipt of benefits. BAM 720.

In the instant case, the department OIG has established that the Respondent received an over is suance of FAP benef its in the amount of \$ Evidence on the record indicates that respondent was no longer a resident of the State of Michigan during the relevant time period and used her benefits in the state of Georgia exclusively during the relevant times. The department OIG has es tablished by the necessary competent, substantial and material evidence on the record that claimant committed an Intentional Program Violation for the Food Assistanc e Program for which respondent must be disqualified.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, determines that clear and convincing evidence establishes, and for the reasons stated on the record, concludes that:

- 1. Respondent did commit an IPV.
- 2. Respondent did receive an OI of program benefits in t he amount of \$ from the Food Assistance Program.

The Department is ORDERED to initiate recoupment procedures for the amount of for Food Assistance Program in accordance with Department policy.

It is FURTHER ORDERED that Respondent be personally disqualified from participation in the Food A ssistance Program for 1 year. This disqualification period shall begin <u>immediately</u> as of the date of this Order.
