HEARING DECISION FOR INTENTIONAL PROGRAM VIOLATION

This matter is before the undersigned Admini strative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and MCL 400.37 upon the Departm ent of Human Servic es' (Department) request for a hearing. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on July 1 6, 2013, from Lansing, Michigan. The Department was represented by Resident Agent of the Office of Inspector General (OIG). Respondent personally appeared and provided testimony.

<u>ISSUES</u>

- 1. Did Respondent receive an overissuance (OI) of Food Assistance Program (FAP) benefits that the Department is entitled to recoup?
- Did Respondent commit an Intentional Program Violation (IPV)?
- 3. Should Respondent be disqualified from receiving Food Assistance Program (FAP)?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on t he competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- The Department's OIG filed a hearing re quest on November 13, 2012, to establis h
 an OI of benefits received by Respondent as a result of Respondent having
 allegedly committed an IPV.
- 2. The OIG h as requested that Respondent be disqualified from receiving program benefits.
- 3. The Department's OIG indicates that the time period they are considering the fraud period is October 6, 2010 through April 29, 2012.

4. During the alleged fraud per iod, Respondent was issued \$ in FAP benefits from the State of Michigan.

- 5. Respondent was entitled to -0- in FAP during this time period.
- 6. This was Respondent's first IPV.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Department policies are contained in the Br idges Administrative Manual (BAM), the Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), and the Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) [formerly known as the Food Stamp (FS) program] is established by the Food Stamp Act of 1977, as amend ed, and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in Title 7 of the Code of Feder al Regulations (CFR). The Department (formerly known as the Fam ily Independence Agency) administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10, et seq., and 1999 AC, Rule 400.3001 through Rule 400.3015.

When a client group receives more benefits than they are entitled to receive, the Department must attempt to recoup the OI. BAM 700.

Suspected IPV means an OI exists for which all three of the following conditions exist:

- The client intentionally failed t o report information or intentionally gave incomplete or inaccurate information needed to make a correct benefit determination, and
- The client was clearly and co rrectly instructed regarding his or her reporting responsibilities, and
- The client has no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits his or her understanding or ability to fulfill their reporting responsibilities.

IPV is sus pected when there is clear and convinc ing evidenc e that the client has intentionally withheld or misr epresented information for the purpose of establishing, maintaining, increasing or preventing reduction of program benefits or eligibility. BAM 720.

The Department's OIG requests IPV hearings for cases when:

- benefit overissuanc es are not forwarded to the prosecutor,
- prosecution of welfare fraud is declined by the prosecutor for a reason other than lack of evidence, and
- the total overissuance amount is \$1000 or more, or

- the total overissuance amount is less than \$1000, and
 - the group has a previ ous intentional program violation, or
 - the alleged IPV involves FAP trafficking, or
 - the alleged fraud involves c oncurrent receipt of assistance,
 - the alleged fraud is committed by a state/government employee.

A court or hearing decision that finds a client committed an IP V disqualifies that client from receiving certain program benefits. A disqualified reci pient remains a member of an active group as long as he lives with them. Other eligib le group members may continue to receive benefits. BAM 720.

Clients who commit an IPV are disqualified for a standard disqualification period except when a court orders a different period, or except when the overissuance relates to MA. Refusal to repay will not cause denial of current or future MA if the client is otherwise eligible. BAM 710. Clients are disqualified for periods of one year for the first IPV, two years for the second IPV, lifet ime disqualification for the third IPV, and ten years for a concurrent receipt of benefits. BAM 720.

In this case the Department alleges Resp ondent trafficked his FAP benefits at based on a USDA investigat ion which determined that pur chases greater than \$30, and those completed in a short period of time as well as excessively large transactions were trafficking validations. Claimant's IG-312 Report indicates that he regularly completed two transactions in a single day totaling more than \$30. Based on written statements other subjects investigated for the same trafficking violations, the subjects were able to obtain non-food items, gas, cigarettes, and run "tabs." Claimant's purchase pattern fits the trafficking thresholds set forth by the ALERT Case Analysis and USDA.

Claimant testified that he bought food items at Administrative Law Judge did not find Claimant's testimony credible, in that he was very specific when testifying, but when being questioned, he claimed memory loss.

Moreover, according to Departmental polic y, the documentation used to establish the trafficking determination can be circumstantial, such as an affidavit from a store owner or sworn testimony from a feder all or state investigator of how much a client could have reasonably trafficked in that store. BAM 720, p 7 (2/1/13).

Based on departmental policy, ex penditures over \$30 at the store are evidence of FAP trafficking by Claimant.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, finds that:

1. Respondent did commit an IPV.

2. Respondent did receive an OI of FAP program benefits in the amount of \$

The Department is ORDERED to initiate recoupment procedures for the amount of in accordance with Department policy.

It is FURTHER ORDERED that Respondent be disqualified from FAP for a period of 12 months.
