FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1.	The Department's OIG filed a hearing request on July 30, 2013, to establish an OI of benefits received by Respondent as a result of Respondent having allegedly committed an IPV.
2.	The OIG \boxtimes has \square has not requested that Respondent be disqualified from receiving program benefits.
3.	Respondent was a recipient of \boxtimes FIP \boxtimes FAP \square SDA \square CDC \square MA benefits issued by the Department.
4.	Respondent \boxtimes was \square was not aware of the responsibility to report changes in household income and starting of employment.
5.	Respondent had no apparent physical or mental impairment that would limit the understanding or ability to fulfill this requirement.
6.	The Department's OIG indicates that the time period it is considering the fraud period is 12/1/06 to 2/28/07 FAP, and 12/1/06 to 2/28/07 FIP (fraud period).
7.	During the fraud period, Respondent was issued \$1467 in \boxtimes FIP and \$1224 in \boxtimes FAP \square SDA \square CDC \square MA benefits by the State of Michigan, and the Department alleges that Respondent was entitled to \$\$0 in FIP and \$0 in FAP in such benefits during this time period.
8.	The Department alleges that Respondent received an OI in \boxtimes FIP (\$1467) \boxtimes FAP (\$1224) benefits in the total amount of \$2691.
9.	This was Respondent's \boxtimes first \square second \square third alleged IPV for both FIP and FAP benefits.
10.	A notice of hearing was mailed to Respondent at the last known address and \square was \boxtimes was not returned by the US Post Office as undeliverable.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Department policies are contained in the Department of Human Services Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Department of Human Services Bridges Eligibility Manual

(BEM), and Department of Human Services Reference Tables Manual (RFT). Prior to August 1, 2008, Department policies were contained in the Department of Human Services Program Administrative Manuals (PAM), Department of Human Services Program Eligibility Manual (PEM), and Department of Human Services Reference Schedules Manual (RFS).

☐ The Family Independence Program (FIP) was established pursuant to the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996, PL 104-193, and 42 USC 601 to 679c. The Department (formerly known as the Family Independence Agency) administers FIP pursuant to MCL 400.10 and 400.57a and Mich Admin Code, R 400.3101 to .3131.

☑ The Food Assistance Program (FAP) [formerly known as the Food Stamp program] is established by the Food Stamp Act of 1977, as amended, 7 USC 2011 to 2036a and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in 7 CFR 271.1 to 285.5. The Department (formerly known as the Family Independence Agency) administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10 and Mich Admin Code, R 400.3001 to .3015.

The Department's OIG requests IPV hearings for the following cases:

- FAP trafficking Ols that are not forwarded to the prosecutor,
- prosecution of welfare fraud or FAP trafficking is declined by the prosecutor for a reason other than lack of evidence, and
 - the total OI amount for the FIP, SDA, CDC, MA and FAP programs is \$1000 or more, or
 - the total OI amount is less than \$1000, and
 - the group has a previous IPV, or
 - > the alleged IPV involves FAP trafficking, or
 - ➤ the alleged fraud involves concurrent receipt of assistance (see BEM 222), or
 - the alleged fraud is committed by a state/government employee.

BAM 720 (1/1/13), p. 10.

Intentional Program Violation

Suspected IPV means an OI exists for which all three of the following conditions exist:

 The client intentionally failed to report information or intentionally gave incomplete or inaccurate information needed to make a correct benefit determination, and

- The client was clearly and correctly instructed regarding his or her reporting responsibilities, and
- The client has no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits his or her understanding or ability to fulfill reporting responsibilities.

BAM 700 (1/1/13), p. 6; BAM 720, p. 1.

An IPV is also suspected for a client who is alleged to have trafficked FAP benefits. BAM 720, p. 1.

An IPV requires that the Department establish by clear and convincing evidence that the client has intentionally withheld or misrepresented information for the **purpose** of establishing, maintaining, increasing or preventing reduction of program benefits or eligibility. BAM 720, p. 1 (emphasis in original); see also 7 CFR 273(e)(6). Clear and convincing evidence is evidence sufficient to result in a clear and firm belief that the proposition is true. See M Civ JI 8.01.

In this case, the evidence presented by the Department clearly demonstrated that during the alleged fraud period the Respondent received earned income from employment due to her employment with As evidence of employment the Department presented a Work Number report showing the Respondent's weekly earnings beginning in October 2006. Exhibit 1, pp. 18,19. At no time during the fraud period did the Respondent report receipt of income from employment so that her food assistance and cash assistance could be adjusted accordingly. The evidence clearly established that during December 2006 through February 28, 2007 the Respondent received more FAP benefits than she was otherwise entitled resulting in an overissuance of \$1224. During the same time period the Respondent also received \$1467 of FIP benefits she was not otherwise entitled to receive. The total over-issuance for both programs exceeds \$1000 which is the threshold amount. Based upon the evidence presented and the budgets that were reviewed to determine the amounts of the overissued benefits, it is determined that the Department use the correct earned income for employment as well as include the FIP cash benefits for the appropriate months as unearned income, as the Respondent was not entitled to receipt of any cash assistance during those months. Failure to report receipt of income from employment and starting of employment resulting in a change of income over the several month period in question clearly established an intentional program violation occurred as a result of the Respondent's conduct. The Respondent clearly received more benefits that she was otherwise entitled to or would have received had she reported the income.

Disqualification

A court or hearing decision that finds a client committed IPV disqualifies that client from receiving program benefits. BAM 720, p. 12. A disqualified recipient remains a member of an active group as long as he lives with them, and other eligible group members may continue to receive benefits. BAM 720, p. 13.

Clients who commit an IPV are disqualified for a standard disqualification period except when a court orders a different period, or except when the OI relates to MA. BAM 720, p. 13. Refusal to repay will not cause denial of current or future MA if the client is otherwise eligible. BAM 710 (1/1/13), p. 2. Clients are disqualified for periods of one year for the first IPV, two years for the second IPV, lifetime disqualification for the third IPV, and ten years for a FAP concurrent receipt of benefits. BAM 720, p. 16.

In this case, the Department has clearly established than an intentional program violation occurred due to the Respondent's failure to report receipt of employment over a 3 month period. The Department also established that this was the Respondent's first violation for both FIP and FAP benefits; therefore, the Department has established its request for disqualification.

Overissuance

When a client group receives more benefits than they are entitled to receive, the Department must attempt to recoup the OI. BAM 700, p. 1.

In this case, the budgets for both the FIP and FAP benefits were reviewed for the periods in question. The review of the budgets indicated that the Department properly calculated the earned income amounts including both the employment income received weekly, as well as the cash assistance FIP benefits which were received during the period. Based on the review of the budgets the Department has established that it was entitled to an over-issuance of \$1467 for FIP benefits and \$1224 for FAP benefits. Exhibit 1 pp. 33-45.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons stated on the record, if any, concludes that:

1.	Respondent \boxtimes did \square did not commit an IPV by clear and convincing evidence.
2.	Respondent \boxtimes did \square did not receive an OI of program benefits in the amount of \$2691 from the following program(s) \boxtimes FIP \boxtimes FAP \square SDA \square CDC \square MA.
The	Department is ORDERED to initiate recoupment procedures for the amount of \$2691 in accordance with Department policy.

It is FURTHER ORDERED that Respondent be disqualified from
