#### **HEARING DECISION FOR INTENTIONAL PROGRAM VIOLATION**

Upon request for a hearing by the Department of Health and Human Services (Department), this matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and in accordance with Titles 7, 42 and 45 of the Code of Federal Regulations, particularly 7 CFR 273.16 and 45 CFR 235.110, and with Mich Admin Code, R 400.3130 and R 400.3178. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on November 22, 2016, from Lansing, Michigan.

Respondent did not appear at the hearing and it was held in Respondent's absence pursuant to 7 CFR 273.16(e), Mich Admin Code R 400.3130(5), or Mich Admin Code R 400.3178(5). The record closed at the conclusion of the hearing.

#### **ISSUES**

- 1. Did Respondent receive an overissuance of Food Assistance Program (FAP) benefits that the Department is entitled to recoup?
- 2. Did the Department establish, by clear and convincing evidence, that Respondent committed an Intentional Program Violation (IPV)?
- 3. Should Respondent be disqualified from receiving FAP for one year?

# **FINDINGS OF FACT**

The Administrative Law Judge, based on competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

on t	he whole record, finds as material fact:
1.	The Department's OIG filed a hearing request on March 31, 2016, to establish an overissuance of benefits received by Respondent as a result of Respondent having failed to report was a member of her household and, as such, allegedly committed an IPV.
2.	The OIG has requested that Respondent be disqualified for one year from receiving program benefits.
3.	Respondent was a recipient of FAP benefits issued by the Department.
4.	On the Assistance Application signed by Respondent on July 27, 2011, Respondent did not list as residing in her home. [Dept. Exh. 15-34].
5.	is Respondent's fiancée and her daughter's father. [Dept. Exh. 4-5].
6.	On October 3, 2011, the Department received Respondent's FAP Redetermination signed by Respondent on September 22, 2011. is not listed as residing in Respondent's home. [Dept. Exh. 35-38].
7.	On June 27, 2012, the Department received Respondent's FAP Redetermination, signed by Respondent on June 18, 2012
8.	Respondent was aware of the responsibility to report all persons residing in her home to the Department. [Dept. Exh. 34, 38, 42].
9.	Respondent had no apparent physical or mental impairments that would limit the understanding or ability to fulfill this requirement.
10.	On January 2, 2012, completed a New Employee Checklist. He listed Respondent as his girlfriend and emergency contact. He listed his address as Respondent's address on the W-4 Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate and on the Form I-9 Employment Eligibility Verification. [Dept. Exh. 61-68].
11.	On February 24, 2016, the Department received Employee Wage History showing he was employed at beginning the second quarter of 2011 through the end of 2013. [Dept. Exh. 69-70].

- 12. The OIG indicates that the time period they are considering the fraud period is November 1, 2011, through April 30, 2013.
- 13. During the alleged fraud period, Respondent was issued in FAP benefits from the State of Michigan and was only entitled to based on unreported income, resulting in a overissuance. [Dept. Exh. 4-5].
- 14. This was Respondent's first alleged IPV.
- 15. A notice of hearing was mailed to Respondent at the last known address and was not returned by the US Post Office as undeliverable.

#### **CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**

Department policies are contained in the Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), Adult Services Manual (ASM), and Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) [formerly known as the Food Stamp program] is established by the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008, as amended, 7 USC 2011 to 2036a and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in 7 CFR 273. The Department (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10; the Social Welfare Act, MCL 400.1-.119b; and Mich Admin Code, R 400.3001 to .3015.

Effective January 1, 2016, the Department's OIG requests IPV hearings for the following cases:

- FAP trafficking Ols that are not forwarded to the prosecutor.
- Prosecution of welfare fraud or FAP trafficking is declined by the prosecutor for a reason other than lack of evidence, and
  - The total amount for the FIP, SDA, CDC, MA and FAP programs combined is \$500 or more, or
  - the total amount is less than \$500, and
    - > the group has a previous IPV, or
    - > the alleged IPV involves FAP trafficking, or
    - the alleged fraud involves concurrent receipt of assistance (see BEM 222), or

➤ the alleged fraud is committed by a state/government employee. BAM 720, pp 12-13 (1/1/2016).

## **Intentional Program Violation**

Suspected IPV means an OI exists for which all three of the following conditions exist:

- The client intentionally failed to report information or intentionally gave incomplete or inaccurate information needed to make a correct benefit determination, and
- The client was clearly and correctly instructed regarding his or her reporting responsibilities, and
- The client has no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits his or her understanding or ability to fulfill reporting responsibilities. BAM 720, p 1.

An IPV requires that the Department establish by clear and convincing evidence that the client has intentionally withheld or misrepresented information for the purpose of establishing, maintaining, increasing or preventing reduction of program benefits or eligibility. BAM 720, p 1 (emphasis in original); see also 7 CFR 273(e)(6). Clear and convincing evidence is evidence sufficient to result in a clear and firm belief that the proposition is true. See M Civ JI 8.01.

Therefore, the Department has established an Intentional Program Violation.						

#### Disqualification

A court or hearing decision that finds a client committed an IPV disqualifies that client from receiving program benefits. BAM 720, p 15. A disqualified recipient remains a member of an active group as long as he lives with them, and other eligible group members may continue to receive benefits. BAM 720, p 17.

Clients who commit an IPV are disqualified for a standard disqualification period except when a court orders a different period, or except when the OI relates to MA or FAP. BAM 720, p 13. Clients are disqualified for periods of one year for the first IPV, two years for the second IPV, lifetime disqualification for the third IPV, and ten years for a FAP concurrent receipt of benefits. BAM 720, p 18.

Respondent's signature on the Assistance Application from July 27, 2011, and on the Redeterminations dated October 3, 2011 and June 7, 2012, certify that she was aware that fraudulent participation in FAP could result in criminal or civil or administrative claims. This Administrative Law Judge therefore concludes that the Department has shown, by clear and convincing evidence, that Respondent committed a first intentional violation of the FAP program, resulting in a one year disqualification.

#### **Overissuance**

When a client group receives more benefits than entitled to receive, the Department must attempt to recoup the overissuance. BAM 700, p 1 (1/1/2016).

In the above captioned matter, the record evidence shows Respondent intentionally failed to report that was a member of her household to the Department. This resulted in an overissuance of for the fraud period of November 1, 2011, through April 30, 2013, which the Department is entitled to recoup.

## **DECISION AND ORDER**

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons stated on the record, concludes that:

- 1. The Department has established by clear and convincing evidence that Respondent committed an IPV.
- 2. Respondent did receive an overissuance of Food Assistance Program benefits in the amount of \_\_\_\_\_\_.

The Department is ORDERED to initiate recoupment/collection procedures for the amount of accordance with Department policy.

It is FURTHER ORDERED that Respondent be personally disqualified from participation in the Food Assistance Program for one year.
