HEARING DECISION FOR INTENTIONAL PROGRAM VIOLATION

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS or the Department) requested a hearing alleging that Respondent committed an intentional program violation (IPV). Pursuant to MDHHS' request and in accordance with MCL 400.9, 7 CFR 273.16, 42 CFR 431.230(b), and 45 CFR 235.110, and Mich Admin Code, R 400.3130 and R 400.3178, this matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge. After due notice, a hearing was held via telephone conference on October 3, 2023.

Stephanie Picca, Regulation Agent of the Office of Inspector General (OIG), represented MDHHS.

Respondent did not appear at the hearing, and it was held in Respondent's absence pursuant to 7 CFR 273.16(e)(4); Mich Admin Code, R 400.3130(5); or Mich Admin Code, R 400.3178(5).

ISSUES

- 1. Did MDHHS establish, by clear and convincing evidence, that Respondent committed an IPV concerning Food Assistance Program (FAP) benefits?
- 2. Should Respondent be disqualified from receiving benefits for FAP?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the competent, material, and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. From December 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022 (fraud period), Respondent received in FAP benefits. (Exhibit A, p. 43)

- 2. On October 2020, Respondent submitted a Redetermination for FAP for his household. Respondent reported no real property assets. (Exhibit A, pp. 7-11)
- 3. Records from County show that Respondent purchased a property, MI, on January 2021. The State Equalized Value (SEV) of the property was documented. (Exhibit A, pp. 12-22)
- 4. On or about April 2021, Respondent submitted a Semi-Annual Contact Report for his FAP case. Respondent did not report that he had purchased a property. (Exhibit A, pp. 23-25)
- 5. On October 2021, Respondent submitted a Redetermination for his FAP case. Respondent reported no real property assets. (Exhibit A, pp. 26-30)
- 6. Respondent's signature on the Redeterminations and Semi-Annual Contact Report certified that he read and understood the rights and responsibilities. This would include providing accurate information and timely reporting changes. (Exhibit A, pp. 10, 25, and 29)
- 7. The Department has established the associated debt, provided Respondent due process, and recovered the overissuance amount in full as a treasury off-set payment. (Exhibit A, pp. 1 and 44-51)
- 8. Respondent was aware of the responsibility to accurately and timely report information, including assets, to the Department. (Exhibit A, pp. 10, 25, and 29; Regulation Agent Testimony)
- 9. Respondent did not have an apparent physical or mental impairment that would limit the ability to understand or fulfill the change reporting requirements. (Exhibit A, p. 8)
- 10. Respondent has no prior FAP IPV disqualifications. (Exhibit A, pp. 1, 4, and 52)
- 11. On May 25, 2023, MDHHS' OIG filed a hearing request alleging that Respondent intentionally failed to timely report assets and as a result, received FAP benefits from December 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022 (fraud period) that Respondent was ineligible to receive. OIG requested that Respondent be disqualified from receiving FAP benefits for a period of 12 months due to committing an IPV. (Exhibit A, pp. 1-55)
- 12. A notice of hearing was mailed to Respondent at the last known address and was not returned by the United States Postal Services as undeliverable.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

MDHHS policies are contained in the MDHHS Bridges Administrative Manual (BAM), Bridges Eligibility Manual (BEM), Adult Services Manual (ASM), and Reference Tables Manual (RFT).

The Food Assistance Program (FAP) [formerly known as the Food Stamp program] is funded under the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) established by the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008, as amended, 7 USC 2011 to 7 USC 2036a. It is implemented by the federal regulations contained in 7 CFR 273. MDHHS administers FAP pursuant to MCL 400.10 of the Social Welfare Act, MCL 400.1 *et seq.*, and Mich Admin Code, R 400.3001 to R 400.3031.

Intentional Program Violation

An IPV occurs when a recipient of MDHHS benefits intentionally made a false or misleading statement, or misrepresented, concealed, or withheld facts. 7 CFR 273.16(c)(1). Effective October 1, 2014, MDHHS's OIG requests IPV hearings for cases where (1) the total repayment amount sought from Respondent for all programs combined is \$500 or more or (2) the total repayment amount sought from Respondent for all programs combined is less than \$500 but the group has a previous IPV, the matter involves concurrent receipt of assistance, the IPV involves FAP trafficking, or the alleged committed by state government employee. fraud is а BAM 720 (October 1, 2017), p. 12-13.

