**HEARING DECISION FOR CONCURRENT BENEFITS**  
**INTENTIONAL PROGRAM VIOLATION**

Upon the request for a hearing by the Department of Health and Human Services (Department), this matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and in accordance with Titles 7, 42 and 45 of the Code of Federal Regulations, particularly 7 CFR 273.16 and 45 CFR 235.110, and with Mich Admin Code, R 400.3130 and R 400.3178. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on [REDACTED], from Detroit, Michigan. The Department was represented by [REDACTED] of the Office of Inspector General (OIG).

Respondent did not appear at the hearing and it was held in Respondent's absence pursuant to 7 CFR 273.16(e), Mich Admin Code R 400.3130(5), or Mich Admin Code R 400.3178(5).

**ISSUES**

1. Did Respondent receive an overissuance (OI) of FAP benefits that the Department is entitled to recoup?
2. Did the Department establish, by clear and convincing evidence, that Respondent committed an Intentional Program Violation (IPV)?
3. Should Respondent be disqualified from receiving FAP benefits for a period of ten years?

### **FINDINGS OF FACT**

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. The Department's OIG filed a hearing request on [REDACTED] to establish an OI of benefits received by Respondent as a result of Respondent having received concurrent program benefits and, as such, allegedly committed an IPV.
2. The OIG has requested that Respondent be disqualified from receiving program benefits.
3. Respondent was a recipient of FAP benefits issued by the Department.
4. Respondent was aware of the responsibility to report changes in her/his residence to the Department.
5. Respondent had no apparent physical or mental impairment that would limit the understanding or ability to fulfill this requirement.
6. Respondent began using FAP benefits outside of the State of Michigan beginning on [REDACTED].
7. The OIG indicates that the time period they are considering the fraud period is [REDACTED].
8. During the alleged fraud period, Respondent was issued [REDACTED] in FAP benefits from the State of Michigan.
9. During the alleged fraud period, Respondent was issued FAP benefits from the State of Georgia in [REDACTED].
10. This was Respondent's first alleged IPV.
11. A notice of hearing was mailed to Respondent at the last known address and was not returned by the US Post Office as undeliverable.

### **CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**

Department policies are contained in the Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), and Department of Health and Human Services Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) [formerly known as the Food Stamp program] is established by the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008, as amended, 7 USC 2011 to 2036a and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in 7 CFR 273. The Department (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10, the Social Welfare Act, MCL 400.1-.119b, and Mich Admin Code, R 400.3001 to .3015.

Effective January 1, 2016, the Department's OIG requests IPV hearings for the following cases:

- FAP trafficking OIs that are not forwarded to the prosecutor.
- Prosecution of welfare fraud or FAP trafficking is declined by the prosecutor for a reason other than lack of evidence, and
  - The total amount for the FIP, SDA, CDC, MA and FAP programs combined is \$500 or more, or
  - the total amount is less than \$500, and
    - the group has a previous IPV, or
    - the alleged IPV involves FAP trafficking, or
    - the alleged fraud involves concurrent receipt of assistance (see BEM 222), or
    - the alleged fraud is committed by a state/government employee.

BAM 720 (January 2016), p. 12-13.

### **Intentional Program Violation**

Suspected IPV means an OI exists for which all three of the following conditions exist:

- The client intentionally failed to report information **or** intentionally gave incomplete or inaccurate information needed to make a correct benefit determination, and
- The client was clearly and correctly instructed regarding his or her reporting responsibilities, and
- The client has no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits his or her understanding or ability to fulfill reporting responsibilities.

BAM 700 (January 2016), p. 7; BAM 720, p. 1.

An IPV is also suspected for a client who is alleged to have trafficked FAP benefits. BAM 720, p. 1.

An IPV requires that the Department establish by clear and convincing evidence that the client has intentionally withheld or misrepresented information for the **purpose** of establishing, maintaining, increasing or preventing reduction of program benefits or eligibility. BAM 720, p. 1 (emphasis in original); see also 7 CFR 273(e)(6). Clear and convincing evidence is evidence sufficient to result in a clear and firm belief that the proposition is true. See M Civ JI 8.01.

