HEARING DECISION

Following Petitioner's request for a hearing, this matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and 400.37; 7 CFR 273.15 to 273.18; 42 CFR 431.200 to 431.250; 42 CFR 438.400 to 438.424; 45 CFR 99.1 to 99.33; and 45 CFR 205.10; and Mich Admin Code, R 792.11002. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on April 12, 2018, from Detroit, Michigan. Petitioner was present with his Service Coordinator, Amy Mills. The Department of Health and Human Services (Department) was represented by Anthony Couls, Hearing Facilitator.

ISSUE

Did the Department properly determine Petitioner's Food Assistance Program (FAP) benefit amount?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. On [REDACTED], 2018, Petitioner submitted an application for FAP benefits (Exhibit A).
2. On February 28, 2018, the Department sent Petitioner a Notice of Case Action informing him that he was approved for FAP benefits in the amount of \$38 per month effective March 1, 2018, ongoing (Exhibit B).
3. Petitioner was a member of FAP group that consisted solely of himself.
4. Petitioner had unearned income in the form of pension payments and Retirement, Survivors, and Disability (RSDI) benefits (Exhibit D and E).

5. On February 27, 2018, Petitioner submitted a request for hearing disputing the Department's decision regarding his FAP and MA benefits.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Department policies are contained in the Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), Department of Health and Human Services Reference Tables Manual (RFT), and Department of Health and Human Services Emergency Relief Manual (ERM).

FAP

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) [formerly known as the Food Stamp program] is established by the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008, as amended, 7 USC 2011 to 2036a and is implemented by the federal regulations contained in 7 CFR 273. The Department (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10, the Social Welfare Act, MCL 400.1-119b, and Mich Admin Code, R 400.3001-.3011.

In this case, Petitioner submitted a request for hearing disputing the Department's calculation of his FAP benefit amount. On February 28, 2018, the Department sent Petitioner notice that he was approved for FAP benefits in the amount of \$38 per month effective March 1, 2018, ongoing. The Department presented a FAP budget to establish the calculation of Petitioner's FAP benefits (Exhibit F).

The Department determined Petitioner's sole household income was \$1163 per month in unearned income. All countable earned and unearned income available to the client must be considered in determining a client's eligibility for program benefits and group composition policies specify whose income is countable. BEM 500 (July 2017), pp. 1-5. The Department determines a client's eligibility for program benefits based on the client's actual income and/or prospective income. Prospective income is income not yet received but expected. BEM 505 (October 2017), pp. 1-2. The Department presented verification submitted by Petitioner of his monthly pension payment, which was \$83.78 per month (Exhibit D). The Department also presented Petitioner's State On-Line Query (SOLQ) report which showed Petitioner receives \$1,080 per month in RSDI. Therefore, the Department properly determined Petitioner's unearned income.

The deductions to income on the net income budget were also reviewed. There was evidence presented that the Petitioner's group includes a senior/disabled/veteran (SDV). BEM 550. Thus, the group is eligible for the following deductions to income:

- Dependent care expense.
- Excess shelter.
- Court ordered child support and arrearages paid to non-household members.

- Standard deduction based on group size.
- Medical deduction.

BEM 554; BEM 556

Petitioner's FAP benefit group size of one justifies a standard deduction of \$160. RFT 255 (October 2017), p. 1. There was no evidence presented that Petitioner had any out-of-pocket dependent care or child support expenses. Therefore, the budget properly excluded any deduction for dependent care or child support expenses. As Petitioner qualifies as an SDV member, the group is entitled to deductions for verifiable medical expenses that the SDV member incurs in excess of \$35. BEM 554, p. 1. The Department testified Petitioner was eligible for a monthly medical deduction of \$106.

In calculating the excess shelter deduction of \$384, the Department stated that it considered Petitioner's verified housing expense of \$295 and that he was responsible for a monthly heating expense, entitling her to the heat/utility standard of \$537. BEM 554, pp. 14-15. The Department testified when calculating Petitioner's excess shelter amount they added the total shelter amount and subtracted 50% of the adjusted gross income. Petitioner's excess shelter deduction was properly calculated at \$384 per month.

The FAP benefit group's net income is determined by taking the group's adjusted gross income and subtracting the allowable excess shelter expense. After subtracting the allowable deductions, the Department properly determined Petitioner's adjusted gross income to be \$897. Petitioner's adjusted gross income subtracted by the \$384 excess shelter deduction results in a net income of \$513. A chart listed in RFT 260 is used to determine the proper FAP benefit issuance based on the net income and group size. Based on Petitioner's net income and group size, Petitioner's FAP benefit issuance is \$38. Therefore, the Department properly calculated Petitioner's FAP benefit amount.

MA

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act, 42 USC 1396-1396w-5; 42 USC 1315; the Affordable Care Act of 2010, the collective term for the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, Pub. L. No. 111-148, as amended by the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010, Pub. L. No. 111-152; and 42 CFR 430.10-.25. The Department (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers the MA program pursuant to 42 CFR 435, MCL 400.10, and MCL 400.105-.112k.

A client's request for hearing must be in writing and signed by an adult member of the eligible group, adult child, or authorized hearing representative (AHR). BAM 600 (April 2017), p. 2. Moreover, Department policy provides that a request for hearing must be received in the Department local office within 90 days of the date of the written notice of case action. BAM 600, p. 6.

In the present case, the Department sent Petitioner a Health Care Coverage Determination Notice advising him of its decision to approve his MA benefits but that he was subject to a deductible on August 18, 2017. However, Petitioner did not file a request for hearing to contest the Department's action until February 27, 2018, which is beyond the 90-day time limit.


Petitioner's hearing request regarding his MA benefits was not timely filed within ninety days of the notice and is, therefore, **DISMISSED** for lack of jurisdiction.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons stated on the record, if any, finds that the Department acted in accordance with Department policy when it determined Petitioner's FAP benefit amount. Accordingly, the Department's decision is **AFFIRMED**.

Petitioner's hearing request regarding his MA benefits is hereby, **DISMISSED**, for lack of jurisdiction.
