DECISION AND ORDER

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and 42 CFR 431.200 *et seq.*, upon the Petitioner's request for a hearing.

After due notice, a hearing was held on [REDACTED]. Petitioner [REDACTED] appeared on behalf of the Petitioner. [REDACTED], Appeals Review Officer and [REDACTED], Medicaid Utilization Analyst represented the Department of Health and Human Services (Department).

State's Exhibit a pages 1-12 were admitted as evidence.

ISSUE

Did the Department properly deny Petitioner's request for prior authorization (PA) for dentures?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. Petitioner is a Medicaid beneficiary.
2. On [REDACTED], the Department received a prior authorization request from on behalf of Petitioner for upper partial denture.
3. Per MDHHS database, Petitioner received complete upper and lower dentures on [REDACTED].
4. On [REDACTED], the request for upper dentures was reviewed and denied because Petitioner was shown to have received such prosthesis within the last five years.

5. On [REDACTED], the Department sent Petitioner a Notice of Denial. Petitioner was further advised of her appeal rights.
6. On [REDACTED], the Michigan Administrative Hearing System (MAHS) received Petitioner's Request for Hearing. (State's Exhibit A p 2)

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance Program is established pursuant to Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). It is administered in accordance with state statute, the Social Welfare Act, the Administrative Code, and the State Plan under Title XIX of the Social Security Act Medical Assistance Program.

1.10 PRIOR AUTHORIZATION

Medicaid requires prior authorization (PA) to cover certain services before those services are rendered to the beneficiary. The purpose of PA is to review the medical need for certain services. . . .

Medicaid Provider Manual, (MPM)

Under the general policy instructions for Medicaid related dental services the MPM sets replacement schedules for denture repair and replacement:

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

Complete and partial dentures are benefits for all beneficiaries. All dentures require PA. Providers must assess the beneficiary's general oral health and provide a five-year prognosis for the prosthesis requested. An upper partial denture PA request must also include the prognosis of six sound teeth.

Complete or partial dentures are authorized:

- If there is one or more anterior teeth missing;
- If there are less than eight posterior teeth in occlusion (fixed bridges and dentures are to be considered occluding teeth); or
- Where an existing complete or partial denture cannot be made serviceable through repair, relining,

adjustment, or duplicating (rebasing) procedures. If a partial denture can be made serviceable, the dentist should provide the needed restorations to maintain use of the existing partial, extract teeth, add teeth to an existing partial, and remove hyperplastic tissue....

Reimbursement for a complete or partial denture includes all necessary adjustments, relines, repairs, and duplications within six months of insertion. This includes such services for an immediate upper denture when authorized.

If a complete or partial denture requires an adjustment, reline, repair, or duplication within six months of insertion, but the services were not provided until after six months of insertion, no additional reimbursement is allowed for these services.

Complete or partial dentures are not authorized when:

- A previous prosthesis has been provided within five years, whether or not the existing denture was obtained through Medicaid.
- An adjustment, reline, repair, or duplication will make them serviceable.
- Replacement of a complete or partial denture that has been lost or broken beyond repair is not a benefit within five years, whether or not the existing denture was obtained through Medicaid.

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MPM, Dental, §6.6A, April 1, 2014, pp. 17, 18

At the hearing the Department witness testified that Petitioner's request was denied for failure to meet policy requirements for prosthesis replacement on a 5-year rotation. According to the Department's evidence, Petitioner received complete upper dentures and lower dentures on [REDACTED] and is not eligible to receive new dentures until [REDACTED]. Petitioner alleged that her partial was stolen. Her dentist would not accept the police report about the stolen dentures.

On review, the Department's decision to deny the request for dentures was reached within policy. Department records show that complete upper and lower dentures were placed for Petitioner on [REDACTED] and paid for by Medicaid as received. As such, Petitioner is not eligible for replacement dentures until [REDACTED]. The only way the Department may consider an exception to the rule is if Petitioner submits a new a prior authorization request with a police report concerning the stolen dentures.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that the Department properly denied the Petitioner's request for PA for partial upper dentures.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that:

The Department's decision is **AFFIRMED**.
