HEARING DECISION FOR INTENTIONAL PROGRAM VIOLATION

Upon the request for a hearing by the Department of Health and Human Services (Department), this matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9, and in accordance with Titles 7, 42 and 45 of the Code of Federal Regulation (CFR), particularly 7 CFR 273.16, 42 CFR 431.230(b), and 45 CFR 235.110, and with Mich Admin Code, R 400.3130 and 400.3178. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on December 11, 2017, from Detroit, Michigan. The Department was represented by **Example**, Regulation Agent of the Office of Inspector General (OIG).

Respondent did not appear at the hearing; and it was held in Respondent's absence pursuant to 7 CFR 273.16(e), Mich Admin Code R 400.3130(5), or Mich Admin Code R 400.3178(5).

ISSUES

- 1. Did Respondent receive an overissuance (OI) of FAP and MA benefits that the Department is entitled to recoup?
- 2. Did the Department establish, by clear and convincing evidence, that Respondent committed an Intentional Program Violation (IPV) of FAP benefits?
- 3. Should Respondent be disqualified from receiving FAP benefits for 12-months?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- 1. The Department's OIG filed a hearing request on June 21, 2017, to establish an OI of benefits received by Respondent as a result of Respondent having allegedly committed an IPV.
- 2. The OIG has requested that Respondent be disqualified from receiving FAP benefits.
- 3. Respondent was a recipient of FAP and MA benefits issued by the Department.
- 4. Respondent was aware of the responsibility to report changes in residency to the Department within 10 days.
- 5. Respondent did not have an apparent physical or mental impairment that would limit the understanding or ability to fulfill this requirement.
- 6. The Department's OIG indicates that the time period it is considering the fraud period is **period** is **period** (fraud period).
- 7. During the fraud period, Respondent was issued **Example** in FAP benefits by the State of Michigan, and the Department alleges that Respondent was entitled to in such benefits during this time period.
- 8. The Department alleges that Respondent received an OI in FAP benefits in the amount of **Exercise**.
- 9. During the fraud period, Respondent was issued **Example** in MA benefits by the State of Michigan, and the Department alleges that Respondent was entitled to in such benefits during this time period.
- 10. The Department alleges that Respondent received an OI in MA benefits in the amount of **Exercise**.
- 11. This was Respondent's first alleged IPV.
- 12. A notice of hearing was mailed to Respondent at the last known address and was not returned by the United States Postal Services as undeliverable.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Department policies are contained in the Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), Adult Services Manual (ASM), and Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) [formerly known as the Food Stamp program] is established by the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008, as amended, 7 USC 2011 to 2036a and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in 7 CFR 273. The

Department (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10; the Social Welfare Act, MCL 400.1-.119b; and Mich Admin Code, R 400.3001 to .3015.

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act, 42 USC 1396-1396w-5; 42 USC 1315; the Affordable Care Act of 2010, the collective term for the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, Pub. L. No. 111-148, as amended by the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010, Pub. L. No. 111-152; and 42 CFR 430.10-.25. The Department (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers the MA program pursuant to 42 CFR 435, MCL 400.10 and MCL 400.105-.112k.

Effective October 1, 2014, the Department's OIG requests IPV hearings for the following cases:

- Willful overpayments of \$500.00 or more under the AHH program.
- FAP trafficking overissuances that are not forwarded to the prosecutor.
- Prosecution of welfare fraud or FAP trafficking is declined by the prosecutor for a reason other than lack of evidence, and
 - The total amount for the FIP, SDA, CDC, MA and FAP programs combined is \$500 or more, or
 - the total amount is less than \$500, and
 - ➢ the group has a previous IPV, or
 - the alleged IPV involves FAP trafficking, or
 - the alleged fraud involves concurrent receipt of assistance (see BEM 222), or
 - the alleged fraud is committed by a state/government employee.

BAM 720 (January 2016), pp. 12-13;

Intentional Program Violation

Suspected IPV means an OI exists for which all three of the following conditions exist:

• The client intentionally failed to report information **or** intentionally gave incomplete or inaccurate information needed to make a correct benefit determination, and

- The client was clearly and correctly instructed regarding his or her reporting responsibilities, and
- The client has no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits his or her understanding or ability to fulfill reporting responsibilities.


BAM 700 (January 2016), p. 7; BAM 720, p. 1.

An IPV is also suspected for a client who is alleged to have trafficked FAP benefits. BAM 720, p. 1.

