HEARING DECISION FOR INTENTIONAL PROGRAM VIOLATION

Upon the request for a hearing by the Department of Health and Human Services (Department), this matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9, and in accordance with Titles 7, 42 and 45 of the Code of Federal Regulation (CFR), particularly 7 CFR 273.16, 42 CFR 431.230(b), and 45 CFR 235.110, and with Mich Admin Code, R 400.3130 and 400.3178. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on November 18, 2019 from Detroit, Michigan. The Department was represented by [REDACTED] Regulation Agent of the Office of Inspector General (OIG). Respondent appeared for the hearing and represented himself.

ISSUES

Did Respondent receive an overissuance (OI) of Medical Assistance (MA) benefits that the Department is entitled to recoup?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. Respondent was a recipient of MA benefits under the Healthy Michigan Plan (HMP) issued by the Department. From September 1, 2017 to October 31, 2017 and from May 1, 2018 to September 30, 2018 (MA fraud period), the Department paid \$2,005.58 in MA benefits on Respondent's behalf and the Department alleges that Respondent was entitled to \$0 in such benefits during this time period, resulting in a MA OI of \$2,005.58.
2. On [REDACTED] 2017, an application for MA benefits was submitted on Respondent's behalf which Respondent electronically signed. On the application, Respondent reported that he started his employment with [REDACTED] on July 5, 2017, that he is paid \$8.90 hourly and works 30 hours per week, and that his employment is expected to

continue. In signing the application, Respondent acknowledged being aware of the responsibility to accurately report his circumstances and to report changes in his circumstances to the Department, including changes in employment and income. (Exhibit A, pp. 9-39)

- a. The Department sent Respondent a Health Care Coverage Determination Notice dated July 5, 2017 him of his approval of MA benefits and again advising him of his reporting responsibilities with respect to his income and employment. (Exhibit A, pp. 40-42)
3. The Department had no reason to believe that Respondent had a physical or mental impairment that would limit his understanding or ability to fulfill his reporting requirements.
4. The Department obtained verification of Respondent's employment at [REDACTED] through the Work Number, showing that he was actually paid \$10.10 per hour and that he worked for more than 30 hours per week, for many pay periods from July 2017 to January 2018, at which time his employment ended. (Exhibit A, pp. 43-45)
5. On April 25, 2018, the Department sent Respondent a Health Care Coverage Determination Notice notifying him of his approval of MA benefits and again advising him of his reporting responsibilities with respect to his income and employment. Respondent was notified that his approval for full coverage MA was based on the budgeted countable annual income of \$4,092. (Exhibit A, pp. 48-50)
6. The Department obtained verification of Respondent's second employment with [REDACTED] showing that he gained this employment on February 21, 2018, received his first pay on March 9, 2018, and that he continued to be employed and earning income through November 30, 2018. (Exhibit A, pp. 51-53)
7. The Department's OIG filed a hearing request on or around June 18, 2019, alleging that Respondent failed to accurately report his earned income from [REDACTED] and that he failed to report his employment and earnings from [REDACTED], and as a result received MA benefits that he was ineligible to receive, causing a MA OI of \$2,005.58. The Department requested a recoupment of the MA OI.
8. A Notice of Hearing was mailed to Respondent at his last known address and was not returned by the US Post Office as undeliverable.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Department policies are contained in the Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), Adult Services Manual (ASM), and Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act, 42 USC 1396-1396w-5; 42 USC 1315; the Affordable Care Act of 2010, the collective term for the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, Pub. L. No. 111-148, as amended by the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010, Pub. L. No. 111-152; and 42 CFR 430.10-.25. The Department (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers the MA program pursuant to 42 CFR 435, MCL 400.10 and MCL 400.105-.112k.

The Department may initiate recoupment of an MA overissuance only due to client error or IPV, not when due to agency error. BAM 710 (October 2018), p. 1. A client error OI occurs when the client received more benefits than entitled to because the client gave incorrect or incomplete information to the Department. BAM 700, p. 7.