In this case, the Department alleges that Respondent committed an IPV of his FAP benefits because he received Michigan-issued FAP benefits at the same time he was issued FAP benefits in Georgia. Under Department policy, a person **cannot** receive FAP in more than one state for any month. BEM 222 (July 2013), p. 3. In support of its contention that Respondent committed an IPV, the Department presented an application submitted by Respondent on [REDACTED] in which he acknowledged that he received the Information Booklet advising of "Things You Must Do", which explained reporting change circumstances.

The Department presented correspondence which revealed that Respondent began working in Georgia on [REDACTED] and provided a Georgia address for purposes of employment. The Department testified that it spoke to a representative from the State of Georgia on [REDACTED] who confirmed that Respondent received FAP benefits from the State of Georgia in [REDACTED]. Under Department policy, out of state benefit receipt or termination may be verified by one of the following:

- DHS-3782, Out-of-State Inquiry.
- Letter or document from other state.
- Collateral contact with the state. BEM 222 (July 2013), p. 4.

The Department confirmed that it received correspondence confirming the receipt of benefits in Georgia in [REDACTED], but failed to include the correspondence in the hearing packet. The Department's testimony under oath relating to both the telephone call and the confirmation email is found to be sufficient to satisfy the collateral contact requirement for verification of the out of state receipt of benefits.

The Department further presented a benefit issuance summary relating to Respondent's Michigan-issued FAP benefits which indicated that Respondent also received Michigan-issued FAP benefits [REDACTED] [REDACTED]. The transaction usage history revealed that Respondent used his Michigan-issued benefits in Georgia beginning on [REDACTED] [REDACTED] and continued to do so until [REDACTED]. As such, Respondent used his Michigan-issued FAP benefits in Georgia prior to applying, during the same month in which he applied and after he applied for FAP benefits in Georgia.

The Department further testified that Respondent neither reported his change in residency or his new employment to the Department within 10 days. Given that Respondent failed to report his work or change in residency; used Michigan issued benefits out of state for nine months and applied for FAP benefits in another state while receiving benefits from Michigan, it is found that the Department has established that Respondent intentionally withheld or misrepresented information for the purpose of maintaining FAP benefits.

### **Disqualification**

A court or hearing decision that finds a client committed an IPV disqualifies that client from receiving program benefits. BAM 720, p. 15. A disqualified recipient remains a member of an active group as long as he lives with them, and other eligible group members may continue to receive benefits. BAM 720, p. 16.

Clients who commit an IPV are disqualified for a standard disqualification period except when a court orders a different period, or except when the OI relates to MA. BAM 720, p. 16. Clients are disqualified for periods of one year for the first IPV, two years for the second IPV, lifetime disqualification for the third IPV, and ten years for a FAP concurrent receipt of benefits. BAM 720, p. 16.

In this case, the Department has satisfied its burden of showing that Respondent committed an IPV concerning FAP benefits. Accordingly, Respondent is subject to a ten year disqualification under the FAP program.

### **Overissuance**

When a client group receives more benefits than they are entitled to receive, the Department must attempt to recoup the OI. BAM 700, p. 1. At the hearing, the Department established that the State of Michigan issued a total of [REDACTED] in FAP benefits to Respondent during the fraud period. The Department alleges that Respondent was eligible for [REDACTED] in FAP benefits during this period.

In support of its contention that Respondent was overissued FAP benefits, the Department presented Respondent's FAP transaction history showing that she used her FAP benefits issued by the State of Michigan exclusively in Georgia from [REDACTED] [REDACTED]. Respondent was no longer eligible for FAP benefits after he resided outside Michigan for more than 30 days. See BEM 212, p 2. There is no evidence that Respondent returned to Michigan after he began using his benefits out of state in [REDACTED]. By [REDACTED] it was clear that Respondent had been residing outside the State of Michigan for more than 30 days. Therefore, the Department has established it is entitled to recoup the [REDACTED] in FAP benefits it issued to Respondent during the fraud period.

**DECISION AND ORDER**


The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons stated on the record, if any, concludes that:

1. The Department has established by clear and convincing evidence that Respondent committed an IPV.
2. Respondent did receive an OI of program FAP benefits in the amount of [REDACTED] for benefits issued from [REDACTED].

The Department is ORDERED to initiate recoupment procedures for the amount of [REDACTED] in accordance with Department policy.

It is FURTHER ORDERED that Respondent is subject to a ten year disqualification from FAP benefits.
