HEARING DECISION FOR INTENTIONAL PROGRAM VIOLATION

Upon request for a hearing by the Department of Health and Human Services (Department), this matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and in accordance with Titles 7, 42 and 45 of the Code of Federal Regulations, particularly 7 CFR 273.16 and 45 CFR 235.110, and with Mich Admin Code, R 400.3130 and R 400.3178. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on November 22, 2016, from Lansing, Michigan.

The Department was represented by Recoupme	ent Specialist	of the
Office of Inspector General (OIG).	testified on behalf of the Depa	rtment.
The Department submitted exhibits which were admitted into evidence.		

Respondent did not appear at the hearing and it was held in Respondent's absence pursuant to 7 CFR 273.16(e), Mich Admin Code R 400.3130(5), or Mich Admin Code R 400.3178(5). The record closed at the conclusion of the hearing.

ISSUES

- 1. Did Respondent receive an overissuance of Food Assistance Program (FAP) and State Emergency Relief (SER) benefits that the Department is entitled to recoup?
- 2. Did the Department establish, by clear and convincing evidence, that Respondent committed an Intentional Program Violation (IPV)?
- 3. Should Respondent be disqualified from receiving FAP for one year?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- 1. The Department's OIG filed a hearing request on March 23, 2016, to establish an overissuance of benefits received by Respondent as a result of Respondent failing to list as living in the home and, as such, allegedly committed an IPV.
- 2. Respondent's daughter's father. [Dept. Exh. 19, 38, 55].
- 3. The OIG has requested that Respondent be disqualified for one year from receiving FAP benefits. [Dept. Exh. 4].
- 4. Respondent was a recipient of FAP and SER benefits issued by the Department. [Dept. Exh. 4].
- 5. On the FAP and SER Assistance Application signed by Respondent on July 25, 2013, Respondent indicated that did not reside in her home. [Dept. Exh. 13-30].
- 6. On April 24, 2014, Respondent submitted a FAP Assistance Application indicating that was not a member of her household. [Dept. Exh. 31-48].
- 7. On June 24, 2014, Respondent submitted an SER Application and indicated that was not living in her home. [Dept. Exh. 49-64].
- 8. Respondent was aware of the responsibility to report all persons residing in her home to the Department. [Dept. Exh. 30, 48, 64].
- 9. Respondent had no apparent physical or mental impairment that would limit the understanding or ability to fulfill this requirement. [Dept. Exh. 19, 38, 55].
- 10. On July 11, 2014, the Department received information from the Work Number showing had been employed at since April 27, 2004. He listed his home address with his employer as Respondent's address. [Dept. Exh. 65-69].
- 11. On July 21, 2014, was interviewed in Respondent's home and told the Department representative that he lived in the home with Respondent and her two daughters. [Dept. Exh. 4].

12. The OIG indicates that the amounts, programs and time periods they are considering the fraud periods from are:

a. FAP
b. FAP
c. SER
d. SER

July 25, 2013 – December 31, 2013 April 24, 2014 – June 30, 2014 August 7, 2013 – August 7, 2013 July 2, 2014 – July 2, 2014

- 13. During the alleged fraud periods, Respondent was issued a total of FAP and SER benefits from the State of Michigan and was only entitled to in FAP benefits based on unreported income, resulting in a overissuance. [Dept. Exh. 4-5].
- 14. This was Respondent's first alleged IPV.
- 15. A notice of hearing was mailed to Respondent at the last known address and was not returned by the US Post Office as undeliverable.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Department policies are contained in the Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), Adult Services Manual (ASM), and Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The State Emergency Relief (SER) program is established by the Social Welfare Act, MCL 400.1-.119b. The SER program is administered by the Department (formerly known as the Family Independence Agency) pursuant to MCL 400.10 and Mich Admin Code, R 400.7001 through R 400.7049.