To establish an IPV, MDHHS must present clear and convincing evidence that the household member committed, and intended to commit, the IPV. 7 CFR 273.16(e)(6); BAM 720, p. 1. Clear and convincing evidence is evidence sufficient to result in "a firm belief or conviction as to the truth of the precise facts in issue." *Smith v Anonymous Joint Enterprise*, 487 Mich 102, 114-115; 793 NW2d 533 (2010); see also M Civ JI 8.01. Evidence may be uncontroverted and yet not be clear and convincing; conversely, evidence may be clear and convincing despite the fact that it has been contradicted. *Smith* at 115. The clear and convincing standard is "the most demanding standard applied in civil cases." *In re Martin*, 450 Mich 204, 227; 538 NW2d 399 (1995). For an IPV based on inaccurate reporting, MDHHS policy also requires that the individual have been clearly and correctly instructed regarding the reporting responsibilities and have no apparent physical or mental impairment that limits the ability to understanding or fulfill these reporting responsibilities. BAM 720, p. 1.

In this case, MDHHS alleges that Respondent committed an IPV based on a failure to report assets, resulting in receiving a greater amount of FAP benefits from December 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022 (fraud period) than Respondent was eligible to receive.

The Department has established that Respondent was aware of the responsibility to accurately and timely report information to the Department, including assets. Clients must completely and truthfully answer all questions on forms and in interviews. BAM 105,

(October 1, 2021), p. 9. Department policy requires clients to report any change in circumstances that will affect eligibility or benefit amount within 10 days of receiving the first payment reflecting the change. This includes changes with assets. BAM 105, pp. 11-13. Households must report changes with residence, acquisition of a licensed vehicle that is not fully excludable, and changes in other types of resources unless the assets are excluded. 7 CFR 273.12(a)(1)(iii-v). Respondent's signature on the Redeterminations and Semi-Annual Contact Report certified that he read and understood the rights and responsibilities. This would include providing accurate information and timely reporting changes. (Exhibit A, pp. 10, 25, and 29; Regulation Agent Testimony). Respondent did not have an apparent physical or mental impairment that would limit the ability to understand or fulfill the reporting requirements. (Exhibit A, p. 8).

On October 2020, Respondent submitted Redetermination for FAP for his household. Respondent reported no real property assets. (Exhibit A, pp. 7-11).

Records from County show that Respondent purchased a property, MI, on January 2021. The State Equalized Value (SEV) of the property was documented. (Exhibit A, pp. 12-22).

On or about April 2021, Respondent submitted a Semi-Annual Contact Report for his FAP case. Respondent did not report that he had purchased a property. (Exhibit A, pp. 23-25). Further, on October 2021, Respondent submitted a Redetermination for his FAP case. Respondent reported no real property assets. (Exhibit A, pp. 26-30).

There is no evidence that Respondent timely and accurately reported the real property asset to the Department. The Department determined that the failure to timely report the assets resulted in an OI of FAP benefits. (Exhibit A, pp. 31-42).

The evidence establishes that Respondent failed to timely and accurately report the real property asset, as required by policy. The value of the asset was utilized to re-determine FAP eligibility during the fraud period. Respondent's failure to timely and accurately report the asset resulted in an OI of FAP benefits. Therefore, MDHHS has presented clear and convincing evidence that Respondent committed an IPV.

IPV Disqualification

An individual who is found pursuant to an IPV disqualification hearing to have committed a FAP IPV is disqualified from receiving benefits for the same program for 12 months for the first IPV, 24 months for the second IPV, and lifetime for the third IPV. 7 CFR 273.16(b)(1); BAM 720, p. 16. As discussed above, MDHHS has established by clear and convincing evidence that Respondent committed an IPV. Respondent has no prior FAP IPV disqualifications. (Exhibit A, pp. 1, 4, and 52). Because this was Respondent's first IPV for FAP, Respondent is subject to a 12-month disqualification from receipt of FAP benefits.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the above Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and for the reasons stated on the record, if any, concludes that:

- 1. MDHHS has established by clear and convincing evidence that Respondent committed an IPV.
- 2. Respondent is subject to a 12-month disqualification from FAP.

IT IS ORDERED that Respondent be personally disqualified from FAP for a period of 12 months.
