DECISION AND ORDER

This matter is before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) pursuant to MCL 400.9 and 42 CFR 431.200 *et seq.*, upon Petitioner's request for a hearing.

After due notice, a hearing was held on April 13, 2021. Petitioner appeared and testified on her own behalf. Leigha Burghdoff, Appeals Review Officer, appeared on behalf of Respondent, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS or Department). Carolyn Malhoit, Medicaid Utilization Analyst, appeared as a witness for the Department.

ISSUE

Did the Department properly deny Petitioner's request for prior authorization (PA) for a complete upper denture?

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Administrative Law Judge, based upon the competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record, finds as material fact:

1. Petitioner is a [REDACTED]-year-old Medicaid beneficiary, born [REDACTED]. (Exhibit A, p 9; Testimony)
2. On November 19, 2020, Petitioner's dentist sought approval for a complete upper denture for Petitioner. (Exhibit A, p 9; Testimony)
3. Records show that Petitioner was approved for a partial upper denture through Medicaid on or about December 30, 2019. (Exhibit A, p 11; Testimony)
4. On December 18, 2020, the request for a complete upper denture was reviewed and denied because Petitioner was shown to have received dentures within the last five years. (Exhibit A, pp 7-8; Testimony)

5. On December 18, 2020, the Department sent Petitioner a Notice of Denial, including Petitioner's appeal rights. (Exhibit A, pp 7-8; Testimony)
6. On January 25, 2021, the Michigan Office of Administrative Hearings and Rules (MOAHR) received Petitioner's Request for Hearing. (Exhibit 1)

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Medical Assistance Program is established pursuant to Title XIX of the Social Security Act and is implemented by Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). It is administered in accordance with state statute, the Social Welfare Act, the Administrative Code, and the State Plan under Title XIX of the Social Security Act Medical Assistance Program.

Medicaid Policy in Michigan is found in the Medicaid Provider Manual (MPM). With regard to prior authorizations, it states, in pertinent part:

1.9 PRIOR AUTHORIZATION

Medicaid requires prior authorization (PA) to cover certain services before those services are rendered to the beneficiary. The purpose of PA is to review the medical need for certain services. . . .

Under the general policy instructions for Medicaid related dental services the MPM sets replacement schedules for denture repair and replacement:

6.6 PROSTHODONTICS (REMOVABLE)

6.6.A. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

Complete and partial dentures are benefits for all beneficiaries. All dentures require prior authorization (PA). Providers must assess the beneficiary's general oral health and provide a five-year prognosis for the prosthesis requested. Complete upper denture PA request must also include the prognosis of six sound teeth.

Complete or partial dentures are authorized when one or more of the following conditions exist:

- One or more anterior teeth are missing.
- There are less than eight posterior teeth in occlusion (fixed bridges and dentures are to be considered occluding teeth).

- An existing complete or partial denture cannot be made serviceable through repair, relining, adjustment, or duplicating (rebasing) procedures.

If an existing complete or partial denture can be made serviceable, the dentist should provide the needed restorations to maintain use of the existing removable prosthesis. This includes extracting teeth, adding teeth to the existing prosthesis, and removing hyperplastic tissue as necessary to restore the functionality of the complete or partial denture.

Before the final impressions are taken for the fabrication of a complete or partial denture, adequate healing necessary to support the prosthesis must take place following the completion of extractions and/or surgical procedures. This includes the posterior ridges of any immediate denture. When an immediate denture is authorized involving the six anterior teeth (cuspid to cuspid), this requirement is waived.

Reimbursement for a complete or partial denture includes all necessary adjustments, relines, repairs, and duplications within six months of insertion. This also includes such services necessary for an immediate upper denture when authorized. If any necessary adjustments or repairs are identified within the six month time period but are not provided until after the six month time period, no additional reimbursement is allowed for these services.

Complete or partial dentures are not authorized when:

- A previous prosthesis has been provided within five years, whether or not the existing denture was obtained through Medicaid.
- An adjustment, reline, repair, or duplication will make them serviceable.
- Replacement of a complete or partial denture that has been lost or broken beyond repair is not a benefit within five years, whether or not the existing denture was obtained through Medicaid.

When denture services have commenced but irreversible circumstances have prevented delivery, the dentist should bill using the Not Otherwise Classified (NOC) procedure code. A copy of the lab bill and an explanation in the Remarks section of the claim must be included. Providers are paid a reduced rate to offset a portion of the costs incurred. It is the expectation that the probability of removable appliances being delivered and followup treatment completed is assessed prior to the initiation of treatment to evaluate whether the treatment is appropriate for the specific patient. Contact the Program Review Division (PRD) regarding the requirements

for incomplete dentures. (Refer to the Directory Appendix for contact information.)

The Department witness testified that Petitioner's request was denied for failure to meet policy requirements for denture replacement on a five-year rotation. According to Department records, Petitioner was approved for dentures through Medicaid on or about December 30, 2019.

Petitioner testified that when she first got the dentures in 2019, she knew there would be an adjustment period. Petitioner indicated that she did have a couple of issues at first that the dentist was able to fix, but as time went on the dentures became too ill-fitting to work. Petitioner indicated that it feels like there is a giant mass in her mouth and she cannot open her mouth far enough to chew. Petitioner testified that she chokes a lot and has lost a lot of weight because she cannot eat properly. Petitioner indicated that the dentures are completely off center, only two teeth touch, and the teeth are very dull. Petitioner indicated that she tried to go back to the original dentist, but she was treated so poorly by them she did not want to return. Petitioner indicated that the new dentures have caused a severe overbite and changed the shape of her face.

In response, the Department's witness indicated that Petitioner should call the Medicaid complaint line at 517-373-4972 and/or the Medicaid fraud hotline at 1-855-643-7283 and report her dentist and get this matter straightened out.

On review, the Department's decision to deny the request for a complete upper denture was reached within policy. Petitioner was approved for a complete upper denture on December 30, 2019. As such, Petitioner is not eligible for replacement of the dentures until December 2024. As indicated above, policy requires that Petitioner's dentist be responsible for servicing the dentures through the five-year period. As such, Petitioner should return to the first dentist and insist that the dentist make Petitioner whole. If Petitioner is unsuccessful with the first dentist, Petitioner should immediately call the Medicaid complaint line at 517-373-4972 or the Medicaid fraud hotline at 1-855-643-7283 and report the dentist and get this matter straightened out. However, based on the evidence presented and available to the Department at the time the decision was made, the Department's decision was proper and must be upheld.

DECISION AND ORDER

The Administrative Law Judge, based on the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, decides that the Department properly denied Petitioner's request for prior authorization for a complete upper denture.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that:

The Department's decision is AFFIRMED.
