HEARING DECISION

Following Petitioner's request for a hearing, this matter is before the undersigned administrative law judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and 400.37; 7 CFR 273.15 to 273.18; 42 CFR 431.200 to 431.250; 42 CFR 438.400 to 438.424; 45 CFR 99.1 to 99.33; and 45 CFR 205.10; and Mich Admin Code, R 792.11002. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on January 8, 2020, from Detroit, Michigan. Petitioner appeared and was unrepresented. The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) was represented by Brian Roedema, supervisor, and Alicia Whitfield, specialist.

ISSUE

The issue is whether MDHHS properly terminated Petitioner's Medical Assistance (MA) eligibility.

FINDINGS OF FACT

The administrative law judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. As of October 2019, Petitioner was an ongoing recipient of Medicaid benefits which were certified through November 2019.
2. On October 4, 2019, MDHHS mailed Petitioner a Redetermination form concerning renewal of Medicaid. The stated due date for Petitioner to complete and return the form was November 4, 2019

3. On November 15, 2019, MDHHS initiated termination of Petitioner's Medicaid eligibility effective December 2019 due to Petitioner's failure to return the Redetermination form.
4. On November 20, 2019, Petitioner requested a hearing to dispute the pending termination of Medicaid benefits.
5. As of December 1, 2019, Petitioner had not returned the Redetermination form to MDHHS.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act, 42 USC 1396-1396w-5; 42 USC 1315; the Affordable Care Act of 2010, the collective term for the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, Pub. L. No. 111-148, as amended by the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010, Pub. L. No. 111-152; and 42 CFR 430.10-.25. The Department (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers the MA program pursuant to 42 CFR 435, MCL 400.10, and MCL 400.105-.112k. MDHHS policies are contained in the Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), and Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

Petitioner requested a hearing to dispute a termination of Medicaid benefits. Exhibit A, pp. 4-5. A Health Care Coverage Determination Notice (HCCDN) dated November 15, 2019, stated that MDHHS initiated termination of Petitioner's Medicaid benefits effective December 2019 due to Petitioner's failure to return a redetermination form. Exhibit A, pp. 15-17.

For all programs, MDHHS must periodically redetermine or renew an individual's eligibility for active programs. The redetermination/renewal process includes a thorough review of all eligibility factors.¹ BAM 210 (October 2019), p. 1. For all programs, Bridges (the MDHHS database) mails a redetermination packet to the client three days prior to the negative action cut-off date in the month before the redetermination is due. *Id.*, p. 8. A redetermination/review packet is considered complete when all of the sections of the redetermination form, including the signature section, are completed. *Id.* p. 11. MA benefits stop at the end of the benefit period unless a renewal is completed and a new benefit period is certified. *Id.*, p. 4.

MDHHS presented a Redetermination form allegedly sent to Petitioner concerning redetermination of Medicaid eligibility. Exhibit A, pp. 7-14. A mailing date of October 4, 2019, was stated; the mailing date is consistent with a benefit period certified through November 2019. The evidence established that MDHHS properly and timely sent Petitioner a redetermination packet.

¹ For Medicaid, an annual review of all eligibility programs is called a "renewal". For all other programs, the process is a "redetermination". BAM 210 (October 2019) p. 1.

Petitioner testified that she did not timely receive the Redetermination form due to a mix-up with a neighbor's mail. Petitioner could have prevented a threatened closure to Medicaid if she had returned the form to MDHHS before November 15, 2019. Petitioner's testimony acknowledged that she did not.

Petitioner testified that she returned the Redetermination form to MDHHS on [REDACTED] 2019. MDHHS responded that Petitioner's Redetermination form would be processed. Administrative hearing jurisdiction only exists to dispute actions taken by MDHHS from before a hearing request submission date. Petitioner requested a hearing on November 20, 2019. Thus, whether MDHHS should process Petitioner's Redetermination form dated December 2, 2019, cannot be the subject of this analysis. Administrative hearing jurisdiction for the present case is limited to whether MDHHS properly initiated termination on November 15, 2019.

The evidence established that MDHHS followed all required procedures in mailing Petitioner a Redetermination form and that Petitioner failed to return the form to MDHHS before Medicaid closure was initiated on November 15, 2019. As Petitioner failed to return the Redetermination form, or any other required redetermination verifications, by November 15, 2019, MDHHS properly initiated termination of Petitioner's MA eligibility beginning December 2019.

DECISION AND ORDER

The administrative law judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, finds that MDHHS properly initiated termination of Petitioner's Medicaid eligibility beginning December 2019. The actions taken by MDHHS are **AFFIRMED**.
