HEARING DECISION

Following Petitioner's request for a hearing, this matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and 400.37; 7 CFR 273.15 to 273.18; 42 CFR 431.200 to 431.250; 45 CFR 99.1 to 99.33; and 45 CFR 205.10. After due notice, telephone hearing was held on February 7, 2019, from Lansing, Michigan. Petitioner represented herself. The Department was represented by Tonya Boyd.

ISSUE

Did the Department of Health and Human Services (Department) properly close Petitioner's Medical Assistance (MA) benefits?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. Petitioner was an ongoing Medical Assistance (MA) recipient as a group of one receiving benefits under the Healthy Michigan Plan (HMP).
2. Petitioner received a paycheck in the gross bi-weekly amounts of \$882.40 on May 4, 2018, \$50.96 on June 1, 2018, and \$606.10 on August 3, 2018. Exhibit A, pp 16-18.
3. Petitioner started new employment and received a paycheck in the gross bi-weekly amounts of \$216.07 on September 7, 2018, \$560.50 on September 21, 2018, \$635.75 on October 5, 2018, \$752.00 on October 19, 2018, and \$642.97 on November 2, 2018. Exhibit A, pp 6-15.

4. On November 30, 2018, the Department notified Petitioner that she was no longer eligible for Medical Assistance (MA) benefits effective January 1, 2019. Exhibit A, pp 20-23.
5. On December 10, 2018, the Department received Petitioner's request for a hearing protesting the closure of his Medical Assistance (MA) benefits. Exhibit A, pp 2-3.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Department policies are contained in the Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), Department of Health and Human Services Reference Tables Manual (RFT), and Department of Health and Human Services Emergency Relief Manual (ERM).

The Medical Assistance (MA) program is established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act, 42 USC 1396-1396w-5; 42 USC 1315; the Affordable Care Act of 2010, the collective term for the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, Pub. L. No. 111-148, as amended by the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010, Pub. L. No. 111-152; and 42 CFR 430.10-.25. The Department (formerly known as the Department of Human Services) administers the MA program pursuant to 42 CFR 435, MCL 400.10, and MCL 400.105-.112k.

The income limit to participate in the Healthy Michigan Plan (HMP) is 133% of the federal poverty level. Department of Health and Human Services Reference Table Manual (RFT) 246 (April 1, 2014), p 1.

MAGI for purposes of Medicaid eligibility is a methodology which state agencies and the federally facilitated marketplace (FFM) must use to determine financial eligibility. It is based on Internal Revenue Service (IRS) rules and relies on federal tax information to determine adjusted gross income. It eliminates asset tests and special deductions or disregards. Every individual is evaluated for eligibility based on MAGI rules. The MAGI rules are aligned with the income rules that will be applied for determination of eligibility for premium tax credits and cost-sharing reductions through exchanges. Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) 500 (July 1, 2017).

Modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) is a methodology for how income is counted and how household composition and family size are determined. It is based on federal tax rules for determining adjusted gross income. It eliminates asset tests and special deductions or disregards. Every individual is evaluated for eligibility based on MAGI rules. The MAGI rules are aligned with the income rules that will be applied for determination of eligibility for premium tax credits and cost-sharing reductions through exchanges. The 5% disregard is the amount equal to 5% of the Federal Poverty Level for the applicable family size. It is not a flat 5% disregard from the income. The 5%

disregard shall be applied to the highest income threshold. The 5% disregard shall be applied only if required to make someone eligible for Medicaid.¹

Household income is the sum of the MAGI-based income of every individual included in the individual's household, minus an amount equivalent to 5 percentage points of the Federal poverty level for the applicable family size. 42 CFR 435.603.

MA-only eligibility is determined on a calendar month basis. Unless policy specifies otherwise, circumstances that existed, or are expected to exist, during the calendar month being tested are used to determine eligibility for that month. When determining eligibility for a future month, assume circumstances as of the processing date will continue unchanged unless you have information that indicates otherwise. Department of Human Services Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM) 105 (April 1, 2017), p 2.

Department policy is consistent with federal regulations under 42 CFR § 435.603(h) that state:

Financial eligibility for Medicaid for applicants, and other individuals not receiving Medicaid benefits at the point at which eligibility for Medicaid is being determined, must be based on current monthly household income and family size.

Petitioner was an ongoing MA recipient as a group of one receiving HMP benefits. Petitioner's employment ended and the Department closed her MA benefits when it received verification of her new employment.

The income limit for a group of one to receive MA benefits is 133% of the federal poverty level. Petitioner's largest paycheck was received on October 19, 2018, and her gross bi-weekly income exceeded 133% of the federal poverty level in that pay-period but not in any other pay period.

However, if Petitioner's income is considered on a calendar month basis as directed by BEM 105, Petitioner received a gross monthly income of \$1,387.75 in October of 2018, which was determined by combining her two October paychecks. Reducing this amount by the 5% disregard leaves Petitioner with an income that is 132% of the federal poverty level for a group of one. This is consistent with Petitioner's income over the last 30 days of verified income, where her income was also 132% of the federal poverty level after the 5% disregard.

Based on the evidence and testimony available during the hearing, this Administrative Law Judge finds that Petitioner is not ineligible for HMP benefits based on her earned income.


DECISION AND ORDER

THE DEPARTMENT IS ORDERED TO BEGIN DOING THE FOLLOWING, IN ACCORDANCE WITH DEPARTMENT POLICY AND CONSISTENT WITH THIS HEARING DECISION, WITHIN 10 DAYS OF THE DATE OF MAILING OF THIS DECISION AND ORDER:

Initiate a determination of the Petitioner's eligibility for Medical Assistance (MA) as of January 1, 2018.
