### **HEARING DECISION FOR INTENTIONAL PROGRAM VIOLATION**

Upon the request for a hearing by the Department of Health and Human Services (Department), this matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9, and in accordance with Titles 7, 42 and 45 of the Code of Federal Regulation (CFR), particularly 7 CFR 273.16 and 45 CFR 235.110; and with Mich Admin Code, R 400.3130 and 400.3178. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on [REDACTED] from Detroit, Michigan. The Department was represented by [REDACTED] Regulation Agent of the Office of Inspector General (OIG).

Respondent did not appear at the hearing; and it was held in Respondent's absence pursuant to 7 CFR 273.16(e), Mich Admin Code R 400.3130(5), or Mich Admin Code R 400.3178(5).

### **ISSUES**

1. Did Respondent receive an overissuance (OI) of FAP benefits that the Department is entitled to recoup?
2. Did the Department establish, by clear and convincing evidence, that Respondent committed an Intentional Program Violation (IPV)?
3. Should Respondent be disqualified from receiving FAP benefits for 12 months?

### **FINDINGS OF FACT**

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. The Department's OIG filed a hearing request on [REDACTED], to establish an OI of benefits received by Respondent as a result of Respondent having allegedly committed an IPV.
2. The OIG has requested that Respondent be disqualified from receiving program benefits.
3. Respondent was a recipient of FAP benefits issued by the Department.
4. Respondent was aware of the responsibility to not engage in trafficking of FAP benefits.
5. Respondent did not have an apparent physical or mental impairment that would limit the understanding or ability to fulfill this requirement.
6. The Department's OIG indicates that the time period it is considering the fraud period is [REDACTED] through [REDACTED] (fraud period).
7. During the fraud period, Respondent was issued [REDACTED] in FAP benefits by the State of Michigan, and the Department alleges that Respondent was entitled to [REDACTED] in such benefits during this time period.
8. The Department alleges that Respondent received an OI in FAP benefits in the amount of [REDACTED].
9. This was Respondent's first alleged IPV.
10. A notice of hearing was mailed to Respondent at the last known address and was not returned by the US Post Office as undeliverable.

### **CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**

Department policies are contained in the Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), Adult Services Manual (ASM), and Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) [formerly known as the Food Stamp program] is established by the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008, as amended, 7 USC 2011 to 2036a and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in 7 CFR 273. The Department (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10; the Social Welfare Act, MCL 400.1-.119b; and Mich Admin Code, R 400.3001 to .3015.

Effective October 1, 2014, the Department's OIG requests IPV hearings for the following cases:

- Willful overpayments of \$500.00 or more under the AHH program.
- FAP trafficking overissuances that are not forwarded to the prosecutor.
- Prosecution of welfare fraud or FAP trafficking is declined by the prosecutor for a reason other than lack of evidence, and
  - The total amount for the FIP, SDA, CDC, MA and FAP programs combined is \$500 or more, or
  - the total amount is less than \$500, and
    - the group has a previous IPV, or
    - the alleged IPV involves FAP trafficking, or
    - the alleged fraud involves concurrent receipt of assistance (see BEM 222), or
    - the alleged fraud is committed by a state/government employee.

BAM 720 (January 2016), pp.12-13;

### **Intentional Program Violation**

Suspected IPV means an OI exists for which all three of the following conditions exist:

- The client intentionally failed to report information **or** intentionally gave incomplete or inaccurate information needed to make a correct benefit determination, and
- The client was clearly and correctly instructed regarding his or her reporting responsibilities, and
- The client has no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits his or her understanding or ability to fulfill reporting responsibilities.

BAM 700 (January 2016), p. 7; BAM 720, p. 1.

An IPV is also suspected for a client who is alleged to have trafficked FAP benefits. BAM 720, p. 1.

An IPV requires that the Department establish by clear and convincing evidence that the client has intentionally withheld or misrepresented information for the **purpose** of establishing, maintaining, increasing or preventing reduction of program benefits or eligibility. BAM 720, p. 1 (emphasis in original); see also 7 CFR 273(e)(6). Clear and convincing evidence is evidence sufficient to result in a clear and firm belief that the proposition is true. See M Civ JI 8.01.

