### ISSUE

Did the Department properly deny Appellant's prior authorization request for a lower partial denture?

### **FINDINGS OF FACT**

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

represented the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS or Department).

- 1. On or about \_\_\_\_\_\_, the Department received a prior authorization request filed by Appellant's dentist on her behalf and requesting upper and lower partial dentures for Appellant. (Exhibit A, page 9).
- 2. On the control of the Department sent Appellant written notice that the request for an upper partial denture was approved. (Exhibit A, pages 6-7).
- 3. That same day, the Department also sent Appellant written notice that the request for a lower partial denture was denied. (Exhibit A, page 8).
- 4. Regarding the specific reason for the denial, the notice sent by the Department stated in part: "Complete or partial dentures are authorized if

there are less than eight posterior teeth in occlusion (fixed bridges and dentures are considered to occluding teeth). Policy 6.6.A." (Exhibit A, page 8).

- 5. After Appellant has her approved upper partial denture placed, she will have eight posterior teeth in occlusion. (Exhibit A, page 9; Testimony of Department's Analyst).
- 6. On Management, the Michigan Administrative Hearing System (MAHS) received the request for hearing filed in this matter. (Exhibit A, page 4).

### **CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**

The Medical Assistance Program is established pursuant to Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). It is administered in accordance with state statutes, the Social Welfare Act, the Administrative Code, and the State Plan under Title XIX of the Social Security Act Medical Assistance Program.

Medicaid covered benefits are addressed for the practitioners and beneficiaries in the Medicaid Provider Manual (MPM). Regarding the specific request in this case, the applicable version of the MPM states:

### **6.6 PROSTHODONTICS (REMOVABLE)**

### **6.6.A. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS**

Complete and partial dentures are benefits for all beneficiaries. All dentures require PA. Providers must assess the beneficiary's general oral health and provide a five-year prognosis for the prosthesis requested. An upper partial denture PA request must also include the prognosis of six sound teeth.

# <u>Complete or partial dentures are authorized when</u> one or more of the following conditions exist:

- One or more anterior teeth are missing.
- There are less than eight posterior teeth in occlusion (fixed bridges and dentures are to be considered occluding teeth).
- An existing complete or partial denture cannot be made serviceable through repair.

# <u>relining, adjustment, or duplicating</u> (rebasing) procedures.

If an existing complete or partial denture can be made serviceable, the dentist should provide the needed restorations to maintain use of the existing removable prosthesis. This includes extracting teeth, adding teeth to the existing prosthesis, and removing hyperplastic tissue as necessary to restore the functionality of the complete or partial denture.

Before the final impressions are taken for the fabrication of a complete or partial denture, adequate healing necessary to support the prosthesis must take place following the completion of extractions and/or surgical procedures. This includes the posterior ridges of any immediate denture. When an immediate denture is authorized involving the six anterior teeth (cuspid to cuspid), this requirement is waived.

Reimbursement for a complete or partial denture includes all necessary adjustments, relines, repairs, and duplications within six months of insertion. This also includes such services necessary for an immediate upper denture when authorized. If any necessary adjustments or repairs are identified within the six month time period but are not provided until after the six month time period, no additional reimbursement is allowed for these services.

Complete or partial dentures are not authorized when:

- A previous prosthesis has been provided within five years, whether or not the existing denture was obtained through Medicaid.
- An adjustment, reline, repair, or duplication will make them serviceable.
- Replacement of a complete or partial denture that has been lost or broken beyond repair is not a benefit within five years, whether or not the existing denture was obtained through Medicaid.

When denture services have commenced but irreversible circumstances have prevented delivery, the dentist should bill using the Not Otherwise Classified (NOC) procedure code. A copy of the lab bill and an explanation in the Remarks section of the claim must be included. Providers are paid a reduced rate to offset a portion of the costs incurred. It is the expectation that the probability of removable appliances being delivered and follow-up treatment completed is assessed prior to the initiation of treatment to evaluate whether the treatment is appropriate for the specific patient. Contact the Program Review Division (PRD) regarding the requirements for incomplete dentures. (Refer to the Directory Appendix for contact information.)

MPM, October 1, 2015 version Dental Chapter, pages 19-20 (Emphasis added)

Appellant bears the burden of proving by a preponderance of the evidence that the Department erred in denying her prior authorization request. Based on the evidence in this case, Appellant has failed to meet that burden of proof.

The above policy clearly states that a partial denture would only be authorized in this case if Appellant has less than eight posterior teeth in occlusion and, here, Appellant will have eight posterior teeth in occlusion, *i.e.* biting together, once she receives the upper partial denture that has been approved.

In response, Appellant testified that, while she does have ten lower teeth, she is missing all of her lower molars and that it is very difficult for her to chew food, especially since she had surgery last year. She also testified that she is having her upper partial denture placed soon, but that she does not think it will be enough given her lack of molars.

However, as testified to by the Department's witness and demonstrated by the prior authorization itself, even with Appellant missing lower molars, she still has four lower posterior teeth that will occlude with four upper posterior teeth after her upper partial denture is placed. Per policy, dentures are considered occluding teeth and, while Appellant has not yet received her upper partial denture, it has already been approved and the Department properly took the approved denture into account when reviewing the request for a lower partial denture.

Accordingly, the available information clearly demonstrated that Appellant does not meet the criteria for the lower partial denture and the Department's decision must be affirmed.

### **DECISION AND ORDER**

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, finds that the Department properly denied Appellant's prior authorization request for a lower partial denture.

#### IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED THAT:

The Department's decision is AFFIRMED.
