### **HEARING DECISION**

Following Claimant's request for a hearing, this matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and 400.37; 42 CFR 431.200 to 431.250; and 45 CFR 205.10. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on April 29, 2015, from Lansing, Michigan. Participants on behalf of Claimant included . Participants on behalf of the Department of Health and Human Services (Department) included Assistance Payment Worker

### **ISSUE**

Whether the Department properly determined that Claimant was not disabled for purposes of the State Disability Assistance (SDA) benefit program?

## FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- (1) On May 15, 2014, Claimant filed an application for SDA benefits alleging disability.
- (2) On November 24, 2014, the Medical Review Team (MRT) denied Claimant's application for SDA.
- (3) On November 24, 2014, the Department sent Claimant notice that his SDA application was denied.
- (4) On January 12, 2015, Claimant filed a request for a hearing to contest the Department's negative action.
- (5) Claimant has a history of manic-depressive disorder, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, depression, oppositional defiant disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder, seizures, closed head injury, chronic pain, and extremity edema.

(6) Claimant is a 37 year old man whose birthday is Claimant is 6'4" tall and weighs 206 lbs. Claimant has a high school equivalent education through special education.

## CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Department policies are contained in the Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), and Department of Human Services Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The State Disability Assistance (SDA) program, which provides financial assistance for disabled persons, was established by 2004 PA 344. The Department administers the SDA program pursuant to 42 CFR 435, MCL 400.10 *et seq.* and Mich Admin Code, Rules 400.3151 – 400.3180. A person is considered disabled for SDA purposes if the person has a physical or mental impariment which meets federal Supplemental Security Income (SSI) disability standards for at least ninety days. Receipt of SSI benefits based on disability or blindness, or the receipt of MA benefits based on disability or blindness, automatically qualifies an individual as disabled for purposes of the SDA program.

Current legislative amendments to the Act delineate eligibility criteria as implemented by department policy set forth in program manuals. 2004 PA 344, Sec. 604, establishes the State Disability Assistance program. It reads in part:

Sec. 604 (1) The department shall operate a state disability assistance program. Except as provided in subsection (3), persons eligible for this program shall include needy citizens of the United States or aliens exempt from the Supplemental Security Income citizenship requirement who are at least 18 years of age or emancipated minors meeting one or more of the following requirements:

(b) A person with a physical or mental impairment which meets federal SSI disability standards, except that the minimum duration of the disability shall be 90 days. Substance abuse alone is not defined as a basis for eligibility.

Specifically, this Act provides minimal cash assistance to individuals with some type of severe, temporary disability which prevents him or her from engaging in substantial gainful work activity for at least ninety (90) days.

In this case, Claimant underwent an independent psychiatric evaluation on **Received**, on behalf of the Department. Claimant was diagnosed with Neurocognitive disorder due to multiple head injuries, opiate addiction in remission, depressive disorder and personality disorder with antisocial features. The psychiatrist opined that Claimant's prognosis is guarded.

On **Characterized**, Claimant underwent an independent medical examination on behalf of the Department. Claimant has a history of multiple falls, seizures, left wrist fracture, bipolar disorder, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, hepatitis C and chronic back pain.

On **Constant**, Claimant's treating physician completed a Verification of Disability, certifying that Claimant is permanently disabled.

As indicated from Claimant's objective medical records, Claimant is unable to work due to his mental impairments. Therefore, the Administrative Law Judge, based on the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons stated on the record, if any, finds Claimant disabled for purposes of the SDA benefit program.

# DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides the Department erred in determining Claimant is not currently disabled for SDA eligibility purposes.

Accordingly, the Department's decision is **REVERSED**, and it is ORDERED that:

- 1. The Department shall process Claimant's May 15, 2014, SDA application, and shall award him all the benefits he may be entitled to receive, as long as he meets the remaining financial and non-financial eligibility factors.
- 2. The Department shall determine whether Claimant is entitled to retroactive SDA benefits and if so, ensure the benefits are given to a guardian for Claimant, as Claimant has admitted he is not good with money and the independent psychiatrist opined Claimant would be unable to handle funds.
- 3. The Department shall review Claimant's medical condition for improvement in September, 2015, unless his Social Security Administration disability status is approved by that time.
- 4. The Department shall obtain updated medical evidence from Claimant's treating physicians, physical therapists, pain clinic notes, etc. regarding his continued treatment, progress and prognosis at review, in particular from his primary care physician and a psychiatrist.

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**NOTICE OF APPEAL:** A party may appeal this Hearing Decision in the circuit court in the county in which he/she resides, or the circuit court in Ingham County, within 30 days of the receipt date.

A party may request a rehearing or reconsideration of this Hearing Decision from the Michigan Administrative Hearing System (MAHS) within 30 days of the mailing date of this Hearing Decision, or MAHS may order a rehearing or reconsideration on its own motion.

MAHS may grant a party's Request for Rehearing or Reconsideration when one of the following exists:

- Newly discovered evidence that existed at the time of the original hearing that could affect the outcome of the original hearing decision;
- Misapplication of manual policy or law in the hearing decision which led to a wrong conclusion;
- Typographical, mathematical or other obvious error in the hearing decision that affects the rights of the client;
- Failure of the ALJ to address in the hearing decision relevant issues raised in the hearing request.

The party requesting a rehearing or reconsideration must specify all reasons for the request. MAHS will not review any response to a request for rehearing/reconsideration. A request must be *received* in MAHS within 30 days of the date this Hearing Decision is mailed.