An IPV occurs when a recipient of Department benefits intentionally (1) made a false or misleading statement, or misrepresented, concealed or withheld facts; or (2) committed any act that constitutes a violation FAP, FAP federal regulations, or any State statute for the purpose of using, presenting, transferring, acquiring, receiving, possessing or trafficking of FAP benefits or electronic benefit transfer (EBT) cards. 7 CFR 273.16(c). For an IPV based on inaccurate reporting, Department policy requires that an OI, and all three of the following exist: the client intentionally failed to report information or intentionally gave incomplete or inaccurate information needed to make a correct benefit determination, and the individual was also clearly and correctly instructed regarding his or her reporting responsibilities and the individual have no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits his or her understanding or ability to fulfill reporting responsibilities. BAM 720 (October 2017), p. 1.

To establish an IPV, the Department must present clear and convincing evidence that the household member committed, and intended, to commit the IPV or intentionally withheld or misrepresented information for the **purpose** of establishing, maintaining, increasing or preventing reduction of program benefits or eligibility. 7 CFR 273.16(e)(6); BAM 720, p. 1. Clear and convincing evidence is evidence sufficient to result in a clear and firm belief that the proposition is true. See M Civ JI 8.01; *Smith v Anonymous Joint Enterprise*, 487 Mich 102; 793 NW2d 533, 541 (2010)

In this case, the Department alleges that Respondent failed to accurately report his earnings with Meijer and later, failed to report to the Department that he gained employment with GPM, earning income. The Department asserted that this failure to report caused an overissuance of MA benefits. Clients must completely and truthfully answer all questions on forms and in interviews. Clients must report changes in circumstances that potentially affect eligibility or benefit amount. Changes such as

starting or stopping employment, earning income, and starting or stopping a source of unearned income must be reported within ten days of receiving the first payment reflecting the change. BAM 105 (October 2016), pp. 9-12.

The Department contended that Respondent's failure to accurately and timely report his earnings from two employers caused an OI of MA benefits in the amount of \$2,005.58 from September 2017 to October 2017 and from May 2018 to September 2018. The Department presented verification of Respondent's employment through the Work Number which detailed the amounts earned and the pay dates.

In support of its contention that Respondent failed to report his employment and earnings, the Department presented an assistance application signed by Respondent and submitted to the Department on [REDACTED], 2017. In signing and completing the application, Respondent acknowledged being aware of the responsibility to accurately report his circumstances and to report changes in his circumstances to the Department, including changes in employment and income. The evidence showed that Respondent's hourly rate of pay and weekly hours worked at [REDACTED] were greater than initially reported on the application submitted in [REDACTED] 2017. Respondent's weekly hours increased with his second paycheck in July 2017 but were not reported to the Department. Additionally, a Health Care Coverage Determination Notice dated April 25, 2018, was presented and further advised Respondent of his reporting responsibilities. At the time of the April 25, 2018 Health Care Coverage Determination Notice, Respondent's employment with [REDACTED] had ended and he had obtained new employment. There was no evidence that these changes were reported to the Department.

The Department's evidence showed that despite being advised of his reporting responsibilities with respect to his income and employment, Respondent failed to disclose his income to the Department. Upon review, the Department's evidence was sufficient to establish that Respondent was advised of his responsibility to report changes in circumstances on more than one occasion as well as the penalties for failing to do so. Because Respondent failed to accurately and timely report his employment and income to the Department, the Department's evidence establishes that Respondent withheld information and as a result received MA benefits he was not entitled to.

When a client group receives more benefits than entitled to receive, the Department must attempt to recoup the OI. 7 CFR 273.18(a)(2); BAM 700, p. 1. The Department alleged that due to Respondent's failure to accurately and time report his income, he received MA benefits that he was not entitled to receive. The Department alleged an OI of MA benefits in the amount of \$2,005.58, based on the amount of MA payments made on Respondent's behalf for the MA frauds, and sought to recoup the alleged OI.

As indicated above, the Department may initiate recoupment of an MA overissuance only due to client error or IPV, not when due to agency error. BAM 710 (October 2018), p. 1. Because Respondent failed to timely report income, the error resulting in overissued MA benefits in this case was a client error. Therefore, the Department may seek to recoup the MA overissuance.

