**HEARING DECISION FOR
INTENTIONAL PROGRAM VIOLATION AND OVERISSUANCE**

Upon the request for a hearing by the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS), this matter is before the undersigned administrative law judge pursuant to MCL 400.9, and in accordance with Titles 7, 42 and 45 of the Code of Federal Regulation (CFR), particularly 7 CFR 273.16, 42 CFR 431.230(b), and 45 CFR 235.110, and with Mich Admin Code, R 400.3130 and 400.3178. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on April 30, 2018, from Detroit, Michigan. The hearing was held at least 30 minutes from the scheduled hearing time. The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) was represented by [REDACTED], regulation agent, with the Office of Inspector General. Respondent did not appear.

ISSUES

The first issue is whether MDHHS established that Respondent received an overissuance (OI) of benefits.

The second issue is whether MDHHS established by clear and convincing evidence that Respondent committed an intentional program violation (IPV).

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. Respondent was an ongoing Food Assistance Program (FAP) benefit recipient.
2. Respondent was clearly and correctly instructed of reporting requirements.

3. During all relevant times, Respondent had no apparent impairment to understanding reporting requirements.
4. Respondent committed and was convicted of multiple drug-related felonies between August 22, 1996, and April 2013.
5. On September 18, 2016, Respondent misreported his history of drug felonies to MDHHS on an application.
6. From April 2013 through May 2016, Respondent received \$ [REDACTED] in FAP benefits based on a one-person FAP group.
7. On January 10, 2018, MDHHS requested a hearing to establish Respondent received an OI of \$ [REDACTED] in FAP benefits from April 2013 through May 2016 and to establish an IPV disqualification against Respondent.
8. As of the hearing date, Respondent had no previous IPV.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) [formerly known as the Food Stamp program] is established by the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008, as amended, 7 USC 2011 to 2036a and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in 7 CFR 273. MDHHS (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10, the Social Welfare Act, MCL 400.1-.119b, and Mich Admin Code, R 400.3001-.3011. MDHHS policies are contained in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), and Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

MDHHS' Hearing Summary and testimony alleged that Respondent received an OI of \$ [REDACTED] in FAP benefits based on Respondent's history of drug felony convictions. MDHHS made similar or identical allegations in an Intentional Program Violation Repayment Agreement (Exhibit A, pp. 6-7) dated January 10, 2018, sent to Respondent as part of MDHHS' prehearing procedures.

When a client group receives more benefits than it is entitled to receive, MDHHS must attempt to recoup the overissuance. BAM 700 (January 2016), p. 1. An overissuance [bold lettering removed] is the amount of benefits issued to the client group or CDC provider in excess of what it was eligible to receive. *Id.* Recoupment [bold lettering removed] is a MDHHS action to identify and recover a benefit overissuance. *Id.*, p. 2.

[For FAP benefits,] people convicted of certain crimes and probation or parole violators are not eligible for assistance. BEM 203 (October 2015), p. 1. An individual convicted of a felony for the use, possession, or distribution of controlled substances two or more times in separate periods will be permanently disqualified if both offenses occurred after August 22, 1996. *Id.*, p. 2.

MDHHS presented a Judgment of Sentence from a Michigan county court. Respondent was convicted of "C/S – DEL/MANF (NARC) L/50 GR" on [REDACTED]. The crime is a felony under MCL 333.7401(2)(a)(iv). Exhibit A, p. 60.

MDHHS presented a Judgment of Sentence from a Michigan county court. Respondent was convicted of "POSS/CS U/25 GRAMS" on [REDACTED]. The crime is a felony under MCL 333.7403(2)(a)(v). Exhibit A, pp. 61-62.

The evidence established that Respondent was convicted of multiple controlled-substance felonies between August 22, 1996, and the beginning of the alleged OI period. Offense dates were not verified but Respondent's conviction dates were sufficiently after August 22, 1996, that it can be inferred that the corresponding offense dates also occurred after August 22, 1996.

MDHHS presented Respondent's FAP benefit issuance history (Exhibit A, p. 63) from April 2013 through May 2016. FAP benefit issuances to Respondent totaled \$ [REDACTED]. A [REDACTED] expungement was also indicated. Thus, Respondent received a net FAP issuance total of \$ [REDACTED] from the alleged OI period.