Trafficking is (i) the buying or selling of FAP benefits for cash or consideration other than eligible food. BAM 700 (February 2013), p 1. Trafficking also includes (i) fraudulently using, transferring, altering, acquiring, or possessing coupons, authorization cards, or access devices, or (ii) redeeming or presenting for payment coupons known to be fraudulently obtained or transferred. BEM 203 (June 2013), p. 2.

The Department alleged that Respondent engaged in the trafficking of FAP benefits from [REDACTED] through [REDACTED] by engaging in unauthorized transactions. In support of this claim, the Department submitted transaction history which included, but was not limited to the following transactions:

The Department testified that purchases in excess of [REDACTED] at store of this size and with limited inventory is indicative of trafficking. The Department presented evidence to show that the convenience store was investigated on allegations of trafficking and has been permanently disqualified from participating in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).

Respondent's transaction history revealed that he typically only visited the convenience store once a month which coincided near the date his FAP benefits were issued. Respondent's transaction history also revealed that Respondent had access to a traditional grocery store and in fact made large dollar amount purchases at a grocery store on [REDACTED]. Given that there was limited inventory at the store and the large dollar amount of the purchases, it is found that the Department has established by clear and convincing evidence that Respondent trafficked his FAP benefits from [REDACTED]

The Department further alleged that Respondent committed an IPV of his FAP benefits from [REDACTED] because he failed to notify the Department when he became incarcerated and allowed an unauthorized person to use the card containing his FAP benefits, which it deemed to be trafficking. Additionally, Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) allows clients who receive cash (FIP, SDA etc.), and food (FAP) to receive their benefits using debit card technology. Benefits are deposited electronically into a cash and/or food account. Clients access their benefits by using their personal identification number (PIN), along with their Bridge card. BAM 401E (July 2013), p. 1.

The Department presented documentation from the [REDACTED] County Sheriff's Office which revealed that Respondent was incarcerated from [REDACTED] and again from [REDACTED]. The Department also presented a transaction history summary which indicated that the card containing Respondent's FAP benefits was used during his periods of incarceration.

The Department confirmed that Respondent did not report the card as being lost, stolen or missing. Given that either the numbers located on the card or the card itself (together with the personal identification number) would have been needed to access the benefits and that Respondent failed to report her incarceration, it is found that the Department has established by clear and convincing evidence that Respondent engaged in the trafficking of his FAP benefits by buying or selling of FAP benefits for cash or consideration other than eligible food and further engaged in the trafficking of his FAP benefits by allowing an authorized individual access to his bridge card during his periods of incarceration.

### **Disqualification**

A court or hearing decision that finds a client committed IPV disqualifies that client from receiving program benefits. BAM 720 (July 2013), p. 15. A disqualified recipient remains a member of an active group as long as he lives with them, and other eligible group members may continue to receive benefits. BAM 720, p. 15.

Clients who commit an IPV are disqualified for a standard disqualification period except when a court orders a different period. BAM 720, p. 16. Refusal to repay will not cause denial of current or future MA if the client is otherwise eligible. BAM 710 July 2013), p. 2. Clients are disqualified for periods of one year for the first IPV, two years for the second IPV, lifetime disqualification for the third IPV, and ten years for a FAP concurrent receipt of benefits. BAM 720, p. 16.

In this case, the Department has satisfied its burden of showing that Respondent committed an IPV concerning FAP benefits. Accordingly, Respondent is subject to a 12 month disqualification under the FAP program.

**Overissuance**

When a client group receives more benefits than they are entitled to receive, the Department must attempt to recoup the OI. BAM 700, p. 1. In this case, the benefit summary history provided by the Department establishes that Respondent was issued [REDACTED] in FAP benefits by the State of Michigan from [REDACTED] through [REDACTED]. However, the Department indicated that it was only seeking to recoup benefits used in unlawful purchases at the convenience store in question and the amount of FAP benefits used during Respondent's periods of incarceration which totaled [REDACTED]. As previously stated, the Department has established that Respondent trafficked her FAP benefits and as such, it is entitled to recoup [REDACTED].

**DECISION AND ORDER**


The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons stated on the record, if any, concludes that:

1. The Department has established by clear and convincing evidence that Respondent did commit an IPV on of FAP benefits
2. Respondent did receive an OI of program benefits in the amount of [REDACTED].

The Department is ORDERED to initiate recoupment procedures for the amount of [REDACTED] in accordance with Department policy.

It is FURTHER ORDERED that Respondent be disqualified from FAP for a period of 12 months.