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) [formerly known as the Food Stamp program] is established by the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008, as amended, 7 USC 2011 to 2036a and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in 7 CFR 273. The Department (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10; the Social Welfare Act, MCL 400.1-.119b; and Mich Admin Code, R 400.3001 to .3015.

Effective January 1, 2016, the Department's OIG requests IPV hearings for the following cases:

- FAP trafficking OIs that are not forwarded to the prosecutor.
- Prosecution of welfare fraud or FAP trafficking is declined by the prosecutor for a reason other than lack of evidence, and

- The total amount for the FIP, SDA, CDC, MA and FAP programs combined is \$500 or more, or
- the total amount is less than \$500, and
 - the group has a previous IPV, or
 - the alleged IPV involves FAP trafficking, or
 - ➤ the alleged fraud involves concurrent receipt of assistance (see BEM 222), or
 - the alleged fraud is committed by a state/government employee. BAM 720, pp 12-13 (1/1/2016).

Intentional Program Violation

Suspected IPV means an OI exists for which all three of the following conditions exist:

- The client intentionally failed to report information or intentionally gave incomplete or inaccurate information needed to make a correct benefit determination, and
- The client was clearly and correctly instructed regarding his or her reporting responsibilities, and
- The client has no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits his or her understanding or ability to fulfill reporting responsibilities. BAM 720, p 1.

An IPV requires that the Department establish by clear and convincing evidence that the client has intentionally withheld or misrepresented information for the purpose of establishing, maintaining, increasing or preventing reduction of program benefits or eligibility. BAM 720, p 1 (emphasis in original); see also 7 CFR 273(e)(6). Clear and convincing evidence is evidence sufficient to result in a clear and firm belief that the proposition is true. See M Civ JI 8.01.

In this case, the record evidence clearly shows that was residing in Respondent's household, and he had been employed at since 2004 and still was. The Department established by clear and convincing evidence that Respondent intentionally withheld and misrepresented information that was not residing in her household for the purpose of obtaining and maintaining FAP and SER benefits. Therefore, the Department has established an Intentional Program Violation.

Disqualification

A court or hearing decision that finds a client committed an IPV disqualifies that client from receiving program benefits. BAM 720, p 15. A disqualified recipient remains a member of an active group as long as he lives with them, and other eligible group members may continue to receive benefits. BAM 720, p 17.

Clients who commit an IPV are disqualified for a standard disqualification period except when a court orders a different period, or except when the OI relates to MA or FAP. BAM 720, p 13. Clients are disqualified for periods of one year for the first IPV, two years for the second IPV, lifetime disqualification for the third IPV, and ten years for a FAP concurrent receipt of benefits. BAM 720, p 18.

Respondent's signatures on the Assistance Applications from July 25, 2013; April 24, 2014; and June 24, 2014, certify that she was aware that fraudulent participation in FAP and SER could result in criminal or civil or administrative claims. This Administrative Law Judge therefore concludes that the Department has shown, by clear and convincing evidence, that Respondent committed a first intentional violation of the SER and FAP programs, resulting in a one year disqualification for FAP benefits.

Overissuance

When a client group receives more benefits than entitled to receive, the Department must attempt to recoup the overissuance. BAM 700, p 1 (1/1/2016).

In the above captioned matter, the record evidence shows Respondent intentionally failed to report that was a member of her household. This resulted in a total overissuance of for FAP and SER for the fraud periods of July 25, 2013 through December 31, 2013; April 24, 2014 through June 30, 2014; August 7, 2013; and July 2, 2014, which the Department is entitled to recoup.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons stated on the record, concludes that:

- 1. The Department has established by clear and convincing evidence that Respondent committed an IPV.
- 2. Respondent did receive a total overissuance of FAP and SER benefits in the amount of

The Department is ORDERED to initiate recoupment/collection procedures for the amount of in accordance with Department policy.

It is FURTHER ORDERED that Respondent be personally disqualified from participation in the FAP for one year.