An IPV requires that the Department establish by clear and convincing evidence that the client has intentionally withheld or misrepresented information for the **purpose** of establishing, maintaining, increasing or preventing reduction of program benefits or eligibility. BAM 720, p. 1 (emphasis in original); see also 7 CFR 273(e)(6). Clear and convincing evidence is evidence sufficient to result in a clear and firm belief that the proposition is true. See M Civ JI 8.01.

In this case, the Department alleges that Respondent committed an IPV of her FAP benefits because she failed to notify the Department that she no longer resided in Michigan, but continued to receive and use Michigan-issued FAP benefits while out of state. To be eligible for FAP benefits issued by the Department, an individual must be a Michigan resident. BEM 220 (January 2016), p. 1. For FAP purposes, a person is considered a resident while living in Michigan for purpose other than a vacation, even if he has no intent to remain in the State permanently or indefinitely. BEM 220, p. 1. A client who resides outside the State of Michigan. BEM 212 (October 2015), p. 3.

Additionally, the Department provided Respondent's usage history which demonstrated that Respondent used her Michigan issued FAP as follows:



While this evidence may be sufficient to establish that Respondent may have been overissued benefits, to establish an IPV the Department must present clear and

convincing evidence that Respondent **intentionally** withheld or misrepresented information for the purpose of maintaining benefits.

The Department provided documentation showing that Respondent began working in and continued employment until approximately on The Department also presented a lease signed by Respondent on which was intended to expire in **Experiment**. Finally, the Department presented a Redetermination submitted by Respondent on , in which she acknowledged her responsibility to report changes within 10 days. The Redetermination contained a Michigan address and was completed on the same day Respondent signed lease agreement. Given that Respondent executed a lease agreement in the , it is found that she was not a and completed purchases in second on resident of Michigan when she submitted the Redetermination to the Department. Accordingly, the Department has established that Respondent affirmatively communicated false information to the Department. Therefore. It is found that the Department has established that Respondent intentionally withheld or misrepresented information for the purpose of maintaining FAP benefits.

Disqualification

A client who is found to have committed an IPV by a court or hearing decision is disqualified from receiving program benefits. BAM 720 (October 2015), p. 15. Clients are disqualified for ten years for a FAP IPV involving concurrent receipt of benefits, and, for all other IPV cases involving FIP, FAP or SDA, for standard disqualification periods of one year for the first IPV, two years for the second IPV, and lifetime for the third IPV. BAM 720, p. 16.

A disqualified recipient remains a member of an active group as long as he/she lives with them, and other eligible group members may continue to receive benefits. BAM 720, p. 16.

In this case, the Department has satisfied its burden of showing that Respondent committed an IPV concerning FAP benefits. Accordingly, Respondent is subject to a 12-month disqualification under the FAP program.

<u>Overissuance</u>

When a client group receives more benefits than they are entitled to receive, the Department must attempt to recoup the OI. BAM 700, p. 1. At the hearing, the Department established that the State of Michigan issued a total of **sectors** in FAP benefits to Respondent during the fraud period. The Department alleges that Respondent was eligible for **sectors** in FAP benefits during this period. Further, the Department established that the State of Michigan issued payments in the total of **sectors** in MA benefits to Respondent during the fraud period. The Department established that the State of Michigan issued payments in the total of **sectors** in MA benefits to Respondent during the fraud period. The Department alleges that Respondent was eligible for **sectors** in MA benefits during the fraud period.

In support of its contention that Respondent was overissued FAP and MA benefits, the Department presented Respondent's FAP transaction history showing that she used her

FAP benefits issued by the State of Michigan in **Example** from

through with the exception of a few Michigan purchases. The Michigan purchases reveal that Respondent only visited Michigan for a no more than approximately five days.

As discussed above, Respondent was no longer eligible for FAP or MA benefits after she resided outside Michigan for more than 30 days. Respondent entered into a lease agreement in set on set and there is no evidence that Respondent returned to Michigan as a resident after she executed the lease agreement. Therefore, the Department has established it is entitled to recoup the **Exercise** in FAP benefits it issued to Respondent during the fraud period. Further, the Department established that it is entitled to recoup the **entitient** issued in MA benefits on behalf of Respondent during the fraud period.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons stated on the record, if any, concludes that:

- 1. The Department has established by clear and convincing evidence that Respondent committed an IPV of FAP benefits.
- 2. Respondent did receive an OI of FAP benefits in the amount of for the period of through
- Respondent did receive an OI of MA benefits in the amount of 3. for the period of through

The Department is ORDERED to initiate recoupment procedures for the total amount of in accordance with Department policy.

It is FURTHER ORDERED that Respondent is subject to a 12-months disgualification from FAP benefits.