Presented reporting documents and benefit issuance history were indicative that Respondent was the only member of the FAP benefit group throughout the alleged OI period. As the only group member, a disqualification of Respondent would justify a total disqualification of FAP benefit eligibility.

The evidence established Respondent was convicted of multiple drug-related felonies which would have disqualified Respondent from FAP eligibility during the alleged OI period. MDHHS established Respondent received \$ [REDACTED] in FAP benefits during the alleged OI period. It is found that Respondent received an OI of \$ [REDACTED] in FAP benefits. MDHHS further alleged that the OI was caused by an IPV by Respondent.

The Code of Federal Regulations defines an IPV. Intentional program violations shall consist of having intentionally: (1) made a false or misleading statement, or misrepresented, concealed or withheld facts; or (2) committed any act that constitutes a violation of the Food Stamp Act, the Food Stamp Program Regulations, or any State statute for the purpose of using, presenting, transferring, acquiring, receiving, possessing or trafficking of coupons, authorization cards or reusable documents used as part of an automated benefit delivery system. 7 CFR 273.16 (c).

[An IPV is a] benefit overissuance resulting from the willful withholding of information or other violation of law or regulation by the client or his authorized representative. Bridges Program Glossary (October 2015), p. 36. A suspected IPV means an OI exists for which all three of the following conditions exist:

- The client intentionally failed to report information or intentionally gave incomplete or inaccurate information needed to make a correct benefit determination, and

- The client was clearly and correctly instructed regarding his or her reporting responsibilities, and
- The client has no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits his or her understanding or ability to fulfill their reporting responsibilities.

BAM 720 (January 2016), p. 1; see also 7 CFR 273(e)(6).

IPV is suspected when there is **clear and convincing** [emphasis added] evidence that the client or CDC provider has intentionally withheld or misrepresented information for the purpose of establishing, maintaining, increasing or preventing reduction of program benefits or eligibility. *Id.* Clear and convincing evidence is evidence sufficient to result in a clear and firm belief that the proposition is true. See M Civ JI 8.01. It is a standard which requires reasonable certainty of the truth; something that is highly probable. Black's Law Dictionary 888 (6th ed. 1990).

MDHHS presented Respondent's application for FAP benefits (Exhibit A, pp. 12-43). Respondent's electronic signature was dated April 18, 2013. Respondent answered "No" in response to the questions, "Convicted of a Drug Felony?" MDHHS also presented a copy of Respondent's application dated March 2, 2016 (Exhibit A, pp. 44-59) in which Respondent did not answer a question asking about previous drug felonies.

Boilerplate language on MDHHS applications state that the client's signature is certification, subject to perjury, that all reported information on the document was true. The language is consistent with MDHHS policy which states that clients must completely and truthfully answer all questions on forms and in interviews (see BAM 105 (October 2016), p. 8). The evidence was not indicative that Respondent did not or could not understand the clear and correct reporting requirements.

Respondent's reporting documents established that Respondent misreported information by reporting an absence of drug-felony convictions since 1996. Generally, a client's written statement which contradicts known facts resulting in an OI is clear and convincing evidence of an IPV. Evidence was not presented to rebut the generality.

It is found MDHHS clearly and convincingly established that Respondent committed an IPV. Accordingly, MDHHS may proceed with disqualifying Respondent from benefit eligibility.

The standard disqualification period is used in all instances except when a court orders a different period. BAM 725 (January 2016), p. 16. [MDHHS is to] apply the following disqualification periods to recipients determined to have committed an IPV... one year for the first IPV... two years for the second IPV, [and] lifetime for the third IPV. *Id.*

MDHHS did not allege Respondent previously committed an IPV. Thus, a one-year disqualification period is justified.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, finds that MDHHS established that Respondent committed an IPV based on receipt of \$ [REDACTED] in over-issued FAP benefits for the period from April 2013 through May 2016. The MDHHS request to establish an overissuance and a disqualification period of one year against Respondent is **APPROVED**.
