## **HEARING DECISION**

Following Petitioner's request for a hearing, this matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge pursuant to MCL 400.9 and 400.37; 42 CFR 431.200 to 431.250. After due notice, a 3-way telephone hearing was held on October 1, 2019, from Lansing, Michigan. The Petitioner was represented by Attorney Natassia Kasten from Lakeshore Legal Aid. Petitioner appeared and testified. The Department of Health and Human Services (Department) was represented by Assistant Attorney General, Tonya Jeter. Aundrea Jones, Hearing Facilitator, appeared and testified for the Department. Department Exhibit 1, pp. 1-262 was received and admitted, pages 233, 238-240 were removed from the Department exhibit because they did not pertain to Petitioner. Petitioner Exhibits 1-4 were received and admitted.

#### <u>ISSUE</u>

Whether the Department properly determined that Petitioner was not disabled for purposes of the State Disability Assistance (SDA) benefit program?

## FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

- 1. Petitioner applied for SDA on , 2019.
- 2. The Medical Review Team denied the application on July 30, 2019.
- 3. Petitioner filed a request for hearing on August 12, 2019, regarding the SDA denial.
- 4. A telephone hearing was held on October 1, 2019.

- 5. Petitioner is 5' tall and weighs 137 pounds.
- 6. Petitioner is 45 years old.
- 7. Petitioner's impairments have been medically diagnosed as back pain, migraines, irritable bowel syndrome, spinal stenosis, neuropathy, diabetes, gout, depression, anxiety, hypertension, degenerative disc disease and carpal tunnel syndrome.
- 8. Petitioner has the following symptoms: pain, fatigue, joint swelling, muscle spasms, suicidal ideation, dizziness, insomnia, social isolation, memory problems, crying spells and panic attacks.
- 9. Petitioner completed high school.
- 10. Petitioner is able to read, write, and perform basic math skills.
- 11. Petitioner is not working. Petitioner last worked full time in 2007.
- 12. Petitioner testified that she cannot perform most household chores.
- 13. Petitioner takes the following prescribed medications:
  - a. Seroquel
  - b. Klonozipine
  - c. Cymbalta
  - d. Topamax
  - e. Cyanocobalamin
  - f. Propranolol
  - g. Mobic
  - h. Glimepiride
  - i. Creon
  - j. Vibryd
  - k. Allopurinol
  - I. Butalbital
- 14. Petitioner testified to the following physical limitations:
  - i. Sitting: 4-5 minutes
  - ii. Standing: 4-5 minutes
  - iii. Walking: 1/2 block
  - iv. Bend/stoop: some difficulty
  - v. Lifting: 1-2 lbs.
- 15. Petitioner testified to experiencing pain at a high level of 9-10 on an everyday basis with some pain always present.

- 16. Petitioner testified that she sleeps for 1-2 hours in the middle of the day in part due to side effects of her medication.
- 17. Petitioner's treating psychiatrist Dr. August 14, 2019, that states the following: "In the state of the s
- 18. Petitioner was found to have a GAF score of 60 on March 12, 2019. (Department Ex. 1, p.105.
- 19. Petitioner's treating physician Dr. wrote a letter dated March 13, 2015, that reads as follows: "December 2015, that reads as follows: "December 2015, M.D. PC. She had a whipple procedure performed in 2009 due to her diagnosis of pancreatic cancer. As a result of the surgery the patient is now pre-diabetic and suffers from constant leg pain. She also suffers from IBS. Due to her current health conditions she is unable to perform the duties required to maintain a job. At this time, it is in my medical opinion that her prognosis is not good and leaves little to no room for significant improvement." (Petitioner Exhibit 3).
- 20. Petitioner testified that she uses a cane or walker to ambulate.

## CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Department policies are contained in the Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Department of Health and Human Services Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), and Department of Health and Human Services Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The State Disability Assistance (SDA) program, which provides financial assistance for disabled persons, was established by 2004 PA 344. The Department administers the SDA program pursuant to 42 CFR 435, MCL 400.10 *et seq.* and Mich Admin Code, Rules 400.3151 – 400.3180. A person is considered disabled for SDA purposes if the person has a physical or mental impariment which meets federal Supplemental Security Income (SSI) disability standards for at least ninety days. Receipt of SSI benefits based on disability or blindness, or the receipt of MA benefits based on disability or blindness, automatically qualifies an individual as disabled for purposes of the SDA program.

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...the inability to do any substantial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment which can be expected to result in death, or which has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months.... 20 CFR 416.905.

Federal regulations require that the Department use the same operative definition for "disabled" as used for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) under Title XVI of the Social Security Act. 42 CFR 435.540(a).

## "Disability" is:

...the inability to do any substantial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment which can be expected to result in death, or which has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months ... 20 CFR 416.905.

In determining whether an individual is disabled, 20 CFR 416.920 requires the trier of fact to follow a sequential evaluation process by which current work activity, the severity of the impairment(s), residual functional capacity, and vocational factors (i.e., age, education, and work experience) are assessed in that order. When a determination that an individual is or is not disabled can be made at any step in the sequential evaluation, evaluation under a subsequent step is not necessary.

First, the trier of fact must determine if the individual is working and if the work is substantial gainful activity. 20 CFR 416.920(b). In this case, the Petitioner is not working, therefore, the Petitioner is not disqualified at this step in the evaluation.

The second step to be determined in considering whether the Petitioner is considered disabled is the severity of the impairment. In order to qualify the impairment must be considered severe which is defined as an impairment which significantly limits an individual's physical, or mental, ability to perform basic work activities. Examples of these include:

- 1. Physical functions such as walking, standing, sitting, lifting, pushing, reaching, carrying, or handling;
- 2. Capacities for seeing, hearing, and speaking;
- 3. Understanding, carrying out, and remembering simple instructions;
- 4. Use of judgment;

- 5. Responding appropriately to supervision, co-workers, and usual work situations; and
- 6. Dealing with changes in a routine work setting. 20 CFR 416.921(b).

In the third step of the analysis, the trier of fact must determine if the Petitioner's impairment (or combination of impairments) is listed in Appendix 1 of Subpart P of 20 CFR, Part 404. This Administrative Law Judge finds that the Petitioner's medical record does not support a finding that the Petitioner's impairment(s) is a "listed impairment" or equal to a listed impairment. See Appendix 1 of Subpart P of 20 CFR Part 404, Part A. Listings 1.00, 1.02, 1.04, 5.00 and 12.04 were considered.

The person claiming a physical, or mental, disability has the burden to establish it through the use of competent medical evidence from qualified medical sources such as clinical/laboratory findings, diagnosis/prescribed treatment, prognosis for a recovery and/or medical assessment of ability to do work-related activities, or ability to reason and to make appropriate mental adjustments, if a mental disability is being alleged. 20 CRF 416.913. A conclusory statement by a physician, or mental health professional, that an individual is disabled, or blind, is not sufficient without supporting medical evidence to establish disability. 20 CFR 416.927.

The fourth step of the analysis to be considered is whether the Petitioner has the ability to perform work previously performed by the Petitioner within the past 15 years. The trier of fact must determine whether the impairment(s) presented prevent the Petitioner from doing past relevant work. In the present case, the Petitioner previously worked as retail clerk and cook, this work would be on the light exertional level. Petitioner would not be able to perform her previous work due to her lifting limitations and her inability to stand for long periods of time. Petitioner's mental health problems would also prevent Petitioner from performing her previous work. This Administrative Law Judge will continue through step 5.

In the final step of the analysis, the trier of fact must determine: if the Petitioner's impairment(s) prevent the Petitioner from doing other work. 20 CFR 416.920(f). This determination is based upon the Petitioner's:

- 1. residual functional capacity defined simply as "what can you still do despite your limitations? 20 CFR 416.945;
- 2. age, education, and work experience, 20 CFR 416.963-965; and
- the kinds of work which exist in significant numbers in the national economy which the Petitioner could perform despite her limitations. 20 CFR 416.966.

