**HEARING DECISION**

Following Petitioner's request for a hearing, this matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and 400.37; 7 CFR 273.15 to 273.18; 42 CFR 431.200 to 431.250; 42 CFR 438.400 to 438.424; 45 CFR 99.1 to 99.33; and 45 CFR 205.10; and Mich Admin Code, R 792.11002. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on February 12, 2020 from Detroit, Michigan. Petitioner appeared and represented herself. The Department of Health and Human Services (Department) was represented by Eric Murphy, Eligibility Specialist. During the hearing, a 19-page packet of documents was offered and admitted into evidence as Exhibit A, pp. 1-19.

**ISSUE**

Did the Department properly close Petitioner's Medicaid (MA) and Medicare Savings Program (MSP) cases, effective January 1, 2020?

**FINDINGS OF FACT**

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. Petitioner was an ongoing recipient of MA and MSP benefits from the Department.
2. Petitioner's benefits were certified through the end of December 2019. In order to renew the benefits and avoid a lapse in coverage, Petitioner's eligibility needed to be redetermined. On November 4, 2019, the Department issued to Petitioner a Redetermination form. Petitioner was instructed to fill it out, sign it, and return it to the Department by December 4, 2019 in order to prevent the closure of her MA and MSP case at the end of December 2019. Exhibit A, pp. 6-13.

3. Petitioner received the Redetermination but did not return it to the Department at any time.
4. On December 13, 2019, the Department issued to Petitioner a Health Care Coverage Determination Notice informing Petitioner that her MA and MSP cases would be closing, effective January 1, 2020, as a result of Petitioner's failure to return the completed Redetermination. Exhibit A, pp. 17-19.
5. On [REDACTED] 2019, Petitioner submitted to the Department a request for hearing objecting to the Department's action.

### **CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**

Department policies are contained in the Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), Department of Health and Human Services Reference Tables Manual (RFT), and Department of Health and Human Services Emergency Relief Manual (ERM).

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act, 42 USC 1396-1396w-5; 42 USC 1315; the Affordable Care Act of 2010, the collective term for the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, Pub. L. No. 111-148, as amended by the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010, Pub. L. No. 111-152; and 42 CFR 430.10-.25. The Department (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers the MA program pursuant to 42 CFR 435, MCL 400.10, and MCL 400.105-.112k.

In this case, Petitioner objects to the Department's December 13, 2019 Health Care Coverage Determination Notice informing Petitioner that her MA and MSP benefits cases were closing, effective January 1, 2020, as a result of Petitioner's failure to timely submit a completed Redetermination by the end of the certified benefit period. During the hearing, Petitioner acknowledged receiving the November 4, 2019 Redetermination around the time of its issuance. Petitioner further acknowledged that as of the date of the hearing, she had not submitted the completed Redetermination to the Department.

Periodically, the Department must redetermine or renew a client's eligibility for Department-issued benefits by the end of each benefit period. BAM 210 (October 2019), pp. 1, 4. The redetermination process includes thorough review of all eligibility factors. BAM 210, p. 1. To initiate the redetermination process, the Department issues to clients a redetermination form; that form must be completed and returned to the Department in a timely manner. BAM 210, p. 1. If a redetermination is not completed and a new benefit period certified, benefits stop at the end of the benefit period. BAM 210, p. 4.

Petitioner's benefit period was certified through the end of December 2019. The Department properly and timely initiated the redetermination process by issuing Petitioner the November 4, 2019 Redetermination, which included instructions on what was needed from Petitioner and the consequences for failing to comply. At the expiration of the certified benefit period, Petitioner had not submitted the completed Redetermination to the Department. As a new benefit period cannot be certified without completion of the redetermination process, including the submission of a completed Redetermination form, Petitioner's case had to be closed at the end of the certified period, which January 1, 2020. That is exactly what the Department did.

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons stated on the record, if any, finds that the Department acted in accordance with Department policy when it closed Petitioner's MA and MSP benefits cases, effective January 1, 2020.

### **DECISION AND ORDER**

Accordingly, the Department's decision is **AFFIRMED**.