The amount of a MA OI for an OI due to unreported income is the lesser of (i) the correct deductible amount (minus any amount already met) if there would have been deductible or a larger deductible or (ii) the amount of MA payments. BAM 710, pp. 1-2. In this case, the Department alleged that Respondent received MA benefits under the Healthy Michigan Plan (HMP) category. HMP is a Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI)-related MA category that provides MA coverage to individuals whose household income does not exceed 133% of the federal poverty level (FPL) applicable to the individual's group size under the Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI) methodology. BEM 137 (April 2018), p. 1. A determination of group size under the MAGI methodology requires consideration of the client's tax status and dependents. The Department asserted that Petitioner's household size was one and that the monthly income limit for a household size of one through March 2018 was \$1,336, and from April 2018 to October 2018 was \$1,345.

To determine financial eligibility under HMP, income must be calculated in accordance with MAGI under federal tax law. MAGI is based on Internal Revenue Service rules and relies on federal tax information. BEM 500 (July 2017), pp. 3-4. Income is verified via electronic federal data sources in compliance with MAGI methodology. MREM, § 1. In determining an individual's eligibility for MAGI-related MA, 42 CFR 435.603(h)(2) provides that for current beneficiaries and "for individuals who have been determined financially-eligible for Medicaid using the MAGI-based methods . . . , a State may elect in its State plan to base financial eligibility either on current monthly household income . . . or income based on projected annual household income . . . for the remainder of the current calendar year."

From January 1, 2014 to October 31, 2017, when determining financial eligibility of current beneficiaries for MAGI-related MA, the State of Michigan had elected to base eligibility on projected annual household income and family size for the remaining months of the current calendar year. The State had also elected to use reasonable methods to include a prorated portion of a reasonably predictable increase in future income and/or family size and to account for a reasonably predictable decrease in future income and/or family size. (Medicaid State Plan Amendment Transmittal No.: MI-13-0110-MM3; Medicaid State Plan Amendment Transmittal No.: MI-17-0110).

While the Department asserted that Respondent was ineligible for HMP for any month in which his income exceeded the income limit, pursuant to the policy above, Respondent would have been ineligible for MA under the HMP only if his projected income for the remaining months of the calendar year being tested was in excess of the income limit, as he was considered a current MA beneficiary at the time of the September 2017 to October 2017 fraud period. A review of the Work Number for Respondent's employment with [REDACTED] shows that while Respondent's monthly earnings for September 2017 and October 2017 were greater than the \$1,336 monthly income limit for HMP, his income from his employment start in July 2017 through December 2017 (the calendar year being tested) did not exceed the annual income limit. Therefore, the

Department has not established that it is entitled to recoupment of MA benefits paid on Respondent's behalf from September 2017 to October 2017.

However, effective November 1, 2017, when determining financial eligibility of current beneficiaries for MAGI-related MA, the State of Michigan elected to base eligibility on current monthly household income and family size. The State has also elected to use reasonable methods to include a prorated portion of a reasonably predictable increase in future income and/or family size and to account for a reasonably predictable decrease in future income and/or family size. (Medicaid State Plan Amendment Transmittal No.: MI-17-0100)

Respondent gained employment with [REDACTED] and received his first paycheck on March 9, 2018. In accordance with the above policy, effective November 1, 2017, Respondent would be ineligible for MA under the HMP for the period in which his monthly income was in excess of the income limit, as he was considered a current MA beneficiary at the time of the May 2018 to September 2018 fraud period.

Upon review of the Department's evidence, including the verification of employment provided for the May 2018 to August 2018 fraud period, Respondent's monthly income was greater than the monthly income limit identified above based on his one-person group size. The Department established that the State of Michigan made \$1,412.15 in MA payments to provide Respondent with MA coverage from May 2018 to August 2018. Based on the evidence presented, the Department is eligible to recoup and/or collect from Respondent an MA OI of \$1,412.15, as he was ineligible for HMP due to excess income from May 2018 to September 2018. The Department did not establish that Respondent was ineligible for HMP from September 2017 to October 2017.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons stated on the record, if any, concludes that Respondent **did** receive an OI of program benefits in the amount of \$1,412.15 from the MA program.

The Department is ORDERED to reduce the MA OI to \$1,412.15 for the period of May 1, 2018 to September 30, 2018, and initiate recoupment/collection procedures for the MA OI amount of \$1,412.15 in accordance with Department policy, less any amount already recouped/collected.