The residual functional capacity is what an individual can do despite limitations. All impairments will be considered in addition to ability to meet certain demands of jobs in

the national economy. Physical demands, mental demands, sensory requirements and other functions will be evaluated.... 20 CFR 416.945(a).

To determine the physical demands (exertional requirements) of work in the national economy, we classify jobs as sedentary, light, medium, and heavy. These terms have the same meaning as they have in the Dictionary of Occupational Titles, published by the Department of Labor.... 20 CFR 416.967.

**Sedentary work:** Sedentary work involves lifting no more than 10 pounds at a time and occasionally lifting, or carrying, articles like docket files, ledgers, and small tools. Although a sedentary job is defined as one which involves sitting, a certain amount of walking and standing is often necessary in carrying out job duties. Jobs are sedentary if walking and standing are required occasionally and other sedentary criteria are met. 20 CFR 416.967(a).

**Light work:** Light work involves lifting no more than 20 pounds at a time with frequent lifting, or carrying, of objects weighing up to 10 pounds. Even though the weight lifted may be very little; a job is in this category when it requires a good deal of walking or standing, or when it involves sitting most of the time with some pushing and pulling of arm or leg controls.... 20 CFR 416.967(b).

**Medium work:** Medium work involves lifting no more than 50 pounds at a time with frequent lifting, or carrying, of objects weighing up to 25 pounds. If someone can do medium work, we determine that he or she can also do sedentary and light work. 20 CFR 416.967(c).

**Heavy work:** Heavy work involves lifting no more than 100 pounds at a time with frequent lifting or carrying of objects weighing up to 50 pounds. If someone can do heavy work, we determine that he or she can also do medium, light, and sedentary work. 20 CFR 416.967(d).

See *Felton v DSS* 161 Mich. App 690, 696 (1987). Once the Petitioner makes it to the final step of the analysis, the Petitioner has already established a prima facie case of disability. *Richardson v Secretary of Health and Human Services*, 732 Fd2 962 (6<sup>th</sup> Cir, 1984). Moving forward the burden of proof rests with the state to prove by substantial evidence that the Petitioner has the residual function capacity for substantial gainful activity. After careful review of Petitioner's extensive medical record, and the Administrative Law Judge's personal interaction with Petitioner at the hearing, this Administrative Law Judge finds that Petitioner's exertional and non-exertional impairments render Petitioner unable to engage in a full range of, even sedentary, work activities on a regular and continuing basis. 20 CFR 404, Subpart P, Appendix 11, Section 201.00(h). See Social Security Ruling 83-10; *Wilson v Heckler*, 743 F2d 216 (1986). The Department has failed to provide vocational evidence which establishes that Petitioner has the residual functional capacity for substantial gainful activity and, that given Petitioner's age, education, and work experience, there are significant

numbers of jobs in the national economy which the Petitioner could perform despite Petitioner's limitations.

Accordingly, this Administrative Law Judge concludes that Petitioner is disabled for purposes of the SDA program as of March 2019. Petitioner's testimony regarding her limitations and ability to sit, stand, walk, lift, and carry is credible and supported by substantial medical evidence. Petitioner also has a severe mental impairment that is substantially limiting. The assessment from Petitioner's treating physician Dr. Bhardwaj that Petitioner is unable to perform full time work is supported by medical evidence and is given weight.

Therefore, Petitioner is found to be disabled.

# DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that Petitioner is medically disabled as of March 2019.

Accordingly, the Department's decision is hereby **REVERSED**, and the Department is ORDERED to:

1. Initiate a review of the application for SDA dated **even**, 2019, if not done previously, to determine Petitioner's non-medical eligibility.

The Department shall inform Petitioner of the determination in writing. A review of this case shall be set for October 2020.

**NOTICE OF APPEAL**: A party may appeal this Order in circuit court within 30 days of the receipt date. A copy of the circuit court appeal must be filed with the Michigan Office of Administrative Hearings and Rules (MOAHR).
